**Fellow Minnesotans:**

The Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) makes a positive difference and maximizes quality of life for the more than 286,000 Veterans who call our state home.

With the tremendous progress we are making on our mission — serving Minnesota Veterans, their dependents and survivors — we have some exciting successes to report for the 2025 fiscal year (FY 2025).

A STEP CLOSER TO ENDING VETERAN HOMELESSNESS

In October 2024, Hennepin County Continuum of Care (CoC) leaders announced an effective end to Veteran homelessness. This milestone leaves only the Ramsey County CoC to reach the same goal for Minnesota to effectively end Veteran homelessness.

This does not mean that one of our Veterans may never experience homelessness. Rather, improvements to our response system means that we can immediately address the need so that when a Veteran is experiencing homelessness, it is a rare, brief and singular event.

STATE FUNDING CEMENTS ONGOING COMMITMENT TO VETERANS

In 2025, the Minnesota Legislature passed an Omnibus Veterans Bill for the fourth consecutive session. This win positions MDVA to not only sustain the programs and services that benefit Veterans, but to elevate them.

MDVA is exceptionally grateful for the ongoing investment in Minnesota’s heroes.

Thank you to Governor Tim Walz, Lieutenant Governor Peggy Flanagan and our State Legislators.

INCREASING EXCELLENCE IN VETERAN AFFAIRS

While these successes are worthy of celebration, MDVA is committed to doing even more for Minnesota Veterans. Here are MDVA priorities to provide the best service to those who have served:

- Expanding care to accommodate more Residents in our Veterans Homes across the state.
- Continuing support of our Veterans and families in crisis with the launch of a comprehensive suicide prevention awareness program.
- Facilitating the work of the Secret War in Laos Special Guerilla Unit Taskforce as they identify benefits to award our Southeast Asian allies who are also Minnesota residents and who supported the United States during the Vietnam War.

Together, let us continue raising the bar in service of Minnesota Veterans.

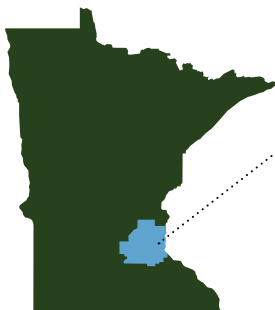

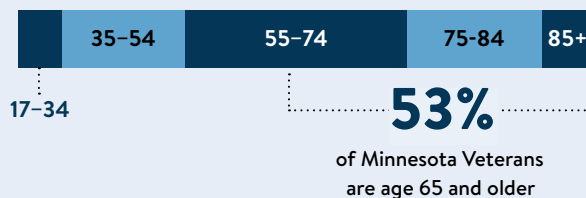

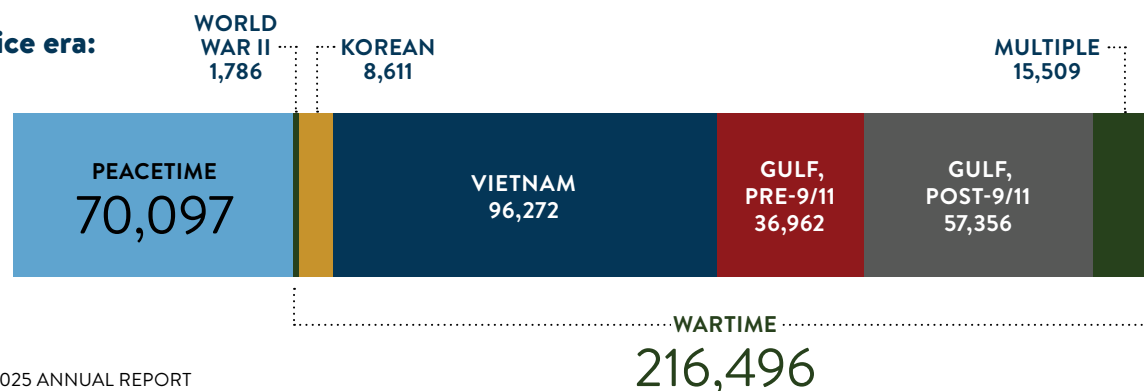

Service: A family commitment

Having served as a firefighter in the Air Force for seven years, including deployment to Iraq, Veteran Jessica Cook approaches family life with resilience and a sense of purpose.

Jessica’s spouse, Air Force Master Sergeant Jeffrey Cook, is an instructor for the Reserve Officers’ Training Corps (ROTC) program at the University of Minnesota Duluth. When duty to country requires Jeffrey to be away from home, Jessica’s own service has enabled her to put the mission first, adapt quickly to change and find strength.

Whether supporting the effort to establish Women Veterans Recognition Day in Minnesota or building awareness of available benefits for Veterans and their families, Jessica has made it her civilian duty to create and foster community.

Striving to end Veteran homelessness

Minnesota continues to invest in a Veteran homelessness response system that is proving successful.

Following a decade of focused attention, Minnesota is close to effectively ending Veteran homelessness across the state with the Hennepin County Continuum of Care, the ninth of 10 regions in the state, reaching “functional zero” in October 2024.

“Functional zero” means that a community has measurably solved Veteran homelessness and when it does occur, it is rare, brief and non-recurring. MDVA continues to work to bring all regions to functional zero, maintain that status and continue to improve and invest in Veteran needs.

“At a time when homelessness is rising across the country, we’ve turned the tide. Since February 2023, across the state, Veteran homelessness has been reduced by 43% and chronic Veteran homelessness by 92%. And in Hennepin County specifically, Veteran homelessness has been reduced by 44% and chronic Veteran homelessness has been reduced by an astonishing 84%. Each of these numbers represents a Veteran who now has a home,” says Commissioner Lindsay.

Throughout FY 2025

Residents moved into Ultima House, a new eight-unit apartment building that opened in May 2024. It is the first supportive housing option for Veterans experiencing homelessness in the Rochester area. Ultima House was purchased and is operated by Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans (MACV) with financial support from MDVA.

Continued efforts to reduce the number of Veterans who experience homelessness

The Minnesota Homeless Veteran Registry connects Veterans who are experiencing homelessness with housing and services in their community.

The Veteran Temporary Emergency Housing Assistance Program (VTEMP) reimburses community service providers for covering the cost of temporary hotel rooms or non-congregate temporary units for Veterans and members of their households who are actively experiencing homelessness — especially in areas of Minnesota with little or no access to temporary or emergency housing. The success rate for VTEMP was 77%.

MDVA Programs

- **The Minnesota Veterans Entering Stable Tenancy (MNVEST) Program** provides housing subsidies for Veterans experiencing homelessness, or in danger of experiencing homelessness, and are not eligible for federal housing subsidies.
- **SOAR** (SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and Recovery) works with key organizations and community groups to provide Minnesota's at-risk Veterans and those experiencing homelessness with expanded access to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits.
- **The Homes for Veterans Property Management Incentive Program** offers property managers the support, financial incentive and risk protection for providing a home to a Veteran.

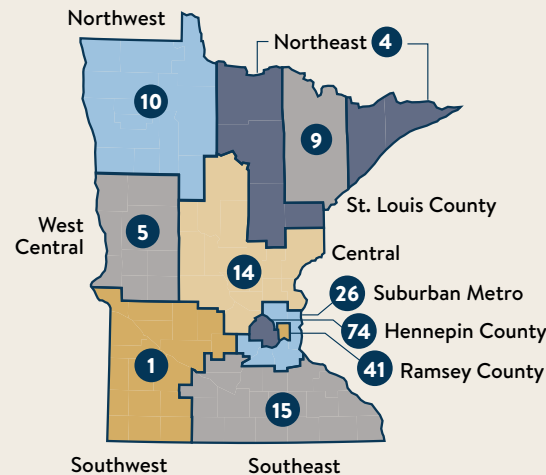

Partnerships help prevent or resolve housing crises

MDVA has a long history of partnering with MACV to provide supportive housing options to Veterans. Since 2022, this partnership has helped 203 Minnesota Veterans secure permanent housing.

The Veterans Education and Occupational Resources team focuses on three core areas:

- Education benefits for Veterans and eligible family members.
- The quality and integrity of education and training programs for Veterans in Minnesota.
- Protection of Veteran rights while working for public employers.

Minnesota GI Bill

Different than the federal GI Bill®, the Minnesota GI Bill can reimburse out-of-pocket costs for Veterans pursuing professional exams, licenses and certifications. Additionally, the Minnesota GI Bill provides financial assistance for necessary living expenses while a Veteran is training for a career or trade.

Education benefits

Education Regional Coordinators provide one-on-one assistance to answer questions about benefits and resources available to help Veterans earn a degree, license, certification or on-the-job training. Popular education benefits include the Minnesota GI Bill and the 48 Veterans Resource Centers (VRC) on college campuses across Minnesota.

Students can visit on-campus VRCs to connect with peers and learn about benefits, scholarships, support resources and more. VRCs welcome more than 40,000 visitors annually.

159 CASES OF VETERAN RIGHTS IN PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT

The Minnesota Veterans Preference Act grants most Veterans a limited preference over non-Veteran candidates for hiring and promotion with public employers. The Veterans Education and Occupational Resources team ensures Veteran rights are upheld in accordance with the law and managed 159 cases regarding Veteran preference.

Program quality

The Minnesota State Approving Agency (SAA) ensures the quality and financial integrity of educational and training programs when GI Bill benefits are used. The SAA evaluates facilities and conducts ongoing surveys to ensure compliance.

Recognizing the unique needs of women Veterans

Women Veterans face unique challenges including reproductive healthcare, military sexual trauma and the need for individualized support. MDVA is dedicated to ensuring equitable support for women Veterans by employing a dedicated female coordinator and claims representative — addressing longstanding gaps in care and access.

MDVA increased efforts to identify and address resource gaps affecting women Veterans through an extensive survey and engages directly with women at events such as:

- VA Women Veterans Community Support Forum
- McLeod County Women Veterans Event
- Olmsted County Women Veterans Gala
- Women Veterans Recognition Day at Fort Snelling
- Regular meetings of the Women Veteran Community Advisory Board for the future Minneapolis VA Medical Center Women Veteran Clinic

Close collaboration with Minnesota Veterans Homes

The Claims and Field Operations teams began closely collaborating with the Minnesota Veterans Homes to ensure Residents are maximizing their benefits. This initiative, dubbed “Operation Homefront,” is a comprehensive effort that examines the benefits each Resident is currently claiming, reviews files within the federal VA system and identifies opportunities where there may be more available. The progress made on this coordinated effort offers promising momentum.

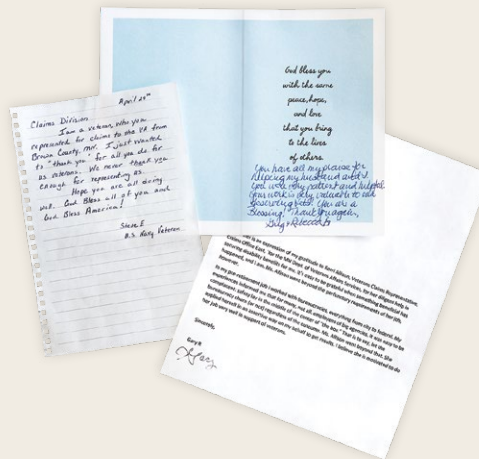

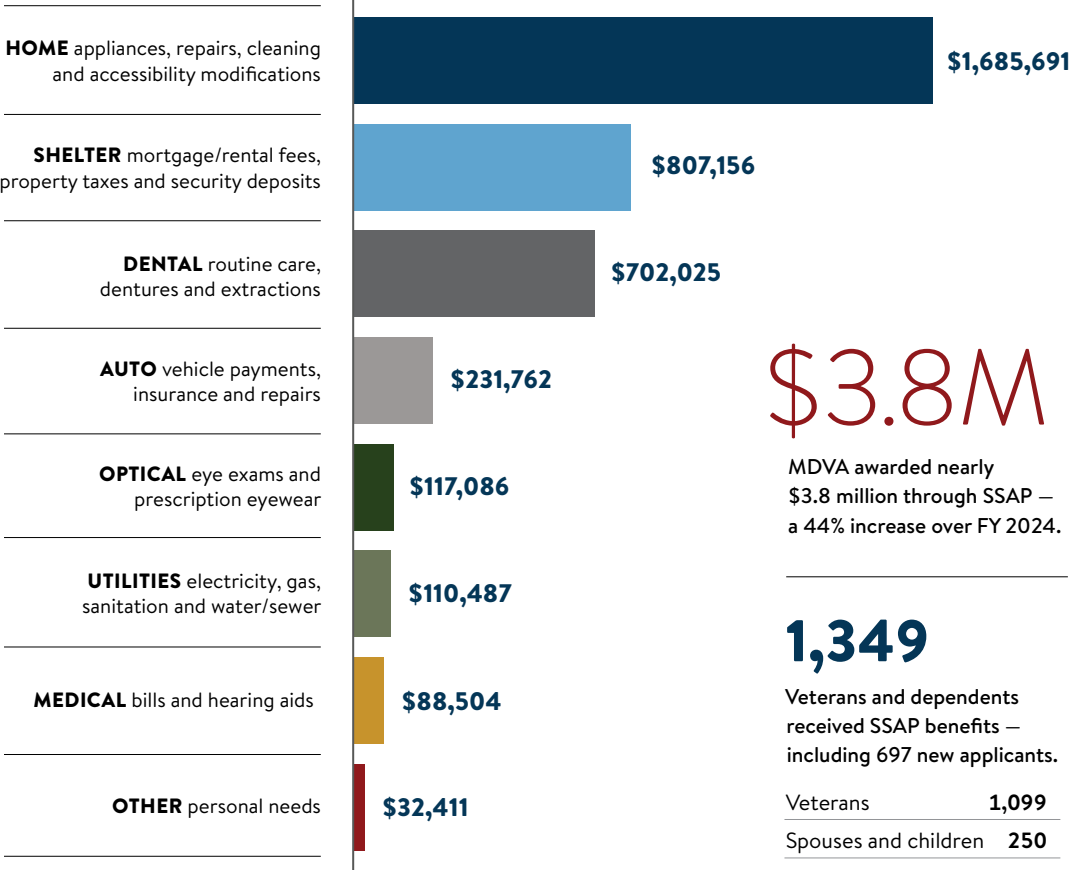

SSAP makes a big impact, providing Veterans with emergency financial assistance.

SSAP in Action

When a 91-year-old surviving spouse visited a CVSO for her annual dental and optical vouchers, she also learned about the SSAP program. With an urgent need in mind, she quickly submitted her paperwork and was approved for \$7,800 to replace her hot water heater. She had been living with cold showers, and this benefit made an immediate difference in her quality of life.

\$2.86 MILLION

MDVA awarded some of the highest Veterans Relief Grant (VRG) payouts ever in FY 2025, totaling \$2.86 million. The VRG is an SSAP benefit that provides a once-per-lifetime financial grant to help Veterans and their families stabilize their lives in a time of hardship.

Well-being counseling

MDVA has a long-standing partnership with Lutheran Social Service (LSS) of Minnesota for the Counseling and Case Management, Outreach, Referral and Education (CORE) program to help improve quality of life for military members, Veterans and their families.

In recent surveys, all people who use CORE report being treated with respect, finding service helpful and would recommend CORE to other Veterans.

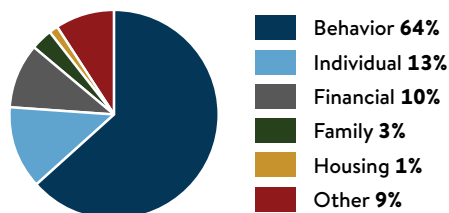

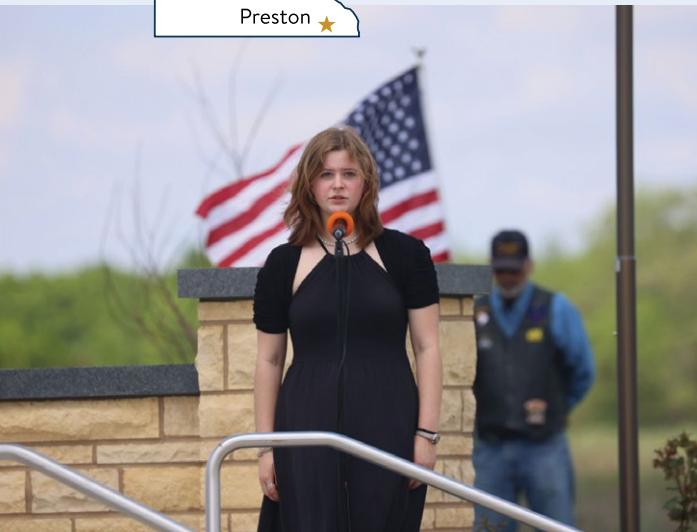

Showing up for unaccompanied Veterans

When a Veteran does not have a family member to make burial arrangements or attend a service, MDVA steps in to ensure these unaccompanied Veterans are remembered by a grateful country.

In September 2024, an unaccompanied Veteran was laid to rest at Minnesota State Veterans Cemetery - Preston. Community members plus Residents and team members from the Preston Veterans Home attended the service.

70,200 kWh

Resident-centered healthcare for Minnesota Veterans

Each of the eight Minnesota Veterans Homes operates 24/7 to provide a combination of skilled nursing care, dedicated care units for dementia and Alzheimer's, domiciliary care, rehabilitation services, recreational therapy and work therapy programs.

The MDVA Healthcare division also includes the Veterans Community Health team (see page 28) that is responsible for the Veteran Suicide Prevention initiative, the Minnesota Veteran Suicide Prevention Collaborative and the Veteran Health Navigators Program.

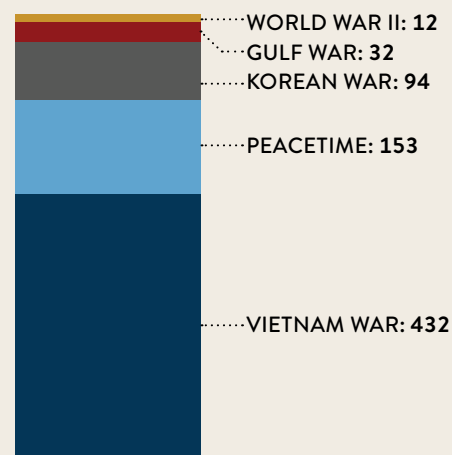

ANNUAL CHARTER FISHING TRIP REMAINS A FAVORITE

Each summer, the Silver Bay Veterans Home hosts the Charter Fishing Trip on Lake Superior. All Minnesota Veterans Homes are invited to participate and in 2025, Residents from Hastings and Minneapolis also joined. Nine boats transported 17 Residents on a four-hour trip that hooked a total of 41 fish. Participants enjoyed a food truck lunch, then savored the fruits of their labor during a fish fry at the Home.



GARDEN-TO-TABLE PROGRAM PROVIDES ENRICHMENT ALL YEAR

The Silver Bay staff, volunteers and Residents plant, grow, harvest, process and prepare food grown onsite with each new season, offering Residents new experiences and understanding of healthier living with whole food.

In the winter, Residents brainstorm to create a vision for next season's garden. As spring approaches, Garden Clean Up Days bring volunteers and Residents together to prepare the garden for the growing season. Residents participate in watering and weeding while watching plants grow. Finally, at harvest, the team uses the space in the Resident coffee shop called Valor Café to prepare fresh produce — lettuce, radishes, raspberries, zucchini, lavender, kohlrabi, onions and more — in Resident meals.

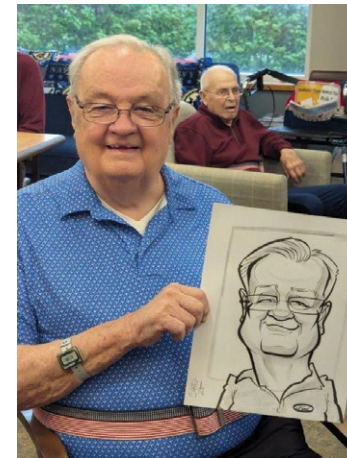
ANNUAL EVENTS ABOUND

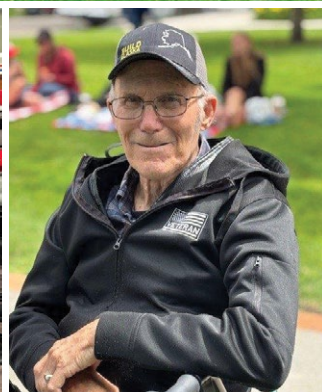

INVITING BIRDS AND BEES

The Mississippi Headwaters Audubon Society was awarded a grant to initiate a “Birds for Veterans – Blending Nature and Honor” program at the Home. With it, Residents made bee hotels and bird feeders. Several donated birdhouses are installed throughout the grounds and outside Residents’ windows. Additionally, a biology professor from Bemidji State University provided guidance on a purple martin birdhouse project. The collaboration creates an environment friendly to birds, bees, pollinators and people.





The only program of its kind in Minnesota, the **MDVA Domiciliary Program (DOMS)** provides Veterans in transition with access to medical, mental health, financial and social well-being support services.

DOMS helps Veterans to find stable housing, work toward vocational goals and better manage their overall well-being. Designed to remove barriers to care and bridge the gap between living independently and skilled nursing care, DOMS Residents manage their daily schedules and activities and continue to experience independent living while they follow the path that best meets their needs — whether that's aging in place at the Minnesota Veterans Homes, returning to living successfully and independently in the community or getting support for their mental health or sobriety.

DOMS is one program that operates at two Minnesota Veterans Homes locations: Minneapolis and Hastings. Both feature outdoor spaces that allow staff and Residents to access the well-being effects of nature, including walking trails and bike paths.

Resident interests are celebrated in a variety of available activities, including gardening, fishing and more.



A CARING COMMUNITY IS CRUCIAL

Since the Hastings Veterans Home opened in 1978, Navy Veteran and member of the local Veterans of Foreign

Wars (VFW) post Jim Murtaugh has been volunteering there. Always willing to pitch in when necessary — including occasional support hours at the DOMS Minneapolis location — Jim's volunteer activities include driving Residents to appointments, helping with popular bingo games and operating the clothing room, which is open twice a month for Residents to come in and select clothing items.

Reaching out to help save Veteran lives

The Veterans Community Health team collaborates with partners statewide to prevent suicide, promote health and help Minnesota Veterans navigate the healthcare system.

Reducing Veteran suicide deaths is a top priority

Each year, about 100 Veterans die by suicide in Minnesota. While this number was 78 in 2024 — a 20% reduction from 2023 — a one-year change is not a trend.

Year over year, Veterans who die by suicide are overwhelmingly older, with ages 75-79 as the highest group at year end 2024. Non-Veterans who died by suicide were most often age 54 and younger.

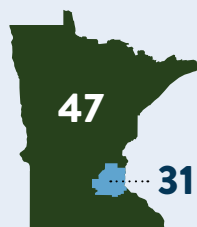

Support for Veterans and military families impacted by suicide

The Veteran Suicide Prevention Team continues to grow, streamline suicide prevention efforts statewide and expand partnerships with nonprofit and other Veteran organizations. The Minnesota Veteran Suicide Prevention Collaborative advances state and national priorities by aligning with the Governor’s Challenge and Minnesota’s Suicide Prevention Plan to reduce suicide among service members, Veterans and their families.

Throughout the year, the team participates and engages hundreds of Minnesotans to promote training and connections to Veterans resources. In October, Veterans, advocates, supporters and community leaders come together for the annual Minnesota Veteran Suicide Prevention and Awareness Day.

Veteran Health Navigator Program

This initiative supports Veterans and their families by improving health, wellness and quality of life through suicide risk screening and connection to comprehensive resources. It also embeds Veteran Health Navigators and military service identification into non-VA healthcare systems and their electronic health records to enhance care coordination and outcomes across Minnesota.

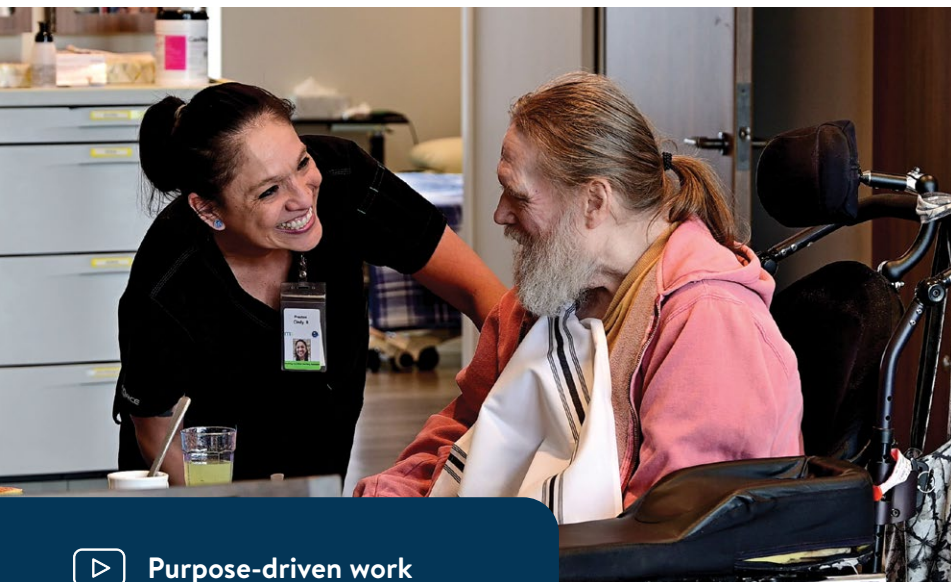

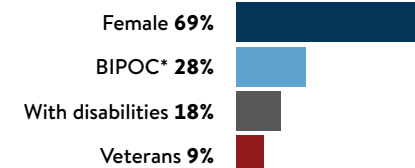

Advocating for Minnesota Veterans

The 2025 Legislative Session concluded with significant bi-partisan investment in providing benefits, programs and services for Veterans and their families.

Veterans Day on the Hill is an annual event hosted by the Commanders' Task Force and the Minnesota Association of County Veterans Service Officers. Hundreds gathered for lunch at the Cedar Street National Guard Armory before marching to gather at the State Capitol Rotunda to hear from MDVA Commissioner Brad Lindsay, Governor Tim Walz and several Veterans Service Organizations (VSO).



Ongoing investment in Minnesota Veterans

For a fourth consecutive year, a stand-alone Veterans and Military Affairs Omnibus Bill was passed by the Minnesota Legislature. Governor Tim Walz signed the bill into law on May 23, 2025. Honoring service and sacrifice, this law provides critical funding to ensure that Minnesota takes care of Veterans and their needs.

Here are just a few examples of how funding will make a difference:

- Ensure the newest Minnesota Veterans Homes continue ramping up staffing to serve more Veterans.
- Support efforts to prevent Veterans dying by suicide.
- Help Minnesota put a functional end to Veteran homelessness.
- Assist Veterans who are dealing with food insecurity.
- Enable upgrades to Minnesota Veterans Homes and State Veterans Cemeteries.

Grants in action

Beltrami County was awarded a \$180,000 grant to provide a mobile claims unit that enhances the ability of the Veterans Service Office to reach underserved populations in rural areas and tribal lands. By bringing services directly to these communities, the Veterans Service Office can effectively facilitate the processing of federal and state claims in remote locations and enable early identification of Veterans at risk of homelessness or severe medical hardship.

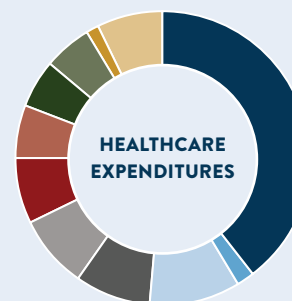

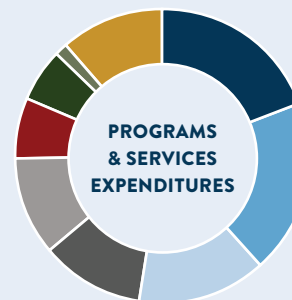
