MINUTES

Call to Order:

Agenda Item 1 – Call to Order

Chair McArdle called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m. CDT

Roll Call:

Agenda Item 2 – Roll Call

Present – Chair McArdle, Second Vice Chair Johnson, Commissioners Dehn, Erhart, Goodman, Gingold and Koob.
A quorum was acknowledged.

Other participants – Steve May (Executive Director, Minnesota Racing Commission), E. Joseph Newton (General Counsel, Minnesota Racing Commission), Andrew Offerman (Vice President of Racing Operations, Canterbury Park), Taro Ito (President/CEO, Running Aces Casino, Hotel, and Racetrack), Steve Carpenito (Director of Racing, Running Aces Casino, Hotel, and Racetrack), Lynn Hovda, DVM (Chief Commission Veterinarian, Minnesota Racing Commission), Bob Schiewe (Deputy Director, Minnesota Racing Commission), Cathy Dessert (Vice President, Minnesota Harness Racing, Inc.), Mike Cronin (Minnesota Horsemen’s Benevolent and Protective Association), Kay King (Executive Director, Minnesota Thoroughbred Association), Kevin Decker (MHRI Executive Secretary), Nancy Turner (This Old Horse), and Susan Sheridan-Tucker (Minnesota Alliance on Problem Gambling).

Adoption of Agenda:

Agenda Item 3 – Approval of Agenda

Commissioner Erhart motioned to approve the agenda; Second by Commissioner Johnson; Motion carried.

Approval of Minutes:

Agenda Item 4 – Approval of Minutes

Chair McArdle had several corrections for the February 17, 2022 meeting minutes. Mr. May made the suggested edits to the draft. Dehn motioned to approve the revised minutes; Second by Commissioner Johnson; Motion carried.

New Business – Action Items

Agenda Item 5 Approval of Thoroughbred Breeders' Fund Purse Supplement Allocation for 2022

Mr. May spoke on this item, staff recommended approved. Mr. Offerman added that both advisory committees unanimously approved of the proposal. Chair McCardle requested to know the source of the funds, and Mr. Offerman answered the card room.

Agenda Item 6 – Approval of Quarter Horse Breeders' Fund Purse Supplement Allocation for 2022

Mr. May spoke on this item, and staff recommended the items approval. This item also had unanimous approval of the advisory commissions.

Motion to approve items 5 and 6 from Colombo, second by Koob. Roll call vote was approved unanimously.

New Business – Informational Items:

Agenda Item 7 – Problem Gambling Awareness Month Presentation

Ms. Sheridan-Tucker gave a presentation on gambling issues. Ms. Sheridan-Tucker answered several questions from Commissioners and staff and thanked the commission for letting her give her presentation.

Agenda Item 8a – Status Report by Canterbury Park Entertainment

Mr. Offerman gave a brief status report. He also spoke on a report being drafted concerning the impact of covid-19 on the para-mutual market.

Agenda Item 8b- Status Report by Running Aces Casino, Hotel, and Racetrack

Mr. Ito spoke first and introduced Mr. Carpenito. Mr. Carpenito gave a review of racing staff hires, purses, and stall applications.

Agenda Item 9 - Staff Reports

A -Chief Commission Veterinarian Review of Veterinary Oversight

Dr. Hovda gave a thorough walkthrough on the process horses undergo when they arrive at the racetracks, and how the veterinarian provide care for the horses. Chair McCardle spoke on the history and tradition of excellent veterinary service by Commission staff.

Agenda Item 10a – Deputy Director's Licensing Report

Agenda Item 10b – Deputy Director's ADW Update

Mr. Schiewe gave this update and reminded all that the temporary ADW fee increase had decreased back to the original amount.

Agenda Item 10c – Deputy Director’s Other

Mr. Schiewe informed the commission that this is the busiest time of year for staff while they prepare for the upcoming racing season. Mr. Schiewe also welcomed Commissioner Koob.

Agenda Item 11a – Executive Director’s COVID-19 Update

Mr. May gave the update and said things looked positive and spoke on lifting of staff mask mandates.

Agenda Item 11b – Executive Director’s Legislative Update

Mr. May gave an extensive update on legislation. He updated the progress of the bills and was hopeful it would pass soon. He spoke on a companion animal bill and sports wagering bills. Commissioner Dehn asked about ADW takes in states that approved sports betting and what the governor’s guidance was on the issue. Mr. May responded that he had no official stance on the issue. Commissioner Goodman stressed the importance of sports betting to the success of horseracing and believes that commissioners should make their opinions’ known. Chair McArdle relayed that as citizens of the state commissioners can make their thoughts known to various legislators. Commissioner Colombo addressed tribal gaming. Mr. Offerman made clear that Canterbury Park is not engaged in any lobbying on this issue. Mr. Ito spoke in support of Commissioner Goodman and on the effects of sports betting in Iowa on table games.

Agenda Item 11c – Executive Director’s Rulemaking Update

Mr. May gave this update. There were a few changes requested by the Administrative Law Judge for the current rule package but was hopeful that it would be approved before the racing season.

Agenda Item 1d – Executive Director’s Contract Approvals

Mr. May spoke briefly on a contract update.

Agenda Item 11e – Executive Director’s Other Update

He thanked multiple staff members for their hard work and gave a brief HISA update. He focused on a potential injunction to HISA in a Texas court.

Agenda Item 12 - MQHRA/MTA/MHRI/MNHBPA Reports

MTA – Ms. King gave an update on Minnesota foals and spoke about their newsletter. She spoke on the importance of aftercare to the industry. Chair McArdle spoke her appreciation for the foal issue.

MHRI – Mr. Decker gave an update on their MNBRED racing schedule and spoke on their upcoming annual meeting and invited all to attend. He praised Running Aces and spoke about the positive impact racing has on the local economy. Chair McArdle recommended that anyone who can attend the annual meeting should do so.

MNHBPA - Mr. Cronin gave updates from the MNHBPA annual national convention and expressed excitement for the upcoming season.

RE: Availability of Funds for 2022 Standardbred Purse Supplements

As of March 1, 2022, the Standardbred Purse Supplements account controlled by the Commission had a balance of **\$692,588.40**. Commission staff is currently auditing this account to ensure all funds have been deposited into the account correctly. This should include allocations from the following sources:

1. Live races conducted at Running Aces
2. Simulcast wagering at Running Aces
3. Advance Deposit Wagering source market fees
4. Card club revenues

A more detailed memorandum will be provided to the committee once this audit and legal review is complete. A subsequent meeting of the committee will need to be held in late March or early April for a final approval of this plan.

In 2021, approximately 78% of this money was allocated to purse supplements for the Night of Champions stakes races and bonuses for Minnesota-bred horses earning purse money against non-Minnesota-bred horses. Up to \$10,000.00 was allocated as a bonus for any Minnesota-bred earning purse money in the Dan Patch Stakes, but that was not conducted in 2021 and the funds were not paid out of the account.

Although \$125,000.00 was allocated for to pay a 30% bonus for Minnesota-bred horses earning purse money against non-Minnesota-bred horses, the actual amount awarded from this program was \$195,479.00. The difference of \$70,479.00 was paid from the horsemen's purse account at Running Aces.

The Commission is also reviewing all statutes and administrative rules to ensure complete compliance with these requirements. Commission would recommend the following allocation of funds:

RE: Recommendation to Pay Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority Assessment for 2022

On Sunday, December 19, 2021, the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act¹ (“Act”) was signed into law by then-President Donald Trump. The law, found in 15 U.S.C. §3051-3060², established the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority (“HISA”), who will assume many regulatory roles over Thoroughbred racing on July 1, 2022.

The funding of HISA, pursuant to the Act, will be assessed to the state racing commissions in each state. The calculation of this assessment is explained in 15 U.S.C. §3052(f)(1)(C), which states:

(C) Annual calculation of amounts required

(i) In general

Not later than the date that is 90 days before the program effective date, and not later than November 1 each year thereafter, the Authority shall determine and provide to each State racing commission the estimated amount required from the State—

(I) to fund the State's proportionate share of the horseracing anti-doping and medication control program and the racetrack safety program for the next calendar year; and

(II) to liquidate the State's proportionate share of any loan or funding shortfall in the current calendar year and any previous calendar year.

(ii) Basis of calculation

The amounts calculated under clause (i) shall—

- (I) be based on—
- (aa) the annual budget of the Authority for the following calendar year, as approved by the Board; and
 - (bb) the projected amount of covered racing starts for the year in each State; and
- (II) take into account other sources of Authority revenue.

On April 1, 2022, the Minnesota Racing Commission (“Commission”) received a letter from John Roach, lead attorney for HISA, explaining the 2022 HISA assessment for the Commission. That letter and supporting documents are attached to this memorandum. In short, the Commission is assessed \$204,062.00 USD, which accounts for 1.4% of the total 2022 HISA budget, which is \$14,331,949.00 USD. Additional details for the methodology for determining this amount can be found in the Federal Trade Commission HISA 8500 Rule series³.

15 U.S.C. §3052(f)(2)(D) requires each state that elects to remit HISA fees to “*determine, subject to the applicable laws, regulations, and contracts of the State, the method by which the requisite amount of fees, such as foal registration fees, sales contributions, starter fees, and track fees, and other fees on covered persons, shall be allocated, assessed, and collected.*”

15 U.S.C. §3052(f)(3)(D) establishes a limitation on any state that **does not** elect to remit the assessment fees by stating that “*A State racing commission that does not elect to remit fees pursuant to paragraph (2) or that withdraws its election under such paragraph shall not impose or collect from any person a fee or tax relating to anti-doping and medication control or racetrack safety matters for covered horseraces.*”

In summary, according to the Act, if a state elects to remit HISA fees then the fees can be collected from industry participants, and if a state elects to NOT remit HISA fees then the limitation clause wholly prevents a state from collecting those fees from any industry participant.

The Commission must make a decision, now that the 2022 HISA assessment has been received by the Commission. This is because 15 U.S.C. §3052(f)(2)(A) mandates that “*Any State racing commission that elects to remit fees pursuant to this subsection shall notify the Authority of such election not later than 60 days before the program effective date.*” That date is May 1, 2022.

As all Commission members know, the Commission has been collecting regulatory fees from Advance Deposit Wagering (“ADW”) operators in Minnesota since 2016. These regulatory fees, pursuant to Minn. Stat. 240.141, Subdivision 7(a)⁴, must be used to “offset the costs incurred by the commission as described in section 240.30, subdivision 9, or the costs associated with regulating horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering in Minnesota.” As of April 1, 2022, the ADW Regulatory Fees account had a balance of \$1,372,962.69.

If the Commission does not elect to remit the HISA assessment, then I believe that the Commission would be prevented from utilizing these ADW Regulatory Fees to cover the federally-mandated cost of operating HISA. At the same time, if the Commission does not elect to remit the HISA assessment fees, the Commission would be prevented from collecting any new fees from the industry pursuant to 15 U.S.C. §3052(f)(3)(D).

Commission staff have referred this memorandum and plan to pay the HISA assessment to the Minnesota Office of the Attorney General to determine the final ability of the Commission to pay the HISA assessment. If the Office of the Attorney General agrees with this review, Commission staff recommends notifying HISA that the Minnesota Racing Commission will remit the 2022 HISA assessment of \$204,062.00, utilizing funds collected from ADW Regulatory Fees to cover all or part of this amount.

Dear Racing Commission Executive Directors:

Pursuant to the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act of 2020 (the “Act”), and given the Federal Trade Commission’s (“FTC”) approval today of the proposed Methodology for Determining Assessment Rule (the “Methodology Rule”), attached is the annual calculation of each state’s proportionate share of the amounts required under the Act (15 U.S.C. §3052(f)). The calculation is based on the 2022 budget of the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority in the amount of \$14,331,949.00 and the Methodology Rule (Rule 8500 Series) (attached). As noted in the Methodology Rule, the Authority is relying upon 2021 racing data for determining the assessments for 2022. The Authority is considering an amendment to the Methodology Rule that will calculate a true-up of the assessments for next year’s calculation based on the actual starts and purses paid in the previous year. If approved by the Board and the FTC, this amendment will go into effect before the next assessment. This will mean that if a state’s assessment amount is different when the actual 2021 numbers are utilized, a credit or debit will be made to the 2023 assessment in order to align with the final numbers.

Please note that if a State Racing Commission does not elect to remit the annual calculation, the covered racetracks are required to collect the fee assessment in accordance with the procedures set forth in the Methodology Rule. A spreadsheet that sets forth each covered racetrack’s amount to be collected under that scenario is also attached.

In accordance with the Act, any State racing commission that elects to remit the assessment to the Authority is required to notify the Authority on or before May 2, 2022. 8500. Methodology for Determining Assessments

8510. Definitions

For purposes of this Rule 8500 Series:

(a) *Annual Covered Racing Starts* means, for the following calendar year, the sum of: (i) 50 percent of the number of Projected Starts; plus (ii) 50 percent of the number of Projected Purse Starts.

(b) *Covered Horserace* has the meaning set forth in 15 U.S.C. 3051(5).

(c) *Projected Starts* means the number of starts in Covered Horseraces in the previous 12 months as reported by Equibase, after taking into consideration alterations in the racing calendar of the relevant State(s) for the following calendar year.

(d) *Projected Purse Starts* means: (i) The total amount of purses for Covered Horseraces as reported by Equibase (not including the Breeders' Cup World Championships Races), after taking into consideration alterations in purses for the relevant State(s) for the following calendar year, divided by (ii) the Projected Starts for the following calendar year.

(e) *Racetrack* has the meaning set forth in 15 U.S.C. 3051(15).

8520. Annual Calculation of Amounts Required

(a) If a State racing commission elects to remit fees pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(2), the State racing commission shall notify the Authority in writing on or before May 2, 2022 of its decision to elect to remit fees.

(b) Not later than April 1, 2022, and not later than November 1 of each year thereafter, the Authority shall determine and provide to each State Racing Commission the estimated amount required from each State pursuant to the calculation set forth in Rule 8520(c) below.

(c) Upon the approval of the budget for the following calendar year by the Board of the Authority, and after taking into account other sources of Authority revenue, the Authority shall allocate the calculation due from each State pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(1)(C)(i) proportionally by each State's respective percentage of the Annual Covered Racing Starts. The proportional calculation for each State's respective percentage of the Annual Covered Racing Starts shall be calculated as follows:

(1) The total amount due from all States pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(1)(C)(i) shall be divided by the Projected Starts of all Covered Horseraces; then

(2) 50 percent of the quotient calculated in (c)(1) is multiplied by the quotient of (i) the relevant State's percentage of the total amount of purses for all Covered Horseraces as reported by Equibase (not including the Breeders' Cup World Championships Races), after

taking into consideration alterations in purses for the relevant State for the following calendar year; divided by (ii) the relevant State's percentage of the Projected Starts of all Covered Horseraces starts; then

(3) the sum of the product of the calculation in (c)(2) and 50 percent of the quotient calculated in (c)(1) is multiplied by the Projected Starts in the applicable State.

Provided however, that no State's allocation shall exceed 10 percent of the total amount of purses for Covered Horseraces as reported by Equibase in the State (not including the Breeders' Cup World Championships Races). All amounts in excess of the 10 percent maximum shall be allocated proportionally to all States that do not exceed the maximum, based on each State's respective percentage of the Annual Covered Racing Starts.

(d) Pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(2)(B), a State racing commission that elects to remit fees shall remit fees on a monthly basis and each payment shall equal one-twelfth of the estimated annual amount required from the State for the following year.

(e) If a State racing commission does not elect to remit fees pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(2):

(1) The Authority shall on a monthly basis calculate and notify each Racetrack in the State of the applicable fee per racing start for the next month based upon the following calculations:

(i) Calculate the amount due from the State as if the State had elected to remit fees pursuant to 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(2) (the "Annual Calculation").

(ii) Calculate the number of starts in Covered Horseraces in the previous twelve months as reported by Equibase (the "Total Starts").

(iii) Calculate the number of starts in Covered Horseraces in the previous month as reported by Equibase (the "Monthly Starts").

(iv) The applicable fee per racing start shall equal the quotient of Monthly Starts, divided by Total Starts, multiplied by the Annual Calculation.

(2) The Authority shall on a monthly basis calculate and notify each Racetrack in the jurisdiction of the following calculations:

(i) Multiply the number of starts in Covered Horseraces in the previous month by the applicable fee per racing start calculated pursuant to paragraph (e)(1)(iv) above.

(ii) The calculation set forth in 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(3)(A) shall be equal to the amount calculated pursuant to paragraph (e)(2)(i) (the "Assessment Calculation").

(3) The Authority shall allocate the monthly Assessment Calculation proportionally based on each Racetrack's proportionate share in the total purses in Covered Horseraces in the State over the next month and shall notify each Racetrack in the jurisdiction of the amount required from the Racetrack. Each Racetrack shall pay its share of the Assessment Calculation to the Authority within 30 days of the end of the monthly period.

(4) Not later than May 1, 2022 and not later than November 1 each year thereafter, each Racetrack in the State shall submit to the Authority its proposal for the allocation of the Assessment Calculation among covered persons involved with Covered Horseraces (the "Covered Persons Allocation"). On or before 30 days from the receipt of the Covered Persons Allocation from the Racetrack, the Authority shall determine whether the Covered Persons Allocation has been allocated equitably in accordance with 15 U.S.C. 3052(f)(3)(B), and, if so, the Authority shall notify the Racetrack that the Covered Persons Allocation is approved. If a Racetrack fails to submit its proposed Covered Person Allocation in accordance with the deadlines set forth in this paragraph, or if the Authority has not approved the Covered Persons Allocation in accordance with this paragraph, the Authority shall determine the Covered Persons Allocation for the Racetrack. Upon the approval of or the determination by the Authority of the Covered Persons Allocation, the Racetrack shall collect the Covered Persons Allocation from the covered persons involved with Covered Horseraces.

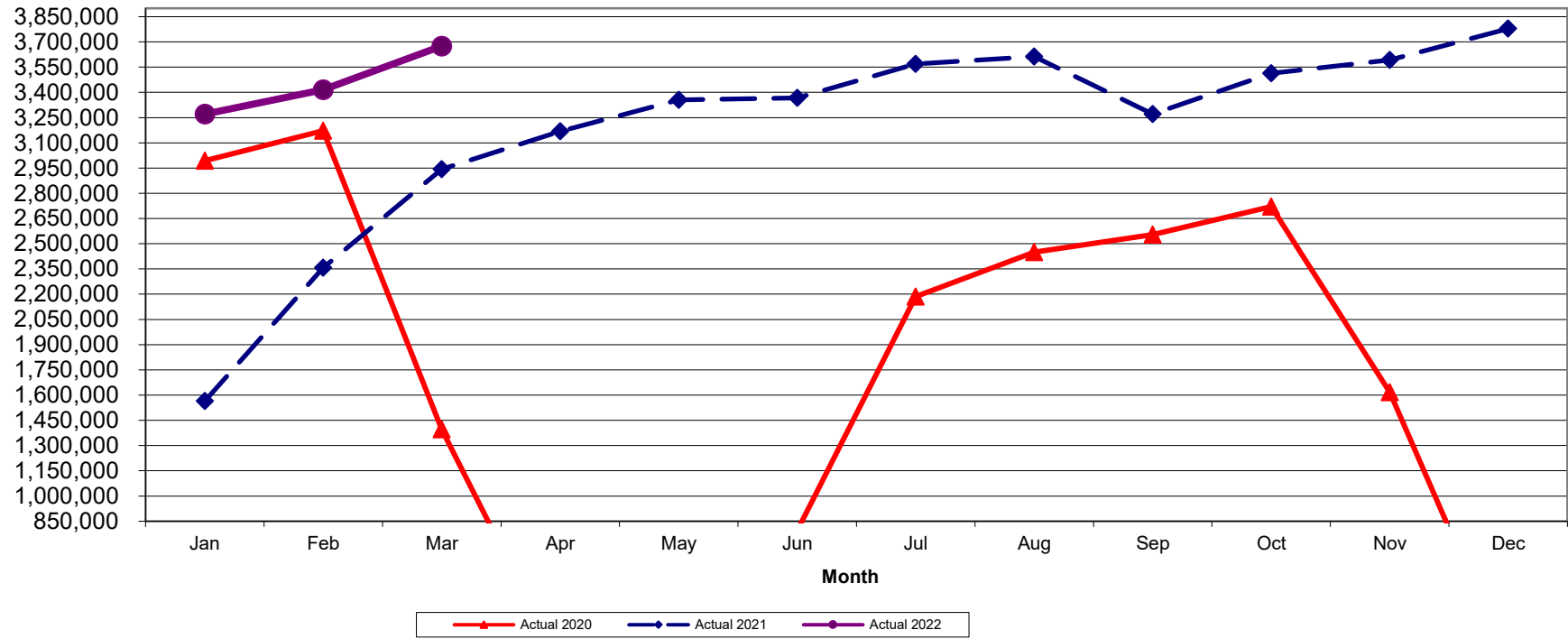
