PRIORITIES

Strategic Priorities for 2025 - 2027

Building on the insights generated through the avatar reflections, group discussions, and structured prioritization exercises, the Advisory Council identified two strategic areas of focus to guide its work over the next two years. These priorities reflect both the urgency of current need, acknowledgement of the current political landscape, and the Council's commitment to advancing systemic change in ways that are culturally responsive, community-centered, and evidence-informed.

Each priority was selected not only for its immediate relevance but also for its potential to catalyze broader transformation.

Evidence Based ROSC Council

End Goal

By 2027, the end goal is for the State Substance Use Disorder (SUD) strategy to prioritize a network of Recovery-Oriented Systems of Care (ROSC) councils, with two pilot councils (one urban and one rural) underway.

Why it Matters

These pilots lay the foundation for a sustainable statewide approach. When we invest in local voices and lived experience, we create systems that are responsive, practical, and built to last.

Culturally Responsive Care

End Goal

By 2027, the goal is to amplify diverse voices in decision–making, helping ensuring culturally responsive care is integrated across the substance use recovery continuum, especially for communities facing the most disparities.

Why it Matters

Culturally specific communities bring deep knowledge, resilience, and insight to the recovery process. When their voices are included in shaping care systems, access improves, trust builds, and outcomes strengthen. Eliminating disparities starts by designing with, not just for, the communities most affected.

PRIORITIES

Strategic Priorities for 2025 - 2027

The Council collaborated to develop an initial set of key initiatives under each focus area. These initiatives are intended to serve as actionable starting points that further align the council around common goals, and laying the foundation for more future initiatives.

These initiatives may be updated or revised as the Council continues to coordinate its efforts, attracts stakeholder support and measures its progress over time.

Evidence Based ROSC Council

Key Initiatives

Initiative 1 | Build a foundation Complete literature review and bring in external experts on what ROSC councils

external experts on what ROSC councils are, how they function, and where they've been effective to prepare the Council for ROSC council creation and implementation.

Initiative 2 | Identify local partners and recovery community organizations to help pilot ROSC councils. Identify organizations with experience in recovery community work to start pilots.

Initiative 3 | Conduct targeted outreach with communities to gather feedback on needs, experiences, and expectations for ROSC councils.

Culturally Responsive Care

Key Initiatives

Initiative 1| Host community engagements to build trust, elevate underrepresented voices, and uncover service, access, and policy gaps.

Initiative 2 | Create or coordinate trainings and education materials for peer recovery specialists (PRS) and other workforce members to be culturally responsive.

Initiative 3 | Advocate for policy and funding to ensure that culturally responsive services are prioritized.




ROSC COUNCIL





"Suppose you have 100 acres full of sick trees who want to get well. If each sick tree leaves the forest to find wellness and then returns to the forest, they get sick again from the infection of the rest of the trees. ROSC Councils And RCO's Through FY 2025

- 43 ROSC Councils covering 56 counties
- 30 RCO's covering 53 counties
- Each county sets its own annual goals with input from the entire county
- Regular community needs assessments
- The goal is to have a ROSC Council in every county in Illinois
- The Illinois ROSC Council replaced Great Lakes ATTC and now oversees Recovery Oriented Systems of Care Work in the State
- Increase in Recovery housing and warming centers
- Addressing Food insecurity

ROSC Councils And RCO's Through FY 2025

- Reversal of drug overdose and ability to quantify lives saved
- Increase in recovery and employment for persons in recovery
- Ability to respond to crisis
- Increase in the range of peer-based support groups
- Successful reentry initiative through partnerships with probation, parole and the court system
- Stigma reduction








Accomplishments (January, 2023)

- 2000 fewer EMS calls for overdose
- 3300 residents trained in Narcan distribution
- Decrease in overdose fitalities
- Decrease in overdose deaths
- Warm handoffs from street outreach to treatment and recovery
- Vans for MAR, first aid, vaccinations

Accomplishments Continued

- Formed Fentanyl Workgroup
- Legislative Committee HB 110 for overdose prevention
- Recovery Coaching and Narcan distribution in libraries
- Harm Reduction vending machines
- Pharmacy Surveys
- New Initiative Approval of a safe injection site
- Door to door campaign
