Current and Upcoming Resources

- September 26, 2025: MDH Rural Health Transformation Plan Public Comments
 - Identified focus areas include emergency services, primary care, care for people with complex and chronic conditions, mental and behavioral health care, maternal health care, and other at-risk services or unmet needs.

- October 1, 2025: Robert Wood Johnson (RWJ) Rapid Response: Reinvesting in Racial and Indigenous Health Equity
 Research
 - RWJ Rapid Response Research funding is exclusively available to applicants who have already received federal funding (e.g., from the NIH, CDC, NSF) for their health equity research but have since had their funding partially or fully rescinded due to federal administrative actions.
 - Weekly office hours are available until the application deadline.
- October 16 & October 30, 2025: MCN Webinar on Designing for Strategy: Financial Modeling (\$135 for MCN members / \$175 for nonmembers)
 - This is a four-hour virtual training split into 2 two-hour sessions led by Tangelo Tree Consulting.
 - Session topics will include: 1.) Financial Modeling to Support Decision Making and 2.) Financial Modeling Monitoring and Implementation.
 - In a time of shifting funding sources, rising costs, and heightened accountability, financial modeling can help turn uncertainty into informed choices by providing scenario analysis, cost projections, and risk assessments.

Federal Developments

- September 30: If Congress does not appropriate funds by the 30th, the federal government will shut down (OMB is planning layoffs of those who work on programs "not consistent with the President's priorities"). Additionally, if certain funds are not obligated by the 30th, those funds may be subject to a 'pocket rescission' (see e.g. certain IIJA transportation funds). EV tax credits also expire on the 30th.
- The EPA is proposing to end the <u>Greenhouse Gas Reporting Program</u>. An <u>opportunity to comment</u> should be posted in the Federal Register shortly.
- State of Minnesota agencies continue to experience returned grant reports if those reports use words like "equity" or
 "equality" and cancelled funding if the grant "ensure[s] there is racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity."
- The First Amendment has been in the news, with some potential budget implications: late-night-host <u>Jimmy Kimmel</u> fired and rehired, and related broader administration threats to <u>monitor speech</u> and examine the <u>tax-exempt status of certain</u> non-profits could impact funding eligibility for those organizations.
- Courts reversed cancellations of a Rhode Island wind farm project and of grant funding at UCLA.
- Nationally, some <u>multimodal (bike/walk/transit) funds</u> have been cancelled with a USDOT note that the agency is "focusing
 ... multimodal grant programs primarily on projects that promote vehicular travel."
- An <u>E.O.</u> changed requirements for the H1B skilled-worker visa program by requiring a payment of \$100,000 for the visa.
- FEMA announced it will be <u>issuing non-disaster awards</u>—FEMA has finished an evaluation of the programs.

Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP) Overview



\$50 billion over 5 FYs (2026-2030) = \$10 billion annually to be distributed to states each federal fiscal year

Half of funds to all states with an approved application
Half of funds distributed in amounts to states TBD within
certain parameters



States cannot use funds to leverage other federal funding or meet Medicaid match requirements



States required to submit an application and a Rural Health Transformation Plan; Only state governments can apply.



Applications due November 5

Additional uses designed to promote sustainable access to high quality rural health care services, as determined by the Administrator

Limitations on uses of funds

- New construction; renovations/alterations restricted to 20% of funds
- Replacement of payment or altering payment amounts for clinical services covered by insurance;
 provider payments restricted to 15% of funds
- Limit of 5% of total funding for replacement of an EMR system if a previous HITECH-certified EMR system is already in place as of 9/1/25
- Rural Tech Catalyst Fund limited to 10% or \$20m
- Clinician salaries/wage supports for those subject to non-compete contracts
- Expenditures considered IGTs, CPEs, or non-federal share
- Funding for gender-affirming surgeries
- Payment for abortions

Scoring

- Rural facility and population score factors
- Technical score factors. Examples:
 - Population health clinical infrastructure (chronic disease management)
 - Rural provider strategic partnerships
 - Talent recruitment
 - Medicaid provider payment incentives (value-based care)
 - Remote care services

Al screening for words and themes

- Analysis has shown that words associated with themes in issued executive orders and federal agency guidance are being removed or replaced on federal websites.
- Federal agencies may be conducting Al screening for these or similar words in federal grant applications and reporting.
- Applications and reports that omit these words or themes may not trigger additional review.

Reminders/Best Practices

- Grants with signed agreements appear to be somewhat stable for the time being
- Some grants may be terminated for convenience—check terms and conditions
 - The standard terms and conditions are being amended by EPA to make grants easier to cancel for convenience
 - Stay consistent with terms and conditions
- Get any directives in writing
- Know that calls may be recorded
 - Folks from the federal government and potentially DOGE in particular are joining meetings.
- Reporting and funding applications: anticipate use of AI screening for key words.
- Court cases continue: Covid and FEMA fund cancellations were blocked; reductions in force blocked, then unblocked.
