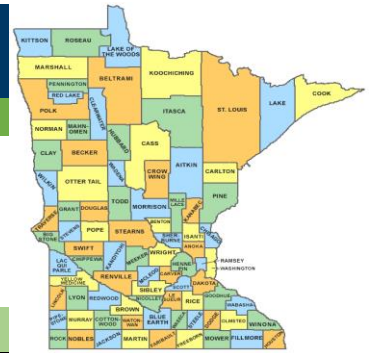


COUNTY PROFILE

Jackson Co.

Jackson Co. is a part of Economic Development Region 8, which is located in the Southwest Planning Region.



POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

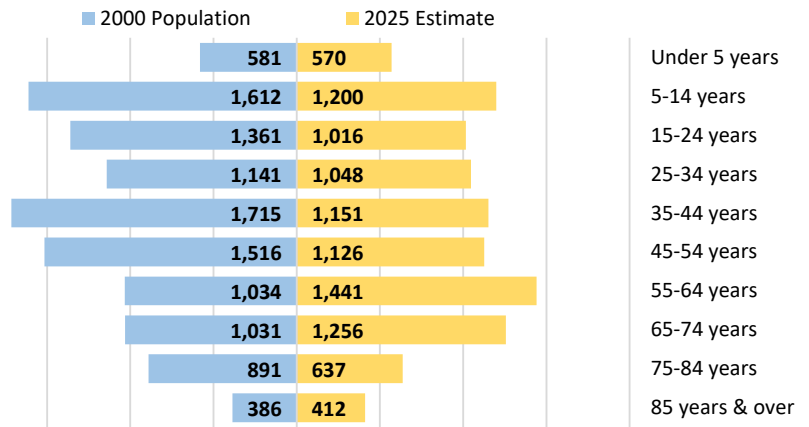

Jackson Co. is the 67th largest of the 87 counties in the state. Its population decreased so far this decade, ranking as the 64th fastest growing in the state from 2020 to 2025. Jackson Co.'s population has an older median age than the state and a larger percentage of people aged 65 years and older. The population is aging, especially as the Baby Boom generation moves through the population pyramid (see Figure 1).

Jackson Co. suffered a negative natural increase - more deaths than births from 2020 to 2025, but also experienced net out-migration - meaning more people moved out than moved in. Despite suffering domestic out-migration, Jackson Co. welcomed net international in-migration - gaining new Minnesotans from foreign countries (see Table 2).

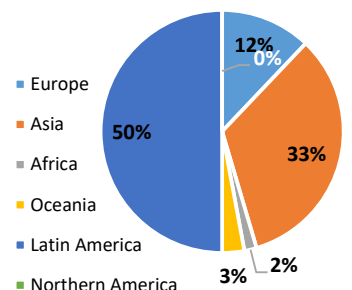

Figure 3. Population by Race, 2024

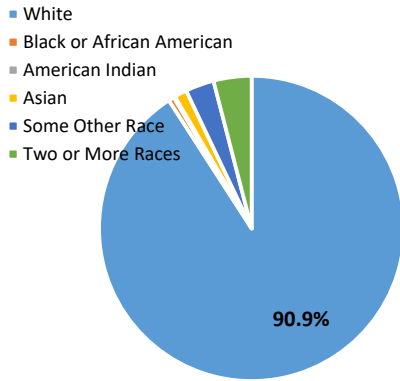

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

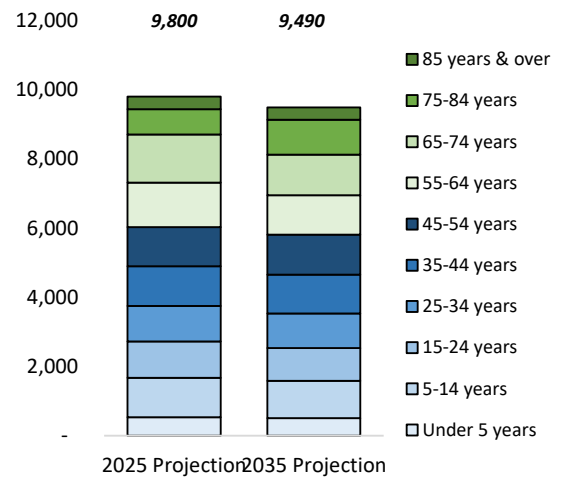

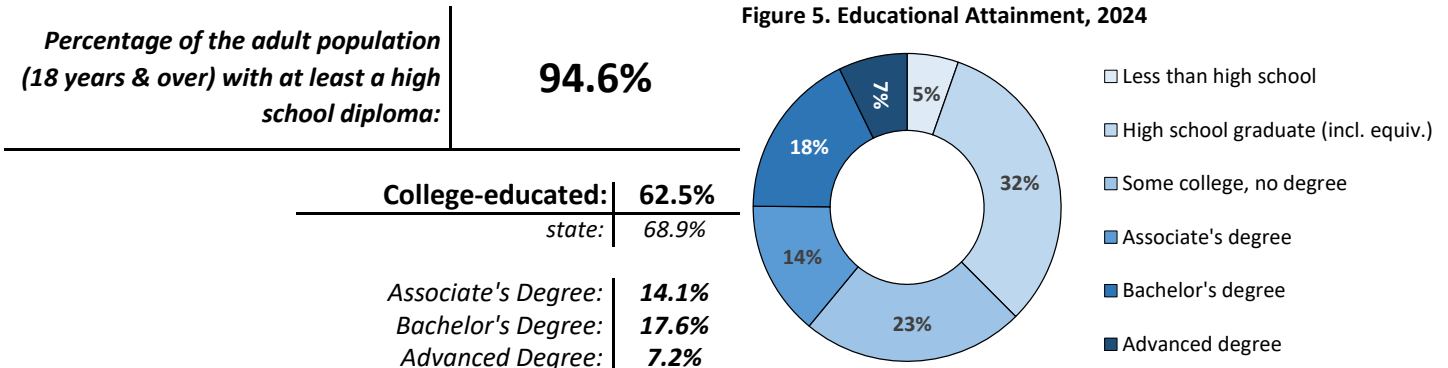
Figure 4. Projections by Age Group, 2025-2035

According to the Minnesota State Demographic Center, Jackson Co.'s population is expected to decline from 2025 to 2035, with a rate of change that is slower than the projected statewide growth rate (3.7%). Despite the decline, the number of people aged 65 years and older is expected to increase over the next decade (see Figure 4 and Table 5).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Jackson Co. has a higher percentage of adults (18 years & over) with at least a high school diploma than the state (93.3%), and a lower percentage of people with at least some college experience. Jackson Co. also has a higher percentage of people with an Associate's degree and a lower percentage of people with a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Figure 5. Educational Attainment, 2024



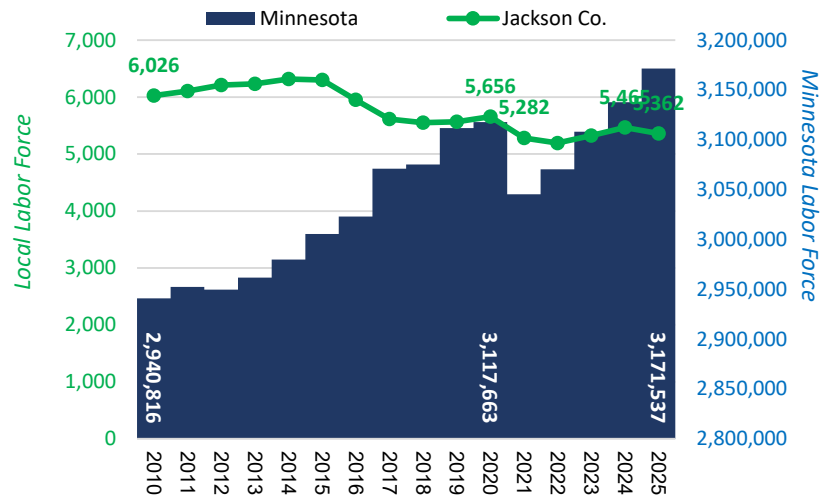

LABOR FORCE TRENDS

At 4.1%, Jackson Co. had a lower unemployment rate than the state in 2025. Jackson Co.'s unemployment rate declined compared to the 5.4% pandemic rate posted in 2020. The number of unemployed workers actively seeking work in Jackson Co. increased over the past year, and is down compared to 2020.

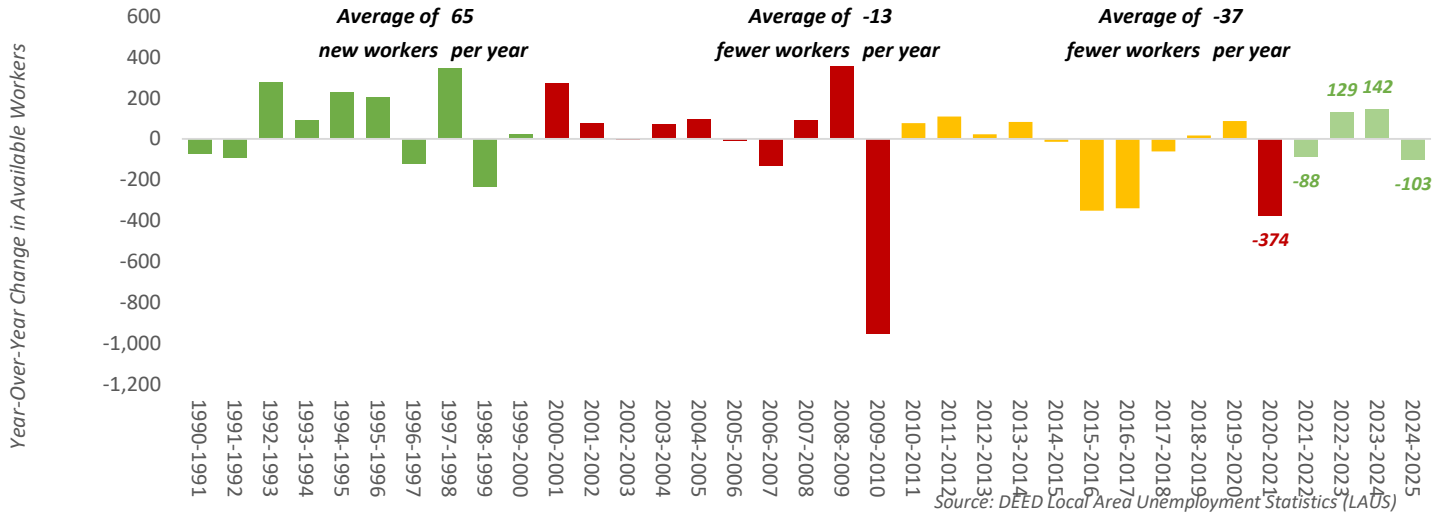
Figure 6. Annual Labor Force Estimates

Labor force growth has slowed in recent years. After experiencing a net gain of workers each year from 1990 to 2000, Jackson Co. averaged an annual loss of fewer workers from 2000 to 2010, and most recently a loss of fewer workers since 2010 (see Figure 7). Moving forward, Jackson Co. is expected to see a labor force decline from 2025 to 2035 (see Table 6).

The labor market had grown extremely tight in recent years, with less than 1 jobseeker per vacancy until the pandemic recession. In 2024, job vacancies in Southwest returned to pre-pandemic levels and the number of unemployed workers was trending upward, but employers were still seeing challenges finding enough workers for open jobs (see Figure 8).

LABOR FORCE CHARACTERISTICS

Jackson Co. had a lower labor force participation rate than the state. The labor force in Jackson Co. is less racially diverse than the state (where 78.7% of workers are white alone), but is becoming more diverse over time.

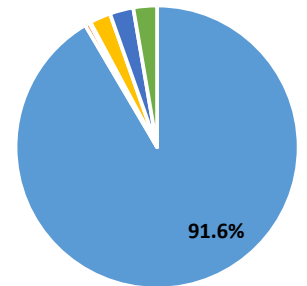

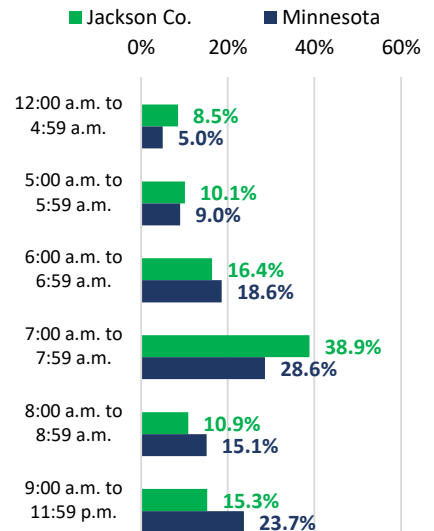

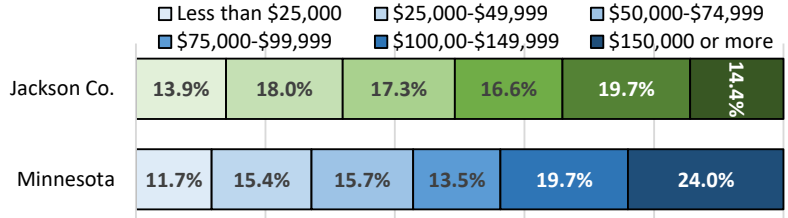
INCOMES, COST OF LIVING, & HOUSING

The cost of living has increased in recent years with expenses up in many areas. Jackson Co. had a lower cost of living than the state, with a required hourly wage of \$14.76 for a single person living alone to meet a basic needs cost of living, and an hourly wage requirement of \$18.77 for a typical family with 2 adults and 1 child (see Table 9).

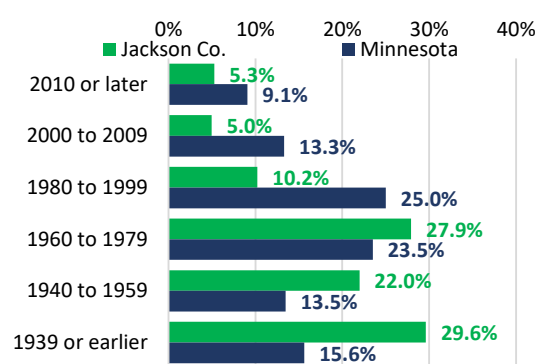

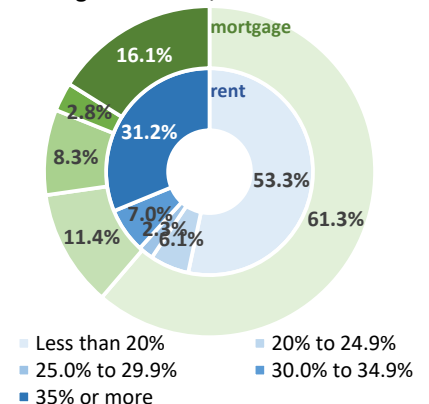

OCCUPATIONS

At \$22.79 in 2025, wages were lower in Region 8 than the state. Overall, Region 8 had the 2nd lowest median hourly wage level of the 13 economic development regions in the state. Wages were highest for management occupations (\$47.64) and lowest for food preparation and serving related jobs (\$14.57) (see Table 11).

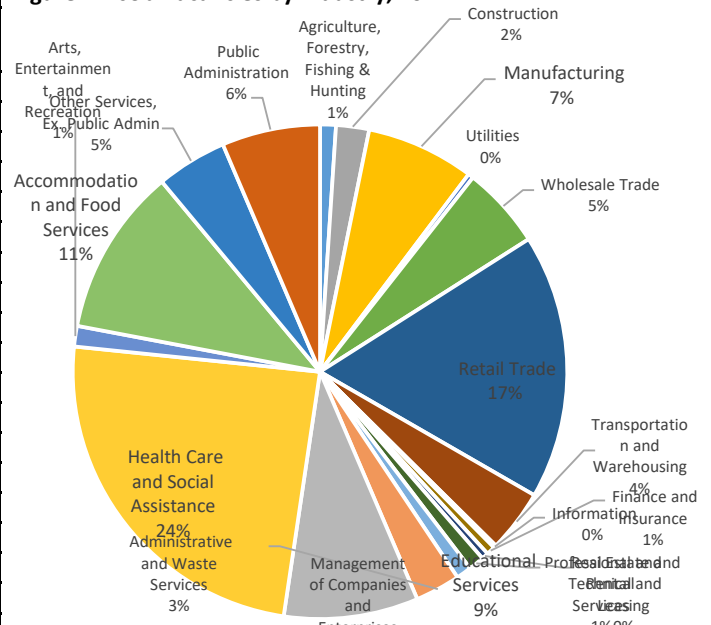
JOB VACANCY SURVEY

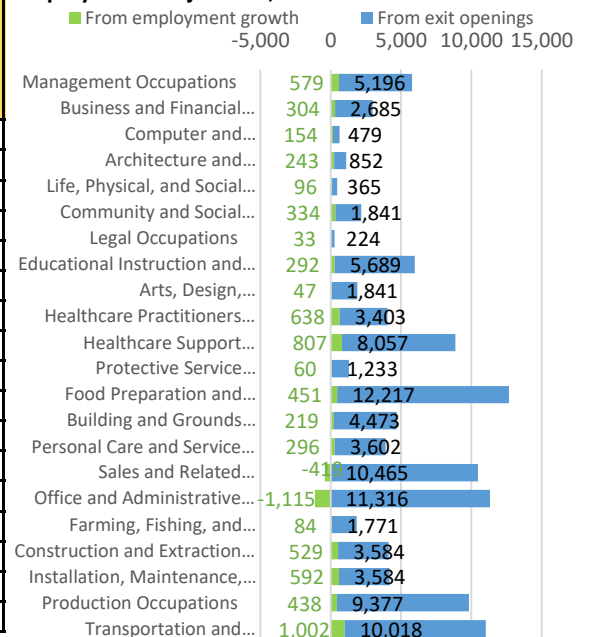

ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

After losing jobs over the past year, Jackson Co. had the 59th largest economy of the 87 counties in the state. Jackson Co. was the 81st fastest growing in the past year and the 76th fastest growing since 2020. From 2020 to 2025, employment in Jackson Co. is still down from the pandemic recession.

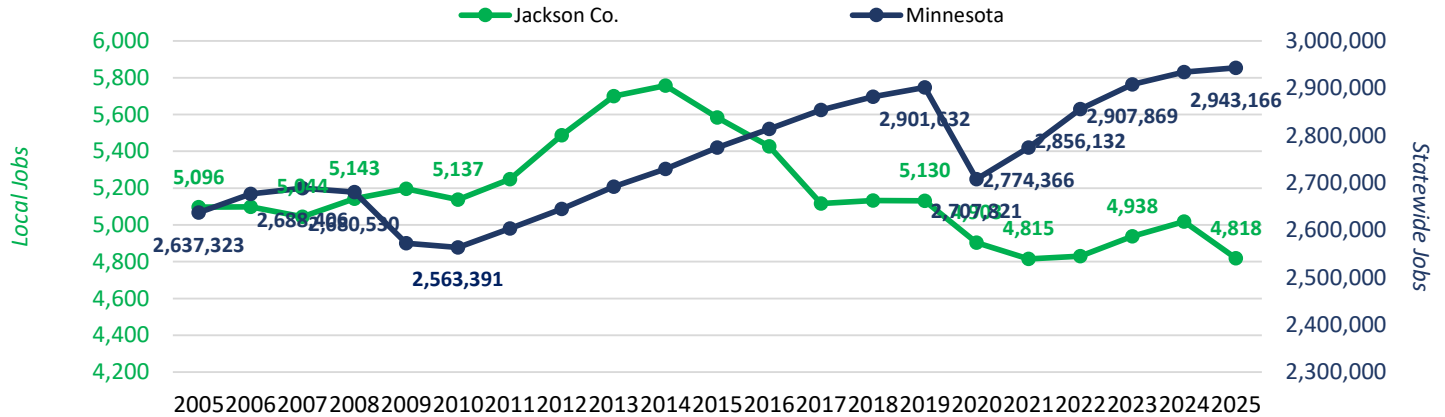

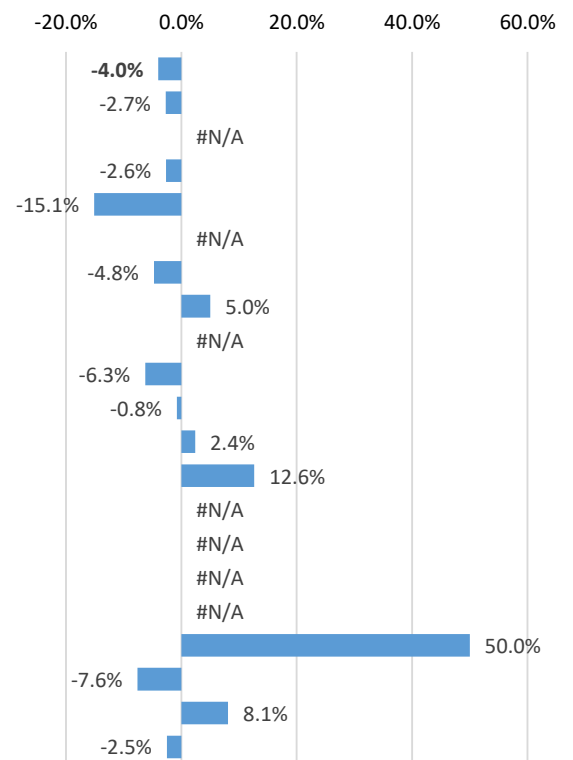
Figure 16. Industry Employment Statistics, 2005-2025
