



## The State Examination

**For individuals taking the LMFT State Examination in or after September 2016: A revision to Administrative Rule 5300 was adopted August 1, 2016. Your LMFT State Examination will include Minnesota Rule 5300, as it now reads after August 1, 2016. Although substantive changes are minor, you are directed to study Minnesota Rule 5300 as found on the Board’s website and the State of MN’s website. If you have questions, please contact the Board.**

The Board of Marriage and Family Therapy’s State Examination is the final step in the licensure process. This exam can be taken only after all academic requirements are completed, the supervised post degree clinical experience is completed, the national written examination in marital and family therapy is passed, and the application for state licensure is approved by the Board’s Application Committee. Those who seek licensure by reciprocity must also pass this examination.

Once the application for state licensure has been approved, an applicant will be notified as to the scheduling of the State examination. The examination is conducted by a panel of Board members each month and lasts about forty-five minutes. Those who pass this examination will leave with license in hand after paying a pro-rated annual license fee.

The State examination shall cover:

- A. The applicant’s knowledge of the laws governing marriage and family therapists.
- B. The applicant’s knowledge of the code of ethics.
- C. The applicant’s awareness of the responsibilities to the Board and to the public.
- D. Other practice-related areas. The following list contains some of the statutes and rules related to the practice of marriage and family therapy in Minnesota. However, this list is *not* intended to be an exhaustive list of the laws and the rules related to the practice of marriage and family therapy in Minnesota.
