Executive Session (Closed to the Public)

The Executive Session of the Board meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. The following Board members were present: Barb Carlson, Marlae Cox-Kolek, Freddie Davis-English, Doug Frisk, Judi Gordon, Rebecca Lund, Duane Reynolds, Bob Schmillen, Walter Roberts, Jr., and Marjorie Van Slyke. 1. Call to Order / Roll Call – Public Session

The Public Session of the Board meeting was called to order at 10:35 a.m.

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3. Staff Member Reports


- A. Executive Director's Report (Kari Rehtzigel)
1. Budget Report (Receipts and Expenditures through December 31, 2014)
 2. Expedited and Temporary Licensing for Former and Current Members of the Military – LPC, LPCC, and LADC Licensure Requirements
 3. Minnesota Statutes sections 214.077 and 214.32, subdivision 6 – temporary suspension of license
 4. January 7-9, 2015 - American Association of State Counseling Boards (AASCB) Conference, Savannah, Georgia (Judi Gordon and Kristen Piper)

Ms. Rehtzigel was ill and therefore not present at the Board meeting to provide her report. She prepared a written document for Board members of the Board's receipts and expenditures through December 31, 2014. Receipts total \$523,861.08 (65.34% of the budget) and expenditures total \$178,085.51 (38.27% of the budget). Samantha Strehlo briefly summarized the legislative items (temporary licensure for members of the military and temporary suspension procedures) and reminded Board members that Ms. Rehtzigel reported on these items at the November Board meeting.

Chair Judi Gordon and Vice Chair Kristen Piper gave a brief report of their experience at the AASCB conference January 7-9, 2015. Education program accreditation was a major topic of discussion [Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Education Programs (CACREP) or a degree from an institution of higher education that is accredited by a regional accrediting organization recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA).] Employment and reimbursement for services to Veterans is linked to graduates of CACREP programs. Kristen Piper summarized the main themes of the conference: 1) the purpose of regulatory boards is to protect the public; 2) unification of the counseling profession; 3) licensure portability; 4) working toward a consistent credential name across all 50 states (LPC); 5) working toward adopting a common definition of the scope of practice for LPCs across all 50 states; and 6) working to establish common education requirements for licensure in all 50 states.

Attendees from various states expressed fear at the thought of opening up their practice acts in the legislative process. Doing so creates the risk of losing regulatory language that they fought so hard to achieve.

B. LADC Program Update (Samantha Strehlo)

1. Licenses Issued Since Last Board Meeting. Ms. Strehlo provided Board members with a list of persons licensed since the last Board meeting on November 7, 2014. Sixty (60) LADC licenses and twenty (20) temporary permits were issued since the last Board meeting. *See Attachment 1 to these minutes.*

2. Report on Program Operations. Ms. Strehlo provided the Board members with statistical information gathered between January 1, 2014 and December 31, 2014, including the number of applications received (943), the number of licenses issued (852), the number of complaints received (103), a breakdown of the categories of complaints received, a breakdown of categories of complainants, the number of complaints closed (104), and the number of disciplinary actions taken (20).

C. LPC/LPCC Program Update (Patricia LaBrocca)

1. Licenses Issued Since Last Board Meeting. Ms. LaBrocca provided Board members with a list of persons licensed since the last Board meeting on November 7, 2014. Thirty-one (31) LPCC licenses and eighteen (18) LPC licenses were issued since the last Board meeting. *See Attachment 1 to these minutes.*

2. Report on Program Operations

Ms. LaBrocca reported that licensure activity has slowed, but there are still many pending applications.

4. Minnesota Statutes section 148F.11 (Exceptions to License Requirement) and Minnesota Rules part 9530.6450 (Chemical Dependency Licensed Treatment Facilities – Staff Qualifications) - Discussion

Chair Gordon invited all persons present to participate in an open discussion. Curt Murphy, LADC, and Michael McGinnis, LADC, were present for the discussion. DHS staff members were also present. Curt Murphy introduced himself to the Board and stated he contributed to the language in Minnesota Statutes chapter 148C (original LADC practice act). He stated a great deal of time was invested in crafting the language in the exceptions to LADC licensure to allow

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other licensed professionals to provide services to clients with substance use issues. The goal was to protect the recipient of services.

Mr. Murphy stated his concerns that persons who do not have the LADC license are providing alcohol and drug counseling services in facilities licensed by the State of Minnesota. He believes they are using the title of substance abuse counselor or alcohol and drug counselor in violation of the law related to alcohol and drug counseling and use of titles. He used social workers as an example. He reported he brought his concerns to DHS in 2013, and it was the position of DHS that no violation of law has occurred. Mr. Murphy then stated he raised his concerns with the BBHT. He believes all persons who provide services to clients with substance use issues should have to meet the same requirements to do so.

Chair Gordon stated that the BBHT regulates the practice of alcohol and drug counselors. She stated that the BBHT has received no complaints related to persons practicing in a licensed facility in violation of the law related to LADCs. DHS staff member Keith Koegler then explained Rule 31 requirements (9530.6450, subpart 5.B.) for persons to provide alcohol and drug counseling services if they do not have the LADC license. First, a person must be exempt from licensure as permitted by Minnesota Statutes section 148F.11. The person must then demonstrate competency in alcohol and drug counseling in one of five ways, including classroom instruction hours, certification as an alcohol and drug counselor, or supervised work experience. He stated that no person in a state licensed facility uses the title of alcohol and drug counselor unless they have the LADC license. Other professionals may use the titles related to their profession (e.g. LSW, LPCC, etc.).

Mr. Murphy stated that none of the provisions in Rule 31 are equal to the requirements LADCs have to meet in order to provide alcohol and drug counseling services. He noted that there are no continuing education requirements in Rule 31 or language requiring supervision by a qualified supervisor. He believes there is harm to recipients of services from non-LADC licensed professionals. He stated he is prepared to file complaints with the BBHT. Vice Chair Kristen Piper, MHR, LPCC, asked questions to clarify practice by persons such as herself. Ms. Piper then stated her view that one of the functions of a licensing board is to address complaints received about individual licensees who are alleged to have practiced outside of the scope of their licensure or competency. She further stated that her understanding is that a board's function is not to intervene into how another state agency is managing their own rules. Mr. Murphy responded that he understands 148F is a practitioner provision, not a facility rule. He also stated that he understands that for the Board to take action, it needs explicit examples of practice problems in the field. He went on to say that if a governmental agency creates a

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
situation where people who would otherwise not be harmed place themselves in a harmful position, because of statutory requirements, the Board needs to say something. Mr. Murphy again pointed out that social workers got permission from DHS to work in Rule 31 facilities and "had no idea they did anything wrong." They continue to practice with no continuing education or oversight. Mr. Murphy asked, "Whose responsibility then is it to protect that group of affected and regulated parties?"

Doug Frisk, Public Member, stated that the Board licenses LADCs and should support issues that affect licensure. The Board should be concerned that other providers are doing the work of LADCs. Protecting the public is the Board's charge. Chair Gordon agreed.

Walter Roberts, Jr., EdD, LPCC, stated that nobody in the room is advocating for persons practicing outside their scope of practice or beyond their capabilities. He observed that social workers and DHS are the targets of the majority of Mr. Murphy's comments. Dr. Roberts asked Mr. Murphy if he has contacted the Board of Social Work. Mr. Murphy has not. Mr. Murphy stated he is not arguing about the social work scope of practice but the LADC scope of practice. He believes it is the responsibility of the BBHT to contact any entity that is intruding on alcohol and drug counseling practice. Dr. Roberts told Mr. Murphy he serves on the Board's Complaint Resolution Committee and encouraged Mr. Murphy to file a complaint with the Board if he has knowledge of individuals practicing in a method that is detrimental to others. DHS representative Keith Koegler clarified that DHS does not simply "allow" or "approve" persons to practice alcohol and drug counseling in a licensed facility. Rather, licensed programs must follow the Rule 31 requirements related to persons who may provide alcohol and drug counseling services. Complaints about persons practicing outside the scope of licensure should be directed to the appropriate licensing board. He again stated that persons who are exempt from LADC licensure who want to practice in a Rule 31 facility must meet the additional requirements set forth in Rule 31.

Mr. Murphy stated he brought his concerns to the BBHT first, but will pursue any other avenues that are available. He stated he sincerely appreciated the discussion at this Board meeting. He stated he disagrees with the DHS position, and stated they have culpability, noting that LADCs lost employment opportunities when other persons were hired to work in Rule 31 facilities who are not as qualified as LADCs. There are issues surrounding people who have been harmed by social workers who do not get reported because they do not know that alcohol and drug counseling is regulated by the BBHT. He stated that "Social Work is not going to pay attention to what LADCs are doing." Mr. Murphy stated he has evidence and examples of complaints he has received. He further stated the issue will be raised with MARRCH. He concluded his

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remarks by stating his opinion that it is the Board's responsibility to look at regulations and prevent them from being utilized in a way that will create harm.


Chair Gordon clarified with Mr. Murphy that he does not take issue with the Board's regulations, but rather has concerns about the provisions in facility licensing Rule 31 that allow persons who do not have the LADC license to provide alcohol and drug counseling services. Mr. Murphy believes Rule 31 conflicts with the LADC statutes. Mr. Murphy responded that he approached the BBHT because he believes it is the responsibility of the Board to address scope of practice issues, whether they involve an entity or an individual practitioner. Chair Gordon reminded him that the Board has considered Mr. Murphy's concerns on three occasions. She stated that the Board responds to all complaints on individuals that it receives, but not necessarily to complaints regarding "somebody else's rules conflicting with ours." Keith Koegler from DHS stated DHS will take the matter under advisement. Rule changes are a possibility. If the Board of Social Work wants to have a discussion with DHS, they are open to that as well. DHS abides by the rule language currently in place. Chair Gordon invited Mr. Murphy to submit complaints on individual practitioners. Doug Frisk stated the Board might want to look at the "big picture" and consider what it can do to prevent this from happening over and over again. Walter Roberts reiterated that it is the legal and ethical responsibility of a licensee to make a complaint if they have information and evidence of infractions of law or rule. He stated that is what will help him understand the depth of this problem.

Chair Gordon invited Rick Moldenhauer from the DHS Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division to comment on the discussion. He stated that the division has an interim director at the present time. He stated the Board can submit any recommendations or concerns to his attention. Ms. Gordon noted that she is a member of the MARRCH Public Policy Committee and there has been an increase in suggestions that Rule 31 be reviewed. Mr. Murphy stated he will bring complaints to the Board of Social Work first and contact the BBHT if Social Work fails to act.

5. Variance Requests

A. Sara Eby, MA, LPC (#1378). Duane Reynolds moved to approve Ms. Eby's request for a variance to Minn. R. 2150.5010, subpart 4.A. related to the requirement of completing supervised practice hours with an approved supervisor. Marlae Cox-Kolek seconded. All Board members present voted "aye," there were no nays, and the variance was granted. The Board approved Ms. Eby's request to count supervised practice hours and supervision hours completed under the supervision of Sharon Farhi, MA, LMFT (Oregon) for purposes of meeting the supervision requirements for LPC/LPCC licensure in Minnesota.

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B. Laurel (Tobey) Benoit, MC, LPC (#1341), LPCC Applicant. Marlae Cox-Kolek moved to approve Ms. Benoit's request for a variance to Minn. R. 2150.5010, subpart 4.A. related to the requirement of completing supervised practice hours with an approved supervisor. Duane Reynolds seconded. All Board members present voted "aye," there were no nays, and the variance was granted. The Board approved Ms. Benoit's request to count supervised practice hours and supervision hours completed under the supervision of Darin D. Chokey, MEd, LPC (Arizona) for purposes of meeting the supervision requirements for LPC/LPCC licensure in Minnesota.

C. Bridgit Pankonin, MA, LPC Applicant. Walter Roberts moved to approve Ms. Pankonin's request for a variance to Minn. R. 2150.5010, subpart 4.C., related to in person supervision requirements. Bob Schmillen seconded. All Board members present voted "aye," there were no nays, and the variance was granted. The Board approved Ms. Pankonin's request to reduce in person supervision from 75 percent to 50 percent for purposes of meeting the supervision requirements for LPC/LPCC licensure.

6. Termination of LPC/LPCC and LADC Licenses for Nonrenewal

Walter Roberts moved to approve the termination of the LPC, LPCC and LADC licenses on the list prepared by the Board staff. Barb Carlson seconded. Chair Gordon called for a vote on the motion. All Board members present voted to approve the list of licenses to be terminated. *See* Attachment 2 to these minutes for the licenses that were Board terminated.

7. Public Comment Period

No commentary was offered.

10. Adjournment of Public Session

Barb Carlson moved to adjourn the meeting. Walter Roberts seconded. All Board members present voted aye, there were no nays, and the public portion of the Board meeting was adjourned at approximately 12:05 p.m.
