Surgical Dressings: 7,539 gauze dressings; 65 linen dressings; 44 knitted sponges.

Hospital Supplies: 30 ambulance pillows; 3 pair pajamas; 45 surgical shirts; 7 pair bed socks; 23 shoulder wraps; 523 triangular slings; 44 knitted eye bandages; 100 dozen safety pins; 57 handkerchiefs; 2 linen towels; 40 tumbler covers; 1 package old linen.

Knitted Articles of Wool: 189 pairs socks; 29 pairs wristlets; 73 sleeveless sweaters; 2 sweaters with sleeves; 23 helmets; 18 mufflers.

Miscellaneous: 27 gift bags, each containing at least one of the following, some articles being more elaborate: 1 box stationery; 1 pencil; 1 pipe; 1 box tobacco; 1 handkerchief; 1 American flag; 1 package of gum; 1 game checkers; 1 pocket comb; 1 small mirror; 1/2 dozen safety pins; 1 wash cloth; 1 Turkish towel; 1 bar soap; 1 toy; a postcard showing the hospital and another of Christmas greeting in French.

The total value of these articles was placed at \$533.59.
