- I. **MEETING CALLED TO ORDER**—Heather Kainz, Council Chair, called the meeting to order at 12:15 pm.

II. **HONORING OUR OUTGOING MEMBERS (Alphabetical Order)**

Tribute to Lee Shervheim

Thank you, Lee Shervheim, for your outstanding leadership as Chair of the Minnesota Governor's Council on Developmental Disabilities. For nine years, you have served as a member and recently guided the Council with dedication, stability, and a deep commitment to improving the lives of individuals with developmental disabilities across the state.

As the father of three daughters with Down syndrome, you brought a deeply personal perspective that enriched every discussion and grounded the Council's work in real experiences of Minnesota families. Your heartfelt advocacy, thoughtful insight, and steady presence helped ensure that the Council remained focused on what truly matters—advancing opportunities, fostering inclusion, and providing meaningful support for people with developmental disabilities.

Lee's leadership extended well beyond the Chair role. He simultaneously served as Chair of the Grant Review Committee, overseeing complex decisions with fairness, clarity, and a strong sense of responsibility. Under his guidance, the Council developed its next Five-Year State Plan, setting the highest priorities for Federal Fiscal Years 2027 through 2031. His influence can be seen throughout the plan's vision, strategies, and commitments, reflecting both practical wisdom and a deep respect for the voices of self-advocates and families.

Lee is known for his calm, measured approach, his ability to bring people together, and his unwavering integrity. Whether navigating a challenging issue, fostering collaboration across agencies, or simply offering encouragement to new members, he led with humility and purpose. His service strengthened the Council's mission, helped elevate critical conversations statewide, and set a strong foundation for the work that lies ahead.

We extend our heartfelt appreciation to Lee for his remarkable contributions, steadfast leadership, and personal dedication. His impact will continue to shape the Council's efforts and benefit Minnesotans with developmental disabilities for many years to come.

Kainz invited all present to introduce themselves.

IV. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Kainz called for the approval of today's agenda. **MOTION:** Zayic moved, seconded by Cole to approve the Agenda. Motion carried.

V. APPROVAL OF COUNCIL MINUTES (June 3, 2026)

Kainz called for the approval of the June 3, 2026, Minutes. **MOTION:** McDermott moved, seconded by Cole to approve the Minutes. Motion carried

VI. PROGRAM PRESENTATION: THE 2025 CUSTOMER RESEARCH SURVEY OF PARTNERS IN POLICYMAKING GRADUATES

Derek Pearson MarketResponse International presented the results of a survey of Partners in Policymaking graduates. Tom Pearson was also in attendance.

Pearson summarized more than 175 stories shared by graduates of the Partners in Policymaking program, gathered from surveys and interviews. The stories came from self-advocates and family members who completed the program between 1987 and 2025. The findings were organized into ten themes describing the lasting impact of the program on graduates' lives and advocacy work.

Graduates consistently emphasized that learning the history of the disability rights movement was a pivotal moment. Many described encountering this history for the first time through Partners, which created a sense of responsibility to continue advancing disability rights. The program was also described as transformative, giving graduates a renewed sense of identity, hope, and possibility. Individuals shared personal milestones such as gaining independent housing, securing employment, and seeing major positive life changes for themselves or their children.

Another major theme was the deep sense of belonging formed within the disability community. Many graduates had previously navigated disability in isolation; meeting others with similar experiences helped them feel less alone and encouraged sustained involvement. This contributed to significant growth in confidence. Graduates described learning to speak up in settings ranging from IEP meetings to legislative testimony, shifting from passive acceptance to active advocacy and feeling assured that their voices mattered.

Graduates also reported gaining a stronger understanding of disability services and how to navigate them effectively. They described becoming more capable of asking the right questions, asserting their rights, and overturning incorrect denials. This increased clarity and engagement improved their ability to support their own families and others.

Parents noted substantial changes in how they approached education systems, particularly in IEP processes, moving from deference to informed and assertive advocacy.

Graduates expressed heightened awareness of inclusion and accessibility in their communities. With new tools and confidence, they worked on projects ranging from installing accessible infrastructure in schools to serving as members of committees that shaped local community environments. Many reported taking on broader system-change efforts, including legal action, legislative testimony, and participation in state-level councils. Their advocacy extended beyond individual issues toward shaping policy and institutional practices.

The program also played a significant role in leadership development and career growth. Graduates described new professional pathways and increased recognition of their expertise, leading to advisory appointments, advanced degrees, nonprofit leadership, and meaningful employment for self-advocates. Across stories, graduates highlighted that Partners strengthened their commitment to independence and self-direction. They advocated for person-centered planning, higher expectations within schools and adult services, and the right to make choices about their own lives.

Across all ten themes, graduates described a consistent arc: learning disability history helped them understand the larger movement they were part of; gaining confidence allowed them to use their voices effectively; community connections provided lasting support; and these changes collectively empowered them to shift from being managed by systems to actively shaping them through advocacy, leadership, and legislative influence.

The Council members shared personal reflections after hearing the report. Zayic stated that the findings align with the value and impact of the program, noting that other states do not have a program with comparable strength. McDermott emphasized that life can be a roller coaster, and that self-advocates must learn to speak up for their needs, as some county case managers may underestimate their abilities. He stressed the importance of using one's voice. Smith shared that Partners gave her hope and provided an alternative to segregated settings, adding that both the Council and Partners create a sense of safety. Raasch explained that she had been in a day program and attended Partners where she learned public speaking; although she was initially nervous, she now presents during the first weekend of the program. Schmidt described the deep trust the program fosters and underscored the importance of continually sharing personal stories, reminding everyone that lives matter and that these are real people—not data points or numbers.

VII. GRANT REVIEW COMMITTEE

Kainz confirmed that all Council members signed a Conflict-of-Interest form before the vote was taken. Jenny Arndt served as Chair for today's meeting. There were two applications received in response to the Customer Research RFP. **MOTION:** On behalf of the Grant Review Committee, Arndt moved to approve a contract with MarketResponse International. The motion was seconded by Cole. The motion carried with no abstentions.

VIII. PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE

Terakanambi provided an overview of today's meeting. Ann Zukoski and Sam King, MMB, provided an update on the Healthy Aging Initiative, a statewide effort to improve coordination across agencies and strengthen policies that support aging Minnesotans. MMB aims to complete a multi-sector Healthy Aging Plan by April 2027, informed by extensive community engagement and cross-agency collaboration. Council members were asked to give feedback on two questions. The members emphasized the need for person-centered services, accessible housing, reliable transportation, improved workforce stability, and clearer system navigation. Members also noted significant strain on informal caregivers, who increasingly experience financial hardship, burnout, and limited support.

Kirsten Olson, from the Minnesota Board on Aging (MBA) presented information on its statewide legal assistance system and described ongoing efforts to protect autonomy, prevent unnecessary guardianship, and ensure access to legal services for older adults. MBA's Legal Needs Survey, open through August 31, 2026, seeks to identify gaps in legal support and better understand barriers facing aging Minnesotans. MBA highlighted strong alignment between elder justice and disability justice principles, including independence, inclusion, and self-determination.

An update was provided on the proposed Olmstead Plan; no new revisions have been released, and additional information will be shared at the October meeting or earlier if needed.

Terakanambi presented a detailed update on Medicaid issues affecting people with disabilities in Minnesota. He provided a handout for everyone. He reported that federal oversight resulted in provider revalidation requirements and payment holds, which contributed to service disruptions. Approximately two thousand providers were successfully revalidated, while over three thousand were disenrolled due to administrative issues rather than fraud, with many appealing and returning to billing. Federal claim deferrals involving hundreds of millions of dollars have also created uncertainty. Legislators have sought clarity from state officials, and the LTSS Advisory Council continues to develop cost-saving recommendations for future legislative consideration. Terakanambi also reviewed new federal rules linking medical frailty

determinations to work capability, noting concerns about increased documentation burdens and data gaps. Minnesota has joined a legal challenge asserting that the rule exceeds federal authority. He encouraged continued awareness and engagement to mitigate impacts on individuals relying on Medicaid services.

Members provided their comments about the delayed payments, political motivation, the fraud rate of Minnesota is lower than other states, and how other states are proceeding with freezing funds, lowering reimbursement rates, and placing the burden on people with disabilities.

IX. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Wieck reported that the federal allocation received for Federal Fiscal Year 2026 is \$1,145,074, which is \$7,660 less than the FFY 2025 amount, and noted that both the President's Budget and the House Appropriations Committee call for level funding for Councils.

She shared that several governor appointments were made in June, including new representatives from MDE, ICI, MDLC, a nonprofit, and two parents filling open terms.

The Five-Year Plan has been revised to comply with federal character limits, reviewed by two external readers, posted on the Council's website in multiple accessible formats, and will be submitted by the August 15, 2026 deadline.

The Disability History User-Centric Design project is complete and ready for release, following input from self-advocates and families, the creation of a unified brand and format, video selection, and permissions for editing; staff encouraged members to use and share the lesson plan with educators.

The Treat People Like People campaign continues to demonstrate broad reach, with nearly nine million social media views, over seven million ad views, more than three million video views, substantial website traffic, and distribution of 200,000 branded items, along with podcast releases and a Dignity of Risk section.

Council staff reviewed more than 500 pages of comments on the proposed Olmstead Plan revision, and the Subcabinet met in June to discuss the feedback and the Disability Systems Change Council, with the next Subcabinet meeting scheduled for September 15, 2026.

The Partners in Policymaking program has selected Class 44 and completed a review of all forms and resources. The program will mark its 40th anniversary in May 2027 with an Open House and the release of a documentary and publication.

X. PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Kainz opened the floor for announcements.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

Kainz called for adjournment of the meeting. **MOTION:** McDermott moved, seconded by Bourdeaux, that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.
