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AT A GLANCE


- Mayo Clinic operates hospitals and clinics on major campuses in Rochester, Minnesota; Scottsdale and Phoenix, Arizona; and Jacksonville, Florida. In addition, the Mayo Clinic Health System has more than 70 locations serving communities in rural Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin.
- Combining 2022 and 2023 calendar years, more than 908,000 patients were served in Rochester, as well as 630,000 patients served throughout Mayo Clinic Health System across southern Minnesota.
- Total expenditure toward the educational mission of Mayo Clinic was \$514.8 million in 2023.
- Capitation funds are used for tuition grants for Minnesota residents attending Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine and for Family Medicine resident salaries.
- Minnesota residents have comprised 19% of Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine students.
- On average, Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine graduates have 68% of debt compared to the typical U.S. medical school graduates.
- From 1978 to present, 321 trainees have graduated from the Rochester Family Medicine Residency.
- Since the Family Medicine-Mankato Residency program transitioned to the Mayo Clinic School of Graduate Medical Education sponsorship in 2022, the program has had nine graduates.
- Forty-four percent (44%) of Family Medicine-Rochester program graduates chose to stay in Minnesota, with 38% of total graduates practicing in rural Minnesota. Of the nine Mankato graduates, 100% have remained in Minnesota, with 78% of those practicing in rural Minnesota.

PURPOSE


The mission of Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine is to provide an outstanding medical education that results in an inspired and diverse workforce of physicians and scientists who are leaders in advancing exemplary, equitable, and affordable clinical care; healthcare system design; and related innovation; and to alleviate human suffering and best serve critical health needs of our broadly diverse and increasingly connected nation and world.

The Mayo Clinic School of Graduate Medical Education Family Medicine residency programs educate and inspire medical school graduates to pursue careers as family physicians with emphasis on rural primary care augmented by subspecialty training.

The overall operating expenses in 2023-2024 for the Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine and the Family Medicine Residency Program were \$48,418,300. State Capitation of \$1,799,000 represents 3.7% of the overall operating expenses.

STRATEGIES

The State Capitation funds are used in direct support for the Minnesota residents attending Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine (MCASOM). As of July 2024, 19% of the matriculants to MCASOM were Minnesota residents. In the past five years, 40% of MCASOM graduates have chosen a career in primary care. Primary care includes Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Pediatrics, and Psychiatry. To accomplish this, MCASOM recruits and matriculates high achieving Minnesota undergraduate students who aspire to serve society as physicians by assuming leadership roles in medical practice, education, and research. MCASOM offers students opportunities to experience clinical rotations in regional and rural practices. MCASOM remains committed to and focused on containing educational costs for students below the median for private medical schools and mitigating educational debt, which allows students to choose a career in primary care.

The Mayo Clinic School of Graduate Medical Education Family Medicine (Rochester and Mankato) residency training programs prepare prospective family physicians for primary care medicine in all settings, with special emphasis on population health, team-based care, and a practice orientation towards rural and smaller communities. The residents-in-training gain extensive experience in ambulatory, primary, and continuity care to patients. The residents participate fully in the department's population management initiatives to improve quality and decrease costs of employee/dependent healthcare. The three-year Family Medicine training program was established in 1978, beginning with four residents. It currently has a maximum of 27 resident training positions. Over time it has grown in size and success, with all training positions filled for the past 42 years. The Minnesota capitation appropriation has supported residents' training stipends since 1978.

SERVICES PROVIDED

In 2009, Mayo Clinic Alix School of Medicine (MCASOM) launched the REACH Clinic in conjunction with the Rochester Area Salvation Army's Good Samaritan Health Clinic (GSHC). The GSHC is a program for residents of Olmsted County and adjacent counties who do not have insurance or are underinsured, and is staffed by volunteer physicians, pharmacists, nurses, other healthcare professionals, and medical students. There were 44 REACH clinic days in 2022, serving 326 patients.

Successful physicians of the future not only need to understand the traditional basics of medicine, but also need to understand and effectively navigate the rapidly changing healthcare delivery system. The goal of MCASOM's Science of Healthcare Delivery curriculum is to produce physicians that understand and can improve systems of care to create superior patient outcomes at lower costs.

By 2050, one out of every five Americans will be over the age of 65. In turn, all members of the health care team must be well-equipped to provide patient-centered, safe, compassionate, competent care to the burgeoning population of older adults. MCASOM's Senior Sage Program focuses on preparing medical students to provide this care to aging Minnesotans by pairing each student with an expert (i.e., Senior Sage) for unique learning opportunities over the four-year longitudinal course.

The Rochester-based Family Medicine residency has a family medicine clinic focused on rural health, based in Kasson, Minnesota, and serves communities in Dodge and Olmsted County. The Mayo Family Clinic Kasson serves people of all ages and provides family-oriented comprehensive care, including obstetrical care and well-woman care, newborn and well-child care, pediatrics, and adult/geriatric care. Patients include significant socioeconomic diversity with many Spanish-speaking patients. Residents engage in patient home visits and community education in local schools. Dodge County community health priorities addressed by the Family Medicine residents include obesity, mental health, tobacco use, substance abuse, and motor vehicle injury protection. The community health priorities residents address in Olmsted County includes motor vehicle injury protection, vaccine preventable diseases, obesity, mental health, and financial stress. Through training and experiences, residents learn the social determinants of health and the effects on patient care.

The Mankato Family Medicine residency is a community- and region-based health care facility. Residents collaborate with health care providers, community members, and community-based organizations to assess social determinants of health to improve community health. Residents are actively engaged in community gardens addressing food insecurity, nursing home care and home visits, development and delivery of health education for infants and adolescents, and a host of other commitments. With the growing needs for mental health care throughout Minnesota, the residency has added focused training on addiction medicine for all residents during their first year.
