Notes:

- Jewish holidays typically begin at sundown, which is why they are often listed across two calendar days.
- This is a list of religious holidays for which Jewish employees may request time off to observe.
- Not all Jewish individuals observe all holidays, and levels of observance may vary.
- Some employees may also request time off before a holiday to prepare for the holiday.
- The dates listed reflect potential workdays, though the holiday begins the evening prior.
- There are other Jewish holidays during which work is permitted; these are not included in this list, though some employees may still choose to take time off for personal or cultural reasons.
- Please note that sundown times vary throughout the year. During winter months, sundown can occur as early as 4:10 PM, which is especially relevant for employees who observe Shabbat (the Sabbath).
