- (1) The first Minnesota Territorial Supreme Court was established in 1849. Organic Act, ch. 121, § 9, 9 Stat. 403, 406 (1849). It consisted of a chief justice and two associate justices, who held 4-year terms. *Id.*
- (2) When Minnesota became a state in 1858, it brought with it an elected three-member supreme court. The Constitution provided for a court consisting of one chief justice and two associate justices. Minn. Const. of 1857, art. VI, § 2. The justices were to hold 7-year terms. *Id.* § 3.

- (3) The legislature expanded the size of the court from three to five members in 1881. Act of Mar. 7, 1881, ch. 141, 1881 Minn. Laws 184. In 1883 the length of term was reduced to 6 years by constitutional amendment. Act of Mar. 1, 1883, ch. 3, § 1, 1883 Minn. Laws 7, 8.
- (4) In 1913, the legislature authorized the appointment of two supreme court commissioners. Except for the method of appointment, the commissioners had the same qualifications, duties, tenure, and salary as justices. The act specified that the offices would be abolished when the court was increased from 5 to 7 justices. Act of Mar. 12, 1913, ch. 62, 1913 Minn. Laws 53-54.

- (5) In 1930, Minnesota voters amended the constitution to increase the court from five to seven members. Act of Mar. 9, 1929, ch. 430, § 1, 1929 Minn. Laws 676, 676-77.
- (6) In 1972, the constitution was amended to expand the membership of the court from seven to nine. Minn. Const. art. VI, § 2 (“The supreme court consists of one chief judge and not less than six nor more than eight associate judges as the legislature may establish.”).

- (7) In 1982 the legislature placed on the ballot a constitutional amendment authorizing the creation of an intermediate court of appeals. Act of Mar. 22, 1982, ch. 501, 1982 Minn. Laws 569. The reduction in the membership of the supreme court from nine to seven occurred by attrition of the first two members to retire.

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
