Proclamation

- WHEREAS: In 1926, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard Scholar, established the observance of African American History, with the view to revealing the contributions, achievements, and involvement of African American people in the development of our American Democracy; and
- WHEREAS: The history of some of us is the history of all of us, and our history is what shapes us as a state and as a nation; and
- WHEREAS: We must acknowledge and pay tribute to the generations of our citizens who struggled with adversity, risked their lives for justice, fought a fight that at times seemed impossible to win, and persevered, and continue to fight for equality and the American Dream; and
- WHEREAS: We see African Americans engaged throughout our society, as friends and neighbors, scholars, teachers, business people, community leaders, and contributors to our Minnesota quality of life; and
- WHEREAS: The month of February gives us a chance to honor the many heroes who are unknown and unnamed, who have contributed to the struggle for freedom and justice for all; and
- WHEREAS: Black History Month encourages all Minnesotans to come together, reflect on our collective past, and reveal its impact on present conditions; and
- WHEREAS: As a state, we can continue to work together to guarantee equal opportunity for all citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MARK DAYTON, Governor of Minnesota, do hereby proclaim the month of February 2014, as:

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

in the State of Minnesota.
