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

Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the State Register

The State Register is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the State Register. Published every Monday, the State Register makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 80 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific Minnesota Rule chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the Minnesota Rules are published. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Generally speaking, proposed and adopted exempt rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the State Register.

An agency must first solicit Comments on Planned Rules or Comments on Planned Rule Amendments from the public on the subject matter of a possible rulemaking proposal under active consideration within the agency (Minnesota Statutes §§ 14.101). It does this by publishing a notice in the State Register at least 60 days before publication of a notice to adopt or a notice of hearing, or within 60 days of the effective date of any new statutory grant of required rulemaking.

When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as Proposed Rules, along with a notice of hearing, or a notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules, and withdrawn proposed rules, are also published in the State Register. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the State Register as Adopted Rules. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety, but only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the State Register, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted.

The State Register features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues #1-26 inclusive (issue #26 cumulative for issues #1-26); issues #27-52 inclusive (issue #52, cumulative for issues #27-52 or #53 in some years). A subject matter index is updated weekly and is available upon request from the editor. A rule becomes effective after the requirements of *Minnesota Statutes* §§ 14.05-14.28 have been met and five working days after the rule is published in the *State Register*, unless a later date is required by statutes or specified in the rule. If an adopted rule is identical to its proposed form as previously published, a notice of adoption and a citation to its previous *State Register* publication will be printed. If an adopted rule differs from its proposed form, language which has been deleted will be printed with strikeouts and new language will be underlined. The rule's previous *State Register* publication will be cited.

Expedited Emergency Rules

Provisions exist for the Commissioners of some state agencies to adopt expedited emergency rules when conditions exist that do not allow the Commissioner to comply with the requirements for emergency rules. The Commissioner must submit the rule to the attorney general for review and must publish a notice of adoption that includes a copy of the rule and the emergency conditions. Expedited emergency rules are effective upon publication in the *State Register*, and may be effective up to seven days before publication under certain emergency conditions.

Expedited emergency rules are effective for the period stated or up to 18 months. Specific *Minnesota Statute* citations accompanying these expedited emergency rules detail the agency's rulemaking authority.

Adopted Expedited Emergency Game and Fish Rules: 2025 Deer Seasons and Special Hunts

Notice is hereby given that the above entitled rules have been adopted through the process prescribed by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.027, subdivision 13(b). The statutory authority for the content of the rules is *Minnesota Statutes*, 84.027, subdivision 13; 97A.045, subdivision 11; 97A.091, subdivision 2; 97A.401, subdivision 4; 97A.535, subdivision 2; 97B.111; 97B.301; 97B.311.

The following conditions do not allow compliance with *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 97A.0451 to 97A.0459: Population data needed to set bag limits for specific deer permit areas are not available until spring of each year. Special hunts to reduce deer density in municipalities, state parks and other areas where hunting is not normally allowed are based on annual changes in local deer populations. Other special hunts are authorized to provide opportunities to special groups and for mentoring or for disease control. Changes to the Camp Ripley Game Refuge provide a more effective means of public access while maintaining an equitable distribution of harvest. Annual biological harvest data shows that there is a harvestable surplus of deer in the area.

The emergency rule is also necessitated by the continuing effort to manage Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), which has been found in wild deer harvested in multiple areas of Minnesota and captive deer in farms in western, north central, and eastern Minnesota. CWD infectious agents are extremely persistent in the environment and transmission may be both direct and indirect. The concentration of deer in certain areas increases the risk of transmission between individual deer. Disease management measures, including sampling requirements and increased harvest opportunities, are implemented to control disease spread based on discoveries of infections in both wild and farm-raised captive deer. Reducing the number of deer reduces the risk of transmission between individuals.

The DNR will also hold a special hunt in mid-December 2025 in deer permit areas where CWD has been classified as a persistent infection in accordance with the DNR's CWD Response Plan. Late hunts offer additional opportunities to harvest deer in known CWD areas and reduce deer densities.

6230.0290 BECKLIN HOMESTEAD PARK WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA.

Subpart 1. Open hunting. The Becklin Homestead Park Wildlife Management Area is open to hunting and trapping during the established seasons only to hunters and trappers with disabilities and their able-bodied partners during:

- A. disabled hunters and trappers who meet the requirements of the established seasons according to Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.055, subdivision 3, paragraphs (a) and (b): and
 - B. the special hunt described under subpart 2.

Subp. 2. Special hunt.

- A. The Becklin Homestead Park Wildlife Management Area is open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by archery as described in this subpart. No more than 20 permits shall be issued to hunters with disabilities. Capable Partners is the sponsor and hunters with disabilities and able-bodied partners must meet any requirements of the sponsoring organization. Hunters with disabilities and able-bodied partners may use bonus tags. This is special hunt 882.
- B. Hunters with disabilities must be accompanied by an able-bodied partner each time they hunt. Hunters with disabilities must purchase and possess an archery deer-hunting license. The bag limit for hunters with disabilities is three deer, one of which may be a legal buck.
- C. Able-bodied partners must stay within 100 yards of the hunter with disabilities and may take only legal antlerless deer. Able-bodied partners must purchase and possess an archery license. The bag limit for able-bodied partners is one antlerless deer.

6232.0200 DEFINITIONS.

- Subp. 4a. **Deer permit area.** "Deer permit area" means an area of the state consisting of one or more deer registration blocks <u>according to part 6232.1750</u>. Deer permit areas open for taking legal bucks and antierless deer during the deer season are defined as follows:
- A. "intensive three-deer limit deer permit area," <u>«two-deer limit deer permit area,»</u> and <u>«managed five-deer limit deer permit area»</u> mean deer permit area areas where taking deer of either sex is authorized and multiple bonus permits are authorized within bag limits for each area as prescribed by the commissioner;
 - B. "antlerless lottery deer permit area" means a deer permit area where taking: [For text of subitems (1) and (2), see Minnesota Rules]
 - (3) either-sex deer is authorized by an archery deer license; and
- C. "hunter choice either-sex deer permit area» means a deer permit area where taking one deer of either sex is authorized.; and
 - D. "bucks-only deer permit area" means a deer permit area where only legal bucks may be taken.

 - Subp. 13. Fawn. "Fawn" means any deer less than one year of age.
- Subp. 14. Chronic wasting disease management zone. "Chronic wasting disease management zone" means deer permit areas 601, 604, 605, 642, 643, 644, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, 655, 661, 666, 671, 679, and 684.

Subp. 15. Chronic wasting disease surveillance zone. "Chronic wasting disease surveillance zone" means deer permit areas 229, 239, 262, 269, 270, 285, and 338.

6232.0300 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING DEER.

- Subpart 1. Season options, regular firearms. A firearm deer hunter may purchase a firearm license valid for the regular firearms deer season or a youth firearms license. A muzzleloader deer hunter may purchase a muzzleloader license valid for the muzzleloader season or a youth muzzleloader license. For the regular firearm season, a hunter must select either the A or B firearms or muzzleloader season and this option will be printed on the license at the time of purchase. A person may only hunt deer by firearms only within the selected season option indicated on the person's firearm license, except:
 - A. as prescribed in part 6232.1970, subpart 2;
- B. a firearm license for any season option is valid in the Metropolitan Deer Management Zone deer permit area <u>601</u> under part 6232.4700, subpart 158; and
- C. youth firearm license holders with a license issued under Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.475, subdivision 2 or 3, may hunt deer in both the statewide A and late southeast B seasons; and
 - D. a regular firearms license is valid for either the firearms or muzzleloader season as indicated on the license. [For text of subpart 2, see Minnesota Rules]

Subp. 3. Party hunting.

- A. A party is a group of two or more licensed deer hunters who are afield hunting together and are all using firearms or all using archery equipment.
- B. A member of a party may kill a legal buck or antlerless deer for another member of the party who has an unused tag valid for that deer, except:
 - A. as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.301; and.
- B. in all 300 series deer permit areas as prescribed in part 6232.1300, subpart 3, where unused tags can be used on antlerless deer only.
 - <u>C.</u> A mixed-weapons group is considered two separate parties.
- D. Persons issued permits under Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.055, subdivision 3, who are hunting in a an antlerless lottery deer permit area and do not have an either-sex permit may not tag antlerless deer for another member of the party.

Subp. 6. License purchase Bonus permits and validation.

- A. A bonus permit may be purchased any time throughout the open deer seasons. Bonus permits are validimmediately upon purchase, as long as the purchaser has a valid regular license. When a regular license is purchased after the start of the season for that license, a bonus permit is not valid until the waiting period has expired for the regular license. before and during the open archery, firearms, and muzzleloader deer seasons. A bonus permit is not valid unless:
 - (1) it is issued before legal shooting hours on the day it is first used; and

- (2) the hunter's regular license is valid under Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.411, subdivision 3.
- B. Bonus permits are valid for taking deer by archery, firearms, or muzzleloader license holders in areas where taking more than one deer is authorized, except where taking or tagging more than one deer is authorized solely by landowner permits.
- <u>C.</u> <u>Unless otherwise specified, bonus permits are valid in archery, firearms, and muzzleloader special hunts, including early- or late-season hunts.</u>
- B. D. Before a deer is moved from the site of kill, the person tagging the deer must validate the tag a site tag must be validated at the site of kill by the licensed deer hunter whose tag is being used on the deer. Validation consists of using a knife or similar sharp object to cut out or a pen to indelibly mark the appropriate notches on the tag indicating:
 - (1) the month the deer was taken;
 - (2) the date the deer was taken; and
 - (3) the time of day the deer was taken.

Subp. 8. Bag limit.

- A. Except in deer permit area 643, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, and 655, a person may not tag more than one legal buck per calendar year using any combination of licenses. In deer permit areas 643, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, and 655, a person may tag one legal buck during the archery season, the firearms season, and the muzzleloader season, but not more than three legal bucks per calendar year. A person may not tag more than one deer during a license year by any method, except as authorized in items A to G this subpart.
- A. B. In deer <u>permit</u> areas designated as <u>managed or intensive</u> <u>two-deer limit</u>, three-deer <u>limit</u>, or <u>five-deer limit</u>, a person may tag deer with an archery, firearms, or muzzleloader license.
- B. C. A person may tag a deer by archery, firearm, or muzzleloader with a bonus permit in specified areas as prescribed in this chapter.
- <u>C. D.</u> In no case may a person tag more than five deer per year by firearms, archery, muzzleloader, or all methods combined, except additional deer may be taken as provided in items $\frac{D}{E}$, subitem $\frac{A}{E}$; $\frac{A}{$
 - D. E. Except as provided in items E and item F, the total bag limits by deer permit area are as follows:
- (1) the total bag limit for <u>antlerless</u> lottery, <u>hunter choice either-sex</u>, and <u>youth-only antlerless bucks-only</u> deer permit areas is one deer;
 - (2) the total aggregate bag limit for managed two-deer limit deer permit areas is two deer;
 - (3) the total aggregate bag limit for intensive three-deer limit deer permit areas is five three deer; and
 - (4) the total aggregate bag limit for five-deer limit deer permit areas is five deer; and
- (4) (5) in addition to the total bag limits under subitems (1) to (3) (4), a person with a free landowner deer license may take one additional antlerless deer on land owned or leased by the person in managed either-sex, two-deer limit, three-deer limit, and intensive five-deer limit deer permit areas. Landowner licenses are also valid during late hunts and the early antlerless deer season.
 - E. F. Up to two three antlerless deer may be taken in the early antlerless deer permit areas as prescribed in part

6232.1750. These deer may be taken in addition to the bag limit established in item $\oplus \underline{D}$.

- F. Hunters hunting in the Metropolitan Deer Management Zone under part 6232.4700, subpart 158, may take and tag an unlimited number of deer.
- G. Muzzleloader and archery deer hunters hunting in deer permit areas 300 to 399 may take deer under the most liberal bag limits prescribed for the deer permit area.

6232.0400 REGISTRATION OF DEER.

Subp. 2. Registration requirements.

- B. Deer must be registered according to item A:
 - (1) before the deer is processed either privately or commercially; and
 - (2) within 24 48 hours after the close of the season in which the deer was taken. [For text of items C and D, see Minnesota Rules] [For text of subpart 3, see Minnesota Rules]

Subp. 4. General provisions for registration of deer.

- A. Registration agents are not required to inspect deer at registration stations. Legally registered deer may be transported anytime during or after the deer hunting season, except as prescribed in subparts 6 to 8.
- B. No part of the carcass, except skin or entrails, may be removed until after the deer has been registered using one of the methods described in subpart 2, except that deer may be quartered prior to registration as long as all parts remain together and are presented for registration and the head of the deer remains attached to one quarter. A person may not process a deer unless it has been registered as evidenced by a possession tag or registration confirmation number.
 - C. Authorized department staff may transport carcasses statewide when conducting department operations.
 - Subp. 5. [See repealer.]

Subp. 6. Deer carcasses in chronic wasting disease management zone.

- A. Except as provided in items B, D to J, and L to N, carcasses of wild deer harvested by hunters, killed by vehicles, or killed in any other manner in a chronic wasting disease management zone must remain in the zone until the results of a test for chronic wasting disease show the disease has not been detected in the deer.
- B. Cut and wrapped meat, quarters, or other portions of meat from a deer taken in the chronic wasting disease management zone may be transported outside the zone if no part of the spinal column or head is attached. Antlers, hides, teeth, finished taxidermy mounts, antlers attached to skull caps that are cleaned of all brain tissue, and whole skulls that are cleaned of all brain tissue may be transported outside the chronic wasting disease management zone.
- C. Except as provided in item K, deer, except fawns, taken on November 8 or 9, 2025, in the chronic wasting disease management zone must be submitted at a designated sampling station listed on the Department of Natural Resources website for chronic wasting disease sampling within 24 hours of harvest and before transporting out of the chronic wasting disease management zone.

- D. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit areas 642, 643, 644, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, and 655, as defined in part 6232.4700, subparts 95 to 102 and 164, may be transported from those deer permit areas into incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities: Adams, Elkton, Dexter, Kasson, Lake City, Mantorville, Oronoco, Pine Island, South Troy, and Zumbro Falls.
- E. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit area 661, as defined in part 6232.4700, subpart 104, may be transported from deer permit area 661 into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities:

 Alvarado, Angus, Beltrami, Crookston, Euclid, Nielsville, Oslo, and Warren.
- F. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit area 666, as defined in part 6232.4700, subpart 110, may be transported from deer permit area 666 into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities: Ada, Audubon, Borup, Callaway, Detroit Lakes, Felton, Hawley, Lake Park, Twin Valley, and Westbury.
- G. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit area 671, as defined in part 6232.4700, subpart 124, may be transported from deer permit area 671 into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities: Barry, Beardsley, Browns Valley, Charlesville, Graceville, Johnson, Nashua, and Tenney.
- H. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit area 679, as defined in part 6232.4700, subpart 35, may be transported from deer permit area 679 into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities:

 Bowstring, Deer River, Goodland, Hill City, Jacobson, Nashwauk, Ox Hide, Pengilly, Remer, Swan River, Talmoon, and Zemple.
- I. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit area 684, as defined in part 6232.4700, subpart 85, may be transported from deer permit area 684 into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities: Bagley, Blackduck, Lake George, Laporte, Nebish, and Shevlin or to the Department of Natural Resources Forestry office located at 36452 State Highway 92, outside the municipal boundary of Bagley, Minnesota.
- J. Carcasses of deer taken in deer permit areas 601 and 605, as defined in part 6232.4700, subparts 158 and 168, may be transported from those deer permit areas into the incorporated and unincorporated municipal boundaries of the following cities: Albertville, Andover, Blaine, Centerville, Dayton, Delano, Elk River, Grant, Ham Lake, Hanover, Hugo, Independence, Lino Lakes, Minnetrista, Nowthen, Oak Grove, Otsego, Rockford, Saint Bonifacius, Saint Michael, Stillwater, Victoria, and Watertown.
- K. Hunters who are submitting samples via the department hunter mail-in sample program rather than at a check station must have their samples postmarked within 72 hours of harvest. Hunters must obtain mail-in kits before taking the deer to comply with the sampling requirement.
- L. Enrolled members of Minnesota Tribal governments, as defined under Minnesota Statutes, section 10.65, subdivision 2, paragraph (a), clause (4), who take deer on lands held in trust by the Minnesota Tribal government that the member is enrolled in are exempt from this subpart.
- M. Heads from cervids with or without the cape and neck attached that originate from outside Minnesota may be transported into Minnesota only if they are delivered to a licensed taxidermist within 48 hours of entering Minnesota.
- N. Heads from cervids with or without the cape and neck attached that originate inside the chronic wasting disease management zone may be transported out of the chronic wasting disease management zone only if they are delivered to a licensed taxidermist within 48 hours of leaving the chronic wasting disease management zone.

Subp. 7. Deer carcasses in chronic wasting disease surveillance zone.

A. Except as provided in items B and C, deer, except fawns, taken on November 8 or 9, 2025, in the chronic wasting disease surveillance zone must be submitted at a designated sampling station listed on the Department of Natural Resources website for chronic wasting disease sampling within 24 hours of harvest.

- B. Hunters who are submitting samples via the department hunter mail-in sample program rather than at a check station must have their samples postmarked within 72 hours of harvest. Hunters must obtain mail-in kits before taking the deer to comply with the sampling requirement.
- C. Enrolled members of a Minnesota Tribal government, as defined by Minnesota Statutes, section 10.65, subdivision 2, paragraph (a), clause (4), who take deer on lands held in trust by the Minnesota Tribal government they are enrolled in are exempt from this subpart.

6232.0700 LEGAL DEER BY ARCHERY.

Antlerless deer and legal bucks may be taken by archery, except that archery hunters may not take antlerless deer in <u>lottery bucks-only</u> deer permit areas that have no <u>either-sex permit quota</u> or in <u>antlerless</u> lottery deer permit areas that have a quota of youth antlerless permits for firearms deer hunters under part 6232.1800.

6232.0800 ARCHERY SPECIAL HUNT AREAS AND PROCEDURES.

- Subp. 2. Areas. Archery special bow and arrow hunt permits are valid in areas designated by the commissioner and published in the annual hunting regulations booklet. - A. portions of the Pin Oak Prairie Scientific and Natural Area in Fillmore County are open October 1 to November 30 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than eight permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 926;
- B. portions of Carleton State Game Refuge and Arboretum in Dakota and Rice Counties are open November 27 to December 31 for antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 40 permits shall be issued. Hunters must obtain written permission from the landowner. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 972;
- C. J.C. Hormel Nature Center and portions of the city of Austin in Mower County are open October 1 to

 December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 50 permits shall be issued.

 The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 973;
- <u>D.</u> portions of the Vermillion Highlands Research, Recreation, and Wildlife Management Area in Dakota County are open September 13 to October 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 60 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 975;
- E. portions of the city of New Ulm in Brown County are open October 11 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in a double earn-a-buck hunt. Hunters must register two antlerless deer before harvesting a legal buck. No more than 56 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 976;
- F. portions of the city of Red Wing in Goodhue County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Portions of Red Wing as identified on maps provided by the hunt administrator are an earn-a-buck hunt. Permits to hunt are unlimited. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 977;
- G. portions of the city of Redwood Falls in Redwood County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in a double earn-a-buck hunt. Hunters must register two antlerless deer before harvesting a legal buck. No more than 20 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 978;
 - H. portions of the city of Duluth in St. Louis County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless

deer and legal bucks. No more than 400 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 980;

- I. portions of the city of Mankato in Blue Earth County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 40 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 981;
- J. portions of the city of Granite Falls in Yellow Medicine County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 982;
- K. portions of the city of Ortonville in Big Stone County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 30 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 983;
- L. portions of the city of Canby in Yellow Medicine County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 984;
- M. portions of the city of Bemidji in Beltrami County as identified on maps provided by the hunt administrator are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 22 permits for the northeast hunt area and 22 permits for the west hunt area shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 985;
- N. portions of Bemidji Regional Airport in Beltrami County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 20 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 986;
- O. portions of the Greenleaf State Recreation Area in Meeker County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Special permits are not required. The bag limit is one deer, and regulations for deer permit area 285 apply. This is special hunt 987;
- P. portions of the city of Owatonna in Steele County are open October 19 to November 16 and November 17 to December 14 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 31 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 990;
- Q. portions of the city of Hallock in Kittson County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 992;
- R. portions of the city of Grand Rapids in Itasca County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Individuals authorized to hunt the archery season may hunt the open areas without a special permit. The bag limit is three deer. Disease management permits may be used to take antlerless deer during this special hunt. Deer taken during this special hunt must be submitted within 24 hours of harvest for chronic wasting disease testing at a sampling station designated by the hunt administrator. This is special hunt 995;
- S. portions of the city of Red Lake Falls in Red Lake County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 998;
- T. portions of the city of Lake Benton in Lincoln County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 40 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 924;
- U. portions of the city of Blue Earth in Faribault County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 16 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 897;
 - V. portions of the city of Two Harbors in Lake County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking

antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 896;

- W. portions of the city of Warroad in Roseau County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 974;
- X. portions of the Carver Rapids and Thompson Ferry Units of the Minnesota Valley State Recreation Area in Scott County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Permits to hunt are unlimited. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 979;
- Y. portions of the Lake Tamarack Unit of the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum in Carver County are open October 25 to November 9 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than two permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 895;
- Z. portions of the city of Jackson in Jackson County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. Individuals authorized to hunt the archery season may hunt the open areas without a special permit. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 928;
- AA. portions of the city of Baxter in Crow Wing County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Permits to hunt are unlimited. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 989;
- BB. portions of the city of Windom in Cottonwood County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 970;
- CC. portions of the city of East Grand Forks are open November 15 to November 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks as described on individual permits. No more than 12 permits shall be issued, consisting of nine antlerless permits and three either-sex permits. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 996;
- DD. portions of the River Bend Nature Center are open November 13 to November 16 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 30 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 997; and
- EE. portions of the city of East Gull Lake in Cass County are open September 13 to December 31 for taking antlerless deer only. Permits to hunt are unlimited. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 880.

6232.0900 CAMP RIPLEY ARCHERY HUNT.

Subpart 1. **Deer season and hunter quota.** Camp Ripley may be open, by permit only, for the taking of deer by archery during the archery deer season and for taking deer by muzzleloader during the muzzleloader deer season. Hunt participants must meet all requirements, follow all instructions, and stay within all posted or prescribed boundaries provided by the hunt administrator. Open dates are the two-day period beginning the third Thursday in October and the two-day period beginning the last Saturday in October.

Subp. 3. 300 Series.

A person who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for season option A may take an antlerless deer without a permit, except in those lottery deer permit areas where no either-sex permits are offered and in youth-only antlerless deer permit areas. - C. Legal bucks Deer may be taken by firearms in season option B for a nine-day period beginning the Saturday nearest November 20. In managed or intensive deer permit areas, antlerless deer may be taken throughout this season. In lottery deer permit areas and in special hunt areas, antlerless deer may be taken only by permit throughout this season and only within the deer permit or special hunt area specified on each hunter's permit, except as specifically authorized by statute. A person who is authorized by statute to take a deer of either sex without an either-sex permit and who is licensed for season option B may take an antlerless deer without a permit, except in those lottery deer permit areas where no either-sex permits are offered and in youth-only antlerless deer permit areas. The bag limits under part 6232.0300, subpart 8, for the corresponding deer permit area designation under part 6232.1750 apply.

Subp. 8. 600 series.

- B. Deer may be taken by firearms in deer permit areas 604, 679, and 684 for a 16-day period beginning the

Saturday nearest November 6. The bag limits under part 6232.0300, subpart 8, for the corresponding deer permit area designation under part 6232.1750 apply.

- <u>C.</u> Deer may be taken by firearms in deer permit areas 605, 642, 643, 644, 645, 646, 647, 648, and 649 during:
- (1) the nine-day period beginning the Saturday nearest November 6. The bag limits under part 6232.0300, subpart 8, for the corresponding deer permit area designation under part 6232.1750 apply; and

Subp. 7. Nontoxic ammunition required.

 - B. For purposes of this subpart, "nontoxic ammunition" means:
 - (1) steel shot or projectile;

- (3) shot or projectile made of other nontoxic material approved by the director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 50, section 20.21(j).
- C. A person who carries a pistol and possesses a valid permit under Minnesota Statutes, section 624.714, may possess ammunition that does not meet the requirement of items A and B, but the ammunition may not be used for taking wild animals while participating in a special hunt in a scientific and natural area or in a state park.
- Subp. 8. 2025 firearms special hunt areas. In addition to complying with the requirements of this part, hunters who are hunting under a firearms special hunt permit must meet any requirements of the municipality, park, or area in which the special hunt occurs and those of any sponsoring organization. Hunt participants must stay within any boundaries prescribed by the sponsoring organization, by maps provided during a prehunt orientation, or by posting. Unless otherwise specified, hunters must possess a valid permit for the following firearms special hunt areas authorized for the 2025 season:
- A. portions of Cascade River State Park in Cook County are open November 8 to 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 23 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 900;
- B. portions of Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Aitkin County are open November 15 to 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 40 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 901;

- C. portions of St. Croix State Park in Pine County are open November 21 to 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 175 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is one deer. This is special hunt 902;

- Z. portions of Great River Bluffs State Park and portions of King's and Queen's Bluff Scientific and Natural Area in Winona County are open November 22 and 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 50 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 962;
- AA. portions of Whitewater State Park in Winona County are open November 22 and 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 50 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 927;
 - BB. portions of Frontenac State Park in Goodhue County are open November 22 and 23 for taking antlerless deer

and legal bucks. No more than 60 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 940;

- CC. portions of Kilen Woods State Park in Jackson County are open December 27 to January 4 for taking antlerless deer. No more than ten permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 991;
- DD. portions of Wild River State Park in Chisago County are open November 8 and 9 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 50 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 920;
- EE. portions of the city of Baxter in Crow Wing County are open November 8 to 23 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. Permits to hunt are unlimited and shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 993;
- FF. portions of the city of Baxter in Crow Wing County are open October 16 to 19 for taking antlerless deer only. Permits to hunt are unlimited and shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the early antlerless season. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 955;
- GG. portions of Zumbro Falls Woods Scientific and Natural Area in Wabasha County are open November 8 to 16 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 12 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 921;
- HH. portions of Zumbro Falls Woods Scientific and Natural Area in Wabasha County are open November 22 to 30 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 12 permits shall be issued only to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 923; and
- II. portions of Carver Park Reserve are open November 15 and 16 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 100 permits shall be issued to individuals authorized to hunt the statewide firearms season. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 971.

Subp. 9. Disease management hunts.

- A. To participate in the special hunt under item B, hunters must purchase a disease management permit according to part 6232.1980 or possess an unused site tag from a 2025 Minnesota landowner license, youth or adult firearm license, youth or adult muzzleloader license, youth or adult archery license, bonus permit, or early antierless permit. During the special hunt under item B:
- (1) hunters may tag deer of either sex with disease management tags or unused site tags from a 2025 landowner license, youth or adult firearm license, youth or adult muzzleloader license, or youth or adult archery license. Hunters using a 2025 landowner license are not required to use it on their property when participating in the disease management hunt;

- (4) a person using an unused tag from a 2025 firearms license must use a firearm or crossbow, a person hunting with an unused tag from a 2025 muzzleloader license must use a muzzleloader, and a person hunting with an unused tag from a 2025 archery license must use archery equipment. Persons hunting with a disease management permit may hunt with archery equipment, a firearm, a muzzleloader, or a crossbow.

- B. The special hunt is open December 19 to 21 as provided in item A for taking five either-sex deer by firearms, muzzleloader, and archery, unless otherwise indicated, in the following areas:
- (1) deer permit areas 605, 642, 643, 645, 646, 647, 648, and 649 as described in part 6232.4700, subparts 95, 96, 97, 98, 99, 100, 101, 102, and 168;

- (5) portions of Vermillion Highlands Research, Recreation, and Wildlife Management Area in deer permit area 605 for no more than 20 permitted hunters selected during the 2025 special deer hunt drawing for the Vermillion Highlands Research, Recreation, and Wildlife Management Area special deer hunt 925 and special deer hunt 944.
- C. To participate in a special hunt under item D, hunters must obtain a free disease-hunt surplus permit from an electronic license system agent, the Department of Natural Resources License Center, or other authorized agents. Permits are available on a first-come, first-served basis starting Monday, December 1. Hunters must stay within any boundaries prescribed by the sponsoring organization, by maps provided by the sponsoring organization, or by posting. Hunters may select only one special hunt from the special hunts described in item D. During the special hunts under item D:
- (1) hunters may tag deer of either sex with disease management site tags or unused site tags from a 2025 landowner license, youth or adult firearm license, youth or adult archery license, or youth or adult muzzleloader license;
 - (2) bonus permit site tags and early antlerless permit site tags may only be used on antlerless deer; and
- (3) firearm hunters may use only legal shotguns loaded with single-slug shotgun shells, legal muzzle-loading long guns, legal handguns, or legal crossbows for taking deer.
- D. The following special hunt areas are open as provided in item C for taking five either-sex deer unless otherwise specified:

6232.1800 EITHER-SEX PERMITS AND PREFERENCE DRAWINGS.

[For text of subpart 1, see Minnesota Rules]

- Subp. 2. Preference drawings for either-sex permits in lottery deer permit areas and special hunt area permits.
- A. If the number of applications for either-sex permits in a <u>an antlerless</u> lottery deer permit area or for permits in a special hunt area exceeds the quota set forth in the annual hunting regulations <u>number of available permits</u>, a preference drawing will must be used to select permit holders.
- B. <u>Eligible</u> persons 12 years of age or older may enter the preference drawing by supplying their drivers license number, official state of Minnesota Identification Number, or 13-digit Firearms Safety Identification Number on the application, except that resident hunters under age 16 on the Saturday nearest November 6 may not apply for either-sex permits.
- <u>C.</u> All applicants who have reached their 18th birthday by the first Thursday following Labor Day must provide one of these three the identification numbers in item B to qualify to enter the preference drawing.
- <u>D.</u> Applicants under 18 years of age who do not submit one of these the identification numbers will be assigned a number and will be entered into the preference drawing.
- <u>E.</u> Applicants establish a preference rating based upon the number of times they have applied in previous years and have not obtained an either-sex or special hunt area permit.
- F. The An applicant's preference rating will increase increases each year the applicant applies unsuccessfully for either an either-sex or special hunt area permit.
 - (1) Persons applying for the first time have no preference.
 - (2) Applicants receiving either-sex or special hunt area permits lose their accrued preference. [For text of subpart 3, see Minnesota Rules]

6232.1970 TAKING DEER BY ARCHERY, FIREARMS, OR MUZZLELOADER <u>UNDER DURING</u> EARLY ANTLERLESS <u>PERMITS</u> SEASON.

- Subpart 1. Purchase. A person who purchases and presents a license valid for the archery, firearm, or muzzleloader season may purchase up to two three early antlerless permits. Early antlerless permits may be purchased for one-quarter the cost of a regular license from electronic license system agents, the Department of Natural Resources License Center, and other authorized agents.
- Subp. 2. Restrictions. For the early antlerless season, hunters must have an archery license, a firearms license valid for any season option, or a muzzleloader license. Up to two three early antlerless permits may be used to take antlerless deer by archery, firearms, or muzzleloader in deer permit areas as prescribed in part 6232.1750. At least oneearly antlerless permit must be purchased to participate in the season, item G. Bonus permits, a 2025 archery deer license, 2025 firearms deer license, 2025 landowner deer license, or 2025 muzzleloader deer license may be used to take antlerless deer. Deer must be taken with the equipment authorized by the license in possession when listed. The bag limit is three deer.
- Subp. 3. Disease management exemptions. A person who purchases a disease management permit under part 6232.1980 may participate in the early antierless season in deer permit areas 601, 605, 642, 643, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, and 661 as described in part 6232.4700.

6232.1980 TAKING DEER BY ANY WEAPON USING DISEASE MANAGEMENT PERMITS.

- Subpart 1. Purchase. An unlimited number of A disease management permits permit may be purchased by a personwho has purchased a valid deer license. Disease management permits may be purchased for \$1.50 from an electronic license system agents agent, the Department of Natural Resources License Center, and or other authorized agents.
- Subp. 2. **Restrictions.** Disease management permits are valid for taking either-sex deer only in deer area 101 asdescribed in part 6232.4700, subpart 1a the hunts described in part 6232.1600, subpart 9. During other deer hunts, disease management permits are valid for taking only antlerless deer in deer permit areas 601, 604, 605, 642, 643, 644, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, 655, and 661, as described in part 6232.4700. Disease management permits are also valid for taking antlerless deer in the Bemidji Regional Airport special hunt 986; city of Bemidji special hunt 985; city of Grand Rapids special archery, firearms, and muzzleloader deer hunts identified as special hunts 931, 946, and 995; and Lake Bemidji State Park special youth, firearms, and muzzleloader deer hunts identified as special hunts 954, 909, and 947.
- Subp. 3. Disease management hunts. For the special hunts described in part 6232.1600, subpart 9, disease management permits may be purchased without first purchasing an archery, firearms, or muzzleloader license. During other hunts, disease management permits may not be purchased without first purchasing an archery, firearms, or muzzleloader license.

6232.2100 MUZZLELOADER SEASON AND AREAS.

Subp. 3. Legal deer by muzzleloader. Antlerless deer and legal bucks may be taken by muzzleloader during the muzzleloader season in any managed or intensive either-sex, two-deer limit, three-deer limit, or five-deer limit deer permit area. - (2) copper-plated, nickel-plated, or zinc-plated steel shot or projectile; or
- (3) shot or projectile made of other nontoxic material approved by the director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 50, section 20.21(j).
- C. A person who carries a pistol and possesses a valid permit under Minnesota Statutes, section 624.714, may possess ammunition that does not meet the requirements of items A and B, but the ammunition may not be used for taking wild animals while participating in a special hunt in a scientific and natural area or in a state park.
- Subp. 5. 2025 muzzleloader special hunt areas. In addition to complying with the requirements of this part, hunters who are hunting under a muzzleloader special hunt permit must meet any requirements of the municipality, park, or area in which the special hunt occurs and those of any sponsoring organization. Hunt participants must stay within any boundaries prescribed by the sponsoring organization, by maps provided during a prehunt orientation, or by posting. Unless otherwise specified, hunters must possess a valid license to take deer by muzzleloader and a special hunt permit for the following special hunt areas authorized for the 2025 season:
- A. portions of McCarthy Beach State Park in St. Louis County are open November 29 to December 14 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is two deer. This is special hunt 929;
- B. Prairie Creek Woods Scientific and Natural Area and portions of Nerstrand Big Woods State Park in Rice County are open December 6 and 7 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 60 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is five deer. This is special hunt 930;
- C. portions of Rice Lake State Park in Dodge and Steele Counties are open December 6 and 7 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks in an earn-a-buck hunt. No more than 20 permits shall be issued. The bag limit is three deer. This is special hunt 932;

N. portions of the city of East Grand Forks are open October 9 to 11 for taking antlerless deer and legal bucks as described on individual permits. No more than four permits shall be issued, consisting of two antlerless permits and two either-sex permits. The bag limit is one deer. Options Resource Center for Independent Living is the sponsoring organization. This is special hunt 881.

6232.2560 YOUTH SPECIAL DEER SEASONS.

Subpart 1. Requirements. Youths participating in youth special deer seasons must obtain a license for taking deer by firearms, valid for any season option, by the beginning date of the special season. A youth special season participant may take one deer, which must be antlerless according to the bag limits under part 6232.1750. One bonus permit may be used in any deer permit area where bonus permits are valid during the regular firearms deer season. A legal buck taken during the youth special deer season applies to the statewide limit for legal bucks prescribed in part 6232.0300, subpart 8. An adult mentor age 18 or older authorized by the youth's parent or guardian must accompany the youth hunter hunters ages ten to 13 at all times during the hunt. The accompanying adult may not hunt, except when hunting in an early antlerless deer permit area. Party hunting is not allowed. The blaze orange or pink requirements in Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.071, paragraph (a), apply to all hunters and trappers, and all adult mentors of youth hunters, in the areas open to firearms deer hunting during the youth special seasons established in this part.

Subp. 2. **Open areas; date.** The Whitewater Game Refuge and all deer permit areas open to firearms deer hunting during the statewide A and B seasons, except Itasca State Park deer permit area 287, are open for the youth special deer season to youth who are at least ten years of age and under 18 years of age on the opening day of the statewide firearms A season. Dates for the 2025 youth special deer season are October 16 to 19.

The following conditions do not allow compliance with *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 97A.0451 to 97A.0459: Youth and adult special deer hunts are subject to adjustment on an annual basis based upon current biological and harvest data. Deer population and harvest data used for setting quotas and determining areas is gathered annually and analyzed each

winter. Adjustments to areas and quotas are based on annual and long-term population data as well as input from the public.

6232.2550 YOUTH AND ADULT SPECIAL DEER HUNTS.

[For text of subpart 1, see Minnesota Rules]

Subp. 2. Application requirements.

- A. Applications for youth special hunts must be made according to this part and according to application instructions provided by the commissioner. Applicants for youth firearms special hunts must be at least 12 years old and under age 16 by the beginning hunt date. Applicants for youth archery special hunts must be at least 12 years old and under age 18 by the beginning hunt date. Each person must apply at an electronic license system agent or the Department of Natural Resources License Center. Group applications are not allowed. If the number of eligible applicants exceeds the quota established by the commissioner, the commissioner shall conduct a drawing to determine eligible participants. Preference for the youth special hunt drawing is given to applicants based on the number of years they have correctly applied for a youth special hunt permit but have been unsuccessful. Upon issuance of a youth special hunt permit, all accumulated preference is lost. The application deadline is the Friday nearest August 17.
 - B. Adult learn-to-deer-hunt participants are selected on a first-come, first-served basis.

Subp. 3. Restrictions on taking.

- A. In addition to complying with this part, hunters who are hunting under a special deer hunt permit must meet all requirements of the municipality, park, or area in which the special hunt occurs and those of the sponsoring organization. Hunt participants must stay within any boundaries prescribed by the hunt sponsor, on maps provided during a prehunt orientation session, or by posting.
- B. While participating in a special hunt in a state park, individuals may possess only nontoxic ammunition on their person while taking wild animals, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 97A.015, subdivision 47. For purposes of this item, "nontoxic ammunition" means:
 - (1) steel shot or projectile;
 - (2) copper-plated, nickel-plated, or zinc-plated steel shot or projectile; or
- (3) shot or projectile made of other nontoxic material approved by the director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service under Code of Federal Regulations, title 50, section 20.21, paragraph (j).
- C. A person who carries a pistol and possesses a valid permit under Minnesota Statutes, section 624.714, may possess ammunition that does not meet the requirement of item B but must not use the ammunition to take wild animals.
- D. Participants in youth firearm special hunts that are located inside the shotgun use area described in Minnesota Statutes, section 97B.318, subdivision 1, may possess and use ammunition that does not meet the requirement of item B to take deer if they remove all portions, including entrails, of any deer harvested during the special hunt.
 - Subp. 4. Open areas. The following youth and adult special hunt areas are open by permit in 2025:
- A. Camp Ripley Military Refuge in Morrison County is open October 11 and 12 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by archery. No more than 100 permits shall be issued. The Minnesota State Archery Association is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- B. Portions of Afton State Park in Washington County are open November 8 and 9 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 30 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources,

Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.

- C. Portions of Banning State Park in Pine County are open November 1 and 2 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than six permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- D. Portions of Blue Mounds State Park in Rock County are open November 22 and 23 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.
- E. Portions of Buffalo River State Park in Clay County are open October 25 and 26 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 12 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- F. Portions of Camden State Park in Lyon County are open October 25 and 26 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 12 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- G. Portions of the city of Baxter in Crow Wing County are open October 16 through 19 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. The number of permits is unlimited. The city of Baxter is the sponsor. The bag limit is five.
- H. Portions of Kilen Woods State Park in Jackson County are open November 1 and 2 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than six permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- I. Portions of Lake Bemidji State Park in Beltrami County are open October 17 through 19 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 20 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- J. Portions of Lake Bronson State Park in Kittson County are open October 25 and 26 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.
- K. Portions of Lake Shetek State Park in Murray County are open November 1 and 2 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 15 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- L. Portions of Minneopa State Park in Blue Earth County are open November 15 and 16 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 12 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- M. Portions of St. Croix State Park in Pine County are open November 1 and 2 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 45 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.
- N. Portions of Savanna Portage State Park in Aitkin County are open October 25 and 26 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 25 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- O. Portions of Sibley State Park in Kandiyohi County are open October 25 and 26 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.
- P. Portions of Zippel Bay State Park in Lake of the Woods County are open October 17 through 19 for youth taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 20 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is two.
- Q. Portions of St. Croix State Park in Pine County are open November 1 and 2 for adult learn-to-deer-hunt participants taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 14 permits shall be issued. The Department

of Natural Resources, Division of Fish and Wildlife, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.

- R. Portions of Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge in Carver and Scott Counties are open October 25 and 26 for adult learn-to-deer-hunt participants taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fish and Wildlife, and the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge are the sponsors. The bag limit is one.
- S. Portions of Lake Bemidji State Park in Beltrami County are open October 17 through 19 for adult learn-to-deer-hunt participants taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Parks and Trails, is the sponsor. The bag limit is one.
- T. Portions of Osprey Wilds Environmental Learning Center in Pine County are open October 24 through 26 for adult learn-to-hunt participants taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than 12 permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fish and Wildlife, and the Osprey Wilds Environmental Learning Center are the sponsors. The bag limit is one.
- U. Portions of Eagle Bluff Environmental Learning Center in Fillmore and Winona Counties are open December 12 through 14 for adult learn-to-hunt participants taking antlerless deer and legal bucks by firearms. No more than ten permits shall be issued. The Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fish and Wildlife, and the Eagle Bluff Environmental Learning Center are the sponsors. The bag limit is one.

EFFECTIVE PERIOD. The expedited emergency amendments to Minnesota Rules, part 6232.2550, expire December 31, 2025. After the expedited emergency amendments expire, the permanent rules again take effect, subject to any permanent rule amendments that have been adopted in the interim.

Exempt Rules

Exempt rules are excluded from the normal rulemaking procedures (Minnesota Statutes §§ 14.386 and 14.388). They are most often of two kinds. One kind is specifically exempted by the Legislature from rulemaking procedures, but approved for form by the Revisor of Statutes, reviewed for legality by the Office of Administrative Hearings, and then published in the State Register. These exempt rules are effective for two years only.

The second kind of exempt rule is one adopted where an agency for good cause finds that the rulemaking provisions of *Minnesota Statutes*, Chapter 14 are unnecessary, impracticable, or contrary to the public interest. This exemption can be used only where the rules:

- (1) address a serious and immediate threat to the public health, safety, or welfare, or
- (2) comply with a court order or a requirement in federal law in a manner that does not allow for compliance with Minnesota Statutes Sections 14.14-14.28, or
 - (3) incorporate specific changes set forth in applicable statutes when no interpretation of law is required, or
 - (4) make changes that do not alter the sense, meaning, or effect of the rules.

These exempt rules are also reviewed for form by the Revisor of Statutes, for legality by the Office of Administrative Hearings and then published in the State Register. In addition, the Office of Administrative Hearings must determine whether the agency has provided adequate justification for the use of this exemption. Rules adopted under clauses (1) or (2) above are effective for two years only. The Legislature may also exempt an agency from the normal rulemaking procedures and establish other procedural and substantive requirements unique to that exemption.

Adoption of Rules Relating to Solid Waste, Minnesota Rules, 7035.2655, (Terminating Postclosure Care of Solid Waste Disposal Facilities Rule), Revisor's ID Number R-4878, OAH Docket Number 25-9003-40430

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) has complied with all notice and procedural requirements in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 14, Minnesota Rules, chapter 1400, and other applicable law.
- The Office of Administrative Hearings received 1 written comment on the rules.
- By Laws of Minnesota 2024, chapter 116, article 2, section 30(b), the Minnesota Legislature requires the Commissioner of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to make the following rule changes:
 - a. The commissioner of the Pollution Control Agency must amend rules related to solid waste disposal facilities to require the commissioner's approval to terminate the postclosure care period.
- The use of the good cause exempt rulemaking process for this rule is authorized by Laws of Minnesota 2024, chapter 116, article 2, sections 30(b). According to Minnesota Statutes, section 14.388, subdivision 1, clause (3), these changes incorporate specific changes stated in applicable statutes that require no interpretation of law.
- The rules are needed and reasonable.

7035.2655 POSTCLOSURE CARE AND USE OF PROPERTY.

Subpart 1. **Postclosure care requirements.** Postclosure care requirements apply to solid waste disposal facilities and are as follows:

A. Postclosure care must continue for at least 20 years after the date of completing closure. <u>Terminating the postclosure care period requires approval from the commissioner based on the requirements of item B.</u>

Executive Orders

The governor has the authority to issue written statements or orders, called Executive Orders, as well as Emergency Executive Orders. The governor's authority is specified in the Constitution of the State of Minnesota, Article V, and in *Minnesota Statutes* § 4.035. Emergency Executive Orders, for protection from an imminent threat to health and safety, become effective immediately, are filed with the secretary of state, and published in the *State Register* as soon as possible after they are issued. Other Executive Orders become effective 15 days after publication in the *State Register* and filing with the secretary of state. Unless otherwise specified, an executive order expires 90 days after the date the governor who issued the order vacates office.

Office of the Governor

Emergency Executive Order 25-08: Providing Assistance to the City of St. Paul

I, Tim Walz, Governor of the State of Minnesota, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and applicable statutes, issue the following executive order:

On Friday, July 25, 2025, the City of St. Paul experienced a cyberattack that targeted critical systems and digital services. This cyberattack persisted through the weekend, causing significant disruptions and impairing St. Paul's ability to provide vital services.

St. Paul officials have been working around the clock since discovering the cyberattack, closely coordinating with Minnesota Information Technology Services and an external cybersecurity vendor. Unfortunately, the scale and complexity of this incident exceeded both internal and commercial response capabilities. As a result, St. Paul has requested cyber protection support from the Minnesota National Guard to help address this incident and make sure that vital municipal services continue without interruption.

For these reasons, I order as follows

Executive Orders =

- The Adjutant General is authorized to order to state active duty the personnel, equipment, facilities, and resources needed to provide assistance throughout Minnesota.
- The Adjutant General is authorized to procure the goods and services needed to accomplish the mission.
- The costs of this assistance shall be paid from the general fund as allowed by Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 192.52.

This Executive Order is effective immediately under Minnesota Statutes 2024, section 4.035, subd. 2, and remains in effect until the emergency conditions caused by the cyberattack subside or until it is rescinded by proper authority, whichever occurs first.

A determination that any provision of this Executive Order is invalid will not affect the enforceability of any other provision of this Executive Order. Rather, the invalid provision will be modified to the extent necessary so that it is enforceable.

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) is accepting comments on the current state emergency quarantine for emerald ash borer, Agrilus planipennis (Fairemaire), for the following areas:

(A) The southeastern portion of Itasca County:

- a. Southern border: the border with Aitkin County
- b. Western border: the Cass County border until that border meets State Highway 6, then following State Highway 6 north, west and north again until the junction with County Road 19
- c. Northern border: County Road 19 east to State Highway 38, State Highway 38 south to Clearwater Road, Clearwater Road east to Wabana Road, Wabana Road east to Scenic Drive, Scenic Drive east to County Road 57, County Road 57 east to County Road 8, County Road 8 east to State Highway 65, State Highway 65 south to US Highway 169, US Highway 169 east to the St Louis County border
- d. Eastern border: the border with St Louis County

Request for Proposals for Minnesota Statewide Solar on Public Buildings Program

The Minnesota Department of Commerce seeks proposals for the Minnesota Statewide Solar on Public Buildings Program.

In 2023 the Minnesota Legislature established the Solar on Public Buildings (SPB) Grant Program (*Minn. Stat. §* 216C.377). The purpose of this program is to provide grants to stimulate the installation of solar energy systems on or adjacent to public buildings. The Department of Commerce will administer \$14.5M in grants to local governments and Tribal Nations statewide in any utility service territory. This is the first statewide round of funding requests.

Eligible applicants for this grant are local units of government owning and operating public buildings. This includes a county, city, town, or other local government jurisdiction, federally recognized Indian Tribes in Minnesota, excluding school districts eligible to receive financial assistance under the Solar for Schools program (*Minn. Stat. § 216C.375*) (*Minn. Stat. § 216C.377*, subd. 1).

Grants will be awarded for 70% of the project costs for a solar array that is built on or adjacent to a public building and is the lesser of 40kW system capacity or 120% of the building's annual energy consumption. Selected proposals are required to file for the 48E Clean Electricity Investment Tax Credit via Direct Pay for project costs not covered by the MN Commerce grant.

A Request for Proposals (RFP) is available for download on the Department's RFP website at *Request for Proposals* (RFP) / Minnesota Department of Commerce - Business (mn.gov).

All responses to this RFP need to be submitted through a single responder user account via the grant portal, see the RFP for details. Applications will be open continuously until November 14, 2025, or notification from the Department that all funds have been committed, whichever occurs first. The department anticipates responding to applicants within two weeks of submittal. Instructions and links for submitting bids are detailed in the RFP and attachments.

The Minnesota Lottery finds sponsorship opportunities in two ways. First, the Minnesota Lottery marketing staff locates and approaches potential sponsors to negotiate directly. Second, the Minnesota Lottery accepts incoming potential sponsors through this proposal process. Employing both strategies allows the Minnesota Lottery to find the best sponsorship opportunities, including opportunities that are not already known by staff. Both strategies are evaluated using the same criteria.

If you feel your organization, event, sports team, or other opportunity is a good fit for the Minnesota Lottery to sponsor, we encourage you to prepare and submit a proposal.

Proposal Content

A sponsorship proposal presented to the Lottery should meet the following three criteria:

- 1. Maximize Lottery Visibility the event, sports team, or venue sponsorship proposal should draw a large number of attendees (typically 20,000 or more) whose demographics match the Lottery's target audience. The Lottery is interested in effectively delivering its message of fun and entertainment to Minnesota adults, ages 25-64, with a household income of \$75,000+ and an educational background of some college or higher. The Lottery does not market to those under the age of 18, and events with large numbers of children present are generally not accepted. Attendance numbers, on-site signage availability, sales and engagement opportunities, and media exposure are critical components that will be evaluated in the proposal. List and define all assets, value, and benefits that the Lottery would receive as part of the sponsorship, such as PR inclusions, social media posts, prize support, promotional activities, and signage.
- 2. Enhance Lottery Image the event, sports team, or venue should be a reputable, safe, and well-run event and organization that enhances the Lottery's brand. The Lottery's presence should fit well within the lineup of other sponsors and participants. The Lottery is interested in sponsorships that can promote Lottery products, either via on-site sales from a Lottery booth, from sales-generating promotions with Lottery retailers, or from joint programs with the sponsor's media or other sponsorship partners.
- 3. Provide Promotional Extensions the event, sports team, or venue proposal should offer exciting, value-added ways to interact with attendees and have opportunities to motivate attendees, listeners, and viewers to participate in and purchase Lottery games. The proposal must include staffing support, or other considerations to help the Lottery implement any appropriate promotional extension ideas.
