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General Overview

Executive Summary

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) was passed by Congress and signed into law by President Biden, providing over \$350 billion dollars to state, local and tribal governments for addressing the health and economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The American Rescue Plan Act's State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) were distributed across the country and created the opportunity for a significant public health response effort to stop the spread of COVID-19.

Minnesota received \$2.83 billion to be used in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency. These funds supported immediate economic stabilization for households and businesses, replenished public sector revenues vital to providing essential public services, and enabled our state to address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the unequal impact of the pandemic. Policymakers agreed to divide the funds received between immediate COVID-19 response and long-term pandemic recovery.

As of June 30, 2024, Minnesota has spent approximately \$2.81 billion of the State Fiscal Recovery Fund (SFRF). Some of the many projects funded with immediate response funds included summer learning for students, emergency staffing for health care workers, rental assistance, childcare support, meals and food for families, violence prevention, vaccine incentives and workforce stabilization. The Uses of Funds section of this report details intended and actual uses of funds and how Minnesota's approach helped support a strong and equitable recovery.

In alignment with the federal SLFRF goals of promoting equity, deepening community engagement, promoting sound labor practices, and using evidence-based program design, Minnesota used the following criteria to identify, evaluate and select projects:

- Promoting Equitable Outcomes
- Community Engagement
- Use of Evidence
- Outcomes and Evaluation

Minnesota's pandemic recovery strategy supports community by actively seeking feedback and suggestions from people in Minnesota and using evidence-based practices. The state continues to leverage its strong evidence-based culture in its use of the SFRF, which enables Minnesota to maximize the impact for our communities.

With many projects going into their fourth year of implementation, the State of Minnesota has seen remarkable results from the use of the SFRF. The performance report section of this report outlines project performance indicators and progress and includes the following initiatives:

- *Hunger Relief* purchased 3,203,241 pounds of food
- *Summer Preschool* served over 7,400 children 0-5 years (3,543 in priority categories)
- *Expanded Meal Access* provided over 91,000 meals
- *Rapid at Home Test Program* distributed 450,000 test kits and *Community-Based Testing* administered approximately 2,270,000 tests

The project inventory details 94 projects funded through SFRF that over 24 state agencies and partners have developed. Each SFRF project is summarized and includes the purpose of the project, the amount received, and the communities served. As many projects are ongoing, performance metrics will continue to be updated and included in future reports.

This report focuses exclusively on the SFRF components of Minnesota’s recovery efforts and is required by the U.S. Department of Treasury. It is not intended to serve as a comprehensive report of all efforts. Visit mn.gov/mmb to access additional COVID-19 reports.

Uses of Funds

Minnesota allocated \$2.32 billion to replenish the Unemployment Insurance (UI) trust fund, with the remainder going towards provision of government services to address immediate COVID-19 response needs. Minnesota has spent approximately \$2.81 billion of the State Fiscal Recovery Fund (SFRF) as detailed in Table 1.

Contributions to the Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust Fund

During the 2022 legislative session, policymakers agreed to allocate \$2.32 billion to repay the outstanding balance of the federal unemployment insurance trust fund and replenish the balance with the difference. This allocation directly served all existing, active, tax paying employers in the State of Minnesota, and all new tax paying employers who might have begun their business in 2022, totaling roughly 169,000 employers.

The rapid increase and high volume of applicants receiving unemployment benefits depleted the roughly \$1.5 billion balance in Minnesota’s UI Trust Fund within four months. The use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to replenish the UI Trust Fund allowed Minnesota to keep a positive balance with the U.S. Treasury and to avoid imposing UI tax increases.

Ultimately, the UI Program provided a temporary partial wage replacement to Minnesota workers who became unemployed through no fault of their own, which supported economic stability for individual workers and employers and for local and statewide economies. The avoided tax increase made possible by the expenditure of these funds to repay the UI debt and replenish the UI Trust Fund helped large and small employers across the state remain economically viable and competitive.

Immediate COVID-19 Response Needs

Policymakers agreed to use the remaining funds for addressing immediate COVID-19 response needs. This money was used to replace lost revenue due to the COVID-19 public health emergency and provided necessary government services to people living and working in Minnesota. A wide variety of government services were provided using these funds, responding to both the public health crisis presented by COVID-19 as well as the economic impacts. Funds were allocated to programs supporting children, students, and teachers (Academic and Mental Health Support for Schools, Summer Preschool, Childcare Stabilization, Free and Reduced Price Lunch, Expanded Access to Tutoring, School Link Mental Health), health care providers (Emergency Nursing Facilities and Emergency Hospital Staff), employers (UI Trust Fund, MN Zoo Recovery, Workers Compensation), general public health efforts (Community Based Testing, COVID-19 Vaccine Incentives), as well as rental assistance, food support, wastewater testing, violence prevention, and support for veterans.

Promoting Equitable Outcomes

The State of Minnesota is committed to delivering a strong and equitable recovery from the pandemic for all residents. Minnesota worked to prioritize economic and racial equity through program design and implementation strategies, equitable access to and distribution of funds, and awareness and engagement outreach to communities disproportionately affected by COVID-19. Additional project-specific efforts to promote equity have been focused on closing gaps to support priority populations including children, families, BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) individuals, the unemployed, the formerly incarcerated, veterans, and people with disabilities.

Equitable Program Design

Program-specific equity strategies crosscut agencies, and in some cases included strong designs to reach historically underserved communities (refer to Table 2). For example, Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) served children with one or more risk factors or who may not have been able to attend a high-quality early childhood program due to COVID-19. MDE defines historically underserved as:

- Students of color or American Indian students
- Students eligible for free or reduced-price meals

- Students receiving special education services
- Students who are English Learners
- Students experiencing homelessness

Equitable Goals and Implementation

Minnesota continues to focus on providing an equitable recovery that benefits all people living and working in the state. Equity-related goals for current projects aim to **close gaps** and **reach universal levels of service** for underserved, marginalized, or adversely impacted communities. The initiatives below were chosen to meet those goals:

Closing Gaps:

- *Expanded Meal Access* and *Hunger Relief* projects aim to close hunger gaps among populations most at risk for food insecurity.
- *Summer Preschool* supports children before they enter kindergarten, and specifically those who have experienced life circumstances that may have prevented them from being able to attend a high-quality early childhood program due to COVID-19. Children meeting one of the priority populations listed above and those who had minimal or interrupted early learning experience were prioritized.
- *School-Linked Mental Health* programming closes gaps by bringing services to students and reducing barriers to access, and has resulted in a 23 percent increase in service utilization by students.
- The *Food Support Grant* closes gaps by prioritizing funding to Black, Indigenous, and people of color populations, which have felt the economic effects of the pandemic most acutely.
- The *Violence Intervention* grant program supports organizations serving victims of crime, with a priority on youth, young adult, and family antiviolence outreach programs in areas with highest rates of violent crime.

Reaching Universal Levels of Service:

- *COVID-19 Vaccine Incentive* programs focused on removing the administrative barriers to partner organizations. Contracts supported eight clinics and 17 culturally specific community-based organizations, which provide disaggregated data by race, ethnicity, and other equity dimensions.
- *The Academic and Mental Health Support* program is intended to provide academic enrichment and mental health for students, families, educators, communities, and schools across Minnesota, with an emphasis on historically underserved students and those needing special education services.
- *Adult Basic Education* funding is intended to enhance the preexisting program and expand its impact among adults who have aged out of the K-12 system or were otherwise unable to complete their high school level education through the K-12 system and face cultural employment barriers.
- The *Expanding Access to Tutoring* program intentionally prioritizes historically underserved students and supports access to tutoring as Minnesota recovers from the pandemic.

Equitable Access and Distribution

Using outreach and engagement strategies outlined in the next section, Minnesota provided equitable access to funds. A few of the projects specifically aimed at getting funds to areas and populations where they were needed most are detailed below:

- *Expanded Meal Access* made funds available throughout the state using a methodology which ensured a fair and equitable distribution of funds to a variety of organizations geographically dispersed.

- The Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) constructed a [list of Summer Preschool funded programs](#) and an [interactive map](#) for families to find programs with *Summer Preschool* funds in their area. The list and map include contact information for each program, so families can contact programs in their area to see if they have Summer Preschool seats available. MDE also created a Summer Preschool flyer for families and translated it into Amharic, Hmong, Karen, Oromo, Russian, Simplified Chinese, Somali, Spanish, and Vietnamese.
- *The Academic and Mental Health Supports* program funding was distributed to public school districts and charter schools based on average daily membership and concentration of historically underserved students, with an emphasis on students receiving special education services.
- *Adult Basic Education* program funds were distributed among 39 Adult Education consortia, which together cover the entire state and provide services to individuals at more than 300 sites across the state.
- Services funded by the *Expanding Access to Tutoring* program are targeted toward historically underserved communities, and services are most likely to be offered in underserved communities.
- *COVID-19 Vaccine Incentives* provided staffing to assist smaller and/or immigrant organizations to complete the funding application and contract; community-based organizations then worked to reduce barriers to services at community testing and vaccination sites.
- *Food Support Grant* programming increased the number of eligible food shelf users by supporting delivery and transportation costs and investing in equipment needed to support food insecure Minnesotans more effectively.

Community Engagement

General ARP Outreach

In prioritizing public engagement and community outreach to determine Minnesota’s use of ARP funds, the state created a public-facing information website and conducted a series of 10 online events during 2021. Engagement events were held in partnership with a variety of community groups, including the Urban Native Leaders, Latino Lead, NAACP, Tribal Nations, culturally specific COVID-19 Community Coordinators, public school districts, charter schools, grantees, local public health departments, and others to collaborate on ways to raise awareness of ARP-funded opportunities, share best practices for fund use, and solicit community feedback on how the state could use these funds.

Engagement Efforts with Underserved Groups

- The State of Minnesota and MDE recognized the importance of gathering ideas and feedback from parents, caregivers, and students on the use of the ARP education funds, especially from traditionally underrepresented groups and communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. The public comment period effort included a survey that was available in English, Hmong, Somali, and Spanish, and offered special instructions for Karen native speakers to submit feedback. - *Summer Preschool* conducted a series of meetings, held at a variety of times, in advance of the release of the application. Representatives from early learning programs, school districts, Head Start organizations, and advocates for children and families participated in these meetings. These sessions focused on presenting the application process, answering questions, and creating space for conversations to elicit community perspectives.
- The *Girl Scout ConnectZ* program solicited feedback from participants in its pilot program to engage the community they serve, primarily comprised of students of color from low-income backgrounds.
- The *Expanded Meal Access* program awarded funds to sub-recipients using a competitive grant process, reviewed by community-based organizations.
- The *Hunger Relief* program purchased culturally appropriate food based on client demand.
- The Office of Higher Education (OHE) captured constructive feedback from grantees through qualitative data collection and requested feedback on how to be more supportive of the grantees' work. Outreach tactics included social media, direct notification to eligible students and collaboration with stakeholder groups representing underserved communities.
- MDH advertised through local health departments, Tribal Nations, and community-based organizations through social media and event-based dialogue.

Raising Awareness of Funding Opportunities

State agencies employed a wide range of outreach approaches to raise awareness of funding opportunities available to the following groups:

- Public school districts
- Charter schools and other eligible institutions
- Child Care Aware of Minnesota and local Child Care Aware agencies
- Early learning scholarship area administrators
- Preschool development hubs
- Community Solution grantees that have direct relationships with families
- County and tribal childcare assistance workers
- Early learning scholarship administrators

Outreach efforts for specific projects included:

- *Expanded Meal Access* promoted the food grant opportunity via the Feeding America network and various community partners throughout the state.
- *Girl Scouts ConnectZ* partnered with MDE and lawmakers to ensure populations were aware of the opportunity and conducted engagement surveys.
- *Workforce Stabilization Grants* were publicized through college partners, Future Together ambassadors, and a variety of post-secondary stakeholder groups.
- *Nursing Assistant Initiative* planned a marketing campaign tailored to the student population, parents, school counselors, teachers, and faculty to increase community engagement and leverage agency resources.

- *Small Business Development* built awareness of its services through outreach and partnerships with community organizations.

Statewide Impact

As a result of strategic public engagement efforts and community-based feedback, the ARP funds had statewide impact – serving many types of people, professions, and employers.

Use of Evidence

Minnesota is [a national leader](#) in identifying, using, and creating rigorous evidence of effectiveness of social programs. In 2015, Minnesota developed a [definition](#) of “evidence-based practices” and began to evaluate whether there was an evidence-basis for select programs operated by the state. Since then, the state identified services in nine sectors and high-quality research that supports these programs. The findings of these reviews – totaling more than 730 programs – are publicly available in the [Minnesota Inventory](#). Minnesota also conducted a [novel analysis](#) of the demographics of people participating in evidence-based programs to help better understand if or how the impacts vary by race, ethnicity, income, education, and sex. Over the last few years, Minnesota has integrated evidence-based decision-making into large-scale evaluations of grant programs and budget development processes. Minnesota also established an [Impact Evaluation Unit](#) to study programs that have a strong logic model and indicators of success but have not yet been rigorously evaluated. The state has solidified a culture of generating impact by prioritizing evidence and has been cited by multiple national organizations as a leader in this area.

State agencies are encouraged to use the Request for Proposal (RFP) process to promote the use of evidence-based interventions and conduct rigorous impact evaluations. Agencies report information annually to the COVID-19 Response Accountability Office to fulfill federal reporting requirements. Reporting includes the goals of the project, whether funds are being used for evidence-based interventions, and the details of any planned evaluations.

Since 2021, an estimated \$2.36 billion of the State Fiscal Recovery Funds supported 67 unique evidence-based practices implemented by just over 1,000 subrecipients. Specific strategies regarding the use of evidence in current programs are included in the Project Inventory section of this report.

Labor Practices

Minnesota has not allocated ARP-funds for infrastructure projects. The state will provide information related to labor practices in future reports, if applicable.

The request included overtime funding to address the increased demand for violent crime enforcement, investigative and analytical support. Funding for the expansion of crime gun processing capacity and technology upgrades to improve and speed up forensic analysis of gun crimes was included as well. These efforts further supported the MN BCA's role in assisting Minnesota law enforcement in combating violent crime which will in turn contribute to improving public health overall.

Project overview:

- As a result of COVID-19, parts of the timber industry experienced an unprecedented market decline. Mills in Minnesota and Wisconsin were closed In June 2020. Verso Corporation announced they were indefinitely idling their Duluth paper mill and laid off approximately 235 employees. Verso was the fifth largest consumer of wood in the Minnesota and took in 150,000 cords of Minnesota wood each year, primarily spruce and balsam fir. About 43 of DNR spruce and balsam fir went to Verso in Duluth. Verso also announced they were idling their large mill in Wisconsin. These announcements came just after a large number of DNR timber permits were sold in spring 2020, which had immediate impacts for loggers holding spruce and balsam fir permits intended for Verso.

When a qualified logger is awarded a timber permit they must provide 15% of the appraised price up front permit security. Annually, this money is distributed to land statuses eg. school trust counties specific to each permit. Typically they have 3-5 years to harvest the permit but if it goes unharvested the permit security is forfeit.

With bipartisan support, timber relief was signed into law during the legislative special session. MN Laws 2021 1st Special Session Chapter 6 Article 2 Section 128 subds 4 and 5 allows the commissioner of natural resources to provide refunds to certain permits that were unlikely to be harvested. Permit holders are refunded their advance payment and bid guarantee permit security as applicable for these permits.

- The COVID-19 Wastewater Testing project monitored the total amounts of SARS-CoV-2 RNA and the prevalence of variants of concern in wastewater entering four wastewater treatment plants in the Minneapolis-Saint Paul metropolitan area. RNA concentrations in wastewater are a cost-effective predictive indicator of disease prevalence within the treatment plant's service area. Data from the project were shared weekly with the Minnesota Department of Health, the MN Governor's office, and the public.
