Veterans in Minnesota

About 411,000 military veterans live in Minnesota, according to the 2005-2007 American Community Survey. Eleven percent of Minnesotans ages 18 or older are veterans. This figure includes those who served only during peacetime as well as those who saw combat.

The number of veterans has fallen by 12 percent since 2000, reflecting mortality among those who served in World War II and Korea. The 1990 census found about 152,000 Minnesotans who served in the Second World War. This number fell to 96,000 in 2000 and 58,000 in the 2005-2007 American Community Survey. The number of Korean War veterans has declined 20 percent since 2000.

As of 2005-2007, about 144,000 Minnesotans were veterans of the Vietnam conflict. This is now the largest conflict-era population. Mortality is also taking a toll on the Vietnam generation; the number of Vietnam veterans dropped 5 percent since 2000.

The decline in the number of veterans of wars of the 1940s through the 1970s has been offset somewhat by the growth in the numbers from more recent conflicts in the Gulf Wars and Afghanistan. About 54,000 Minnesotans are veterans with service after 1990. About 21,000 served after September, 2001.

Ninety-five percent of veterans are men. Older men are much more likely to be veterans than are younger men. More than two-thirds of men 75 or older are veterans, compared to only 12 percent of those ages 35 to 54 and 5 percent of those ages 18 to 34. These differences reflect historical factors such as the huge scale of World War II and the abolition of the draft after the Vietnam conflict.

Although relatively few women have served in the Armed Forces, they make up a substantial proportion of younger veterans. About 15 percent of veterans in the 18-to-34-year-old age group are women, compared to only 2 percent of those ages 65 to 74.

Veterans live in all parts of Minnesota. Areas with younger populations, college campuses and large numbers of immigrant tend to have lower proportions of veterans. Among counties with 20,000 or more population, the highest percentages of veterans are found in Cass, Crow Wing and Mower counties. The lowest proportions are in Nicollet, Scott and Rice counties.

Comparing socioeconomic characteristics of veterans and nonveterans is challenging because differences often reflect differences in age and gender rather than the differences between veterans and nonveterans. For example, among people over age 65 nonveterans are more likely to be poor than veterans, but nonveterans are also more likely to be women, and older women have higher poverty rates than older men.

The American Public Use Microdata make it possible to contrast veterans and nonveterans controlling for age and gender. Because there are few female veterans in the sample, this report compares male veterans and nonveterans.

Male veterans and nonveterans have similar incomes, poverty rates and rates of disability. On other indicators there are disparities between the two groups. Differences in educational attainment are striking. In most age groups, male veterans are more likely to be high school graduates than nonveterans, but are less likely to be college graduates. Although veterans generally match nonveterans in attending college, they are less likely to receive a degree.

Male veterans are also more likely to be employed by government than are nonveterans. Sixteen percent of veterans work for local, state or federal government, compared to nine percent of nonveterans.

Elderly veterans are less likely than nonveterans to be living in nursing homes or other institutions. Among men ages 85 or older, 24 percent of nonveterans resided in institutions, much higher than the 13 percent figure for veterans.
