Agenda Item 6 Approval of Official Medication Testing Laboratory for Quarter Horses and Standardbreds for 2023

Presented by Ms. Briner. New contract with Industrial Labs for testing for Quarter Horses and Standardbreds. Anticipate HISA will be taking over the testing of Thoroughbreds. Negotiated a sound agreement with competitive price. Also agreed in advent of unanticipated delays in the implantation of HISA medication testing they will pick up the Thoroughbred testing also. 3 RFPs were received and Industrial Labs most competitive. Motion for approval Johnson; Second by Idelkope. Motion Passed.

Agenda Item 7 Approval of 2023 Appointment of Chief Veterinarian

Motion for approval Goodman; Commissioner Goodman added: Dr Hovda is perhaps one of the most accomplished veterinarians in the industry. Referenced her 12-page resume. Expert for the Commission, expert for the Tracks. Passionate about horses and horse racing. Asset to the Commission. Second by Johnson. Motion passed.

Ms. Briner commented that this is a return of the 3 stewards from 2022. All did a very fine job. Chair McArdle confirmed that they worked well together and were very cohesive. a. Canterbury Park

Ms. Carlisle - released of the stake's schedules for both Quarter Horses and Thoroughbreds Both are geared towards MN bred program. The Northern Starts Racing Festival will be June 21. Last year was a record handle

of \$4.7 million. Festival of Champions Day will be September 9th. Also, Chris Merz the new Sr. Director of Horse Racing Operations will start February 27th. Commissioner talked about January event Snowcross.

b. Running Aces Casino, Hotel and Racetrack

Mr. Carpenito - released annual horseman brochure to promote participation in our 2023 meet, race schedule, stall applications & projected purse schedules - richest in history. And late closer program highlighted by the Dan Patch free for all. Placed ad's linking to brochure and other advertising in an effort to increase participation for horseman to come and race this summer in MN. Just completed a recruiting trip to Ca, several new stables interested. Positive feedback from horseman who race year after year on the changes we are going to make, install stall gates on all stalls and the elimination of stall service fees. Working on staffing for meet and evaluating possible changes to wagering format. Both will be submitted at the March Commission meeting. Mr. Bedessem, calendar coming together, working with a lot more non-profits this year. Additional fundraising for aftercare. Opened a pop-up kitchen in Card Room Fri/Sat. Hi-Limit room was moved, and additional floor changes.

Agenda Item 13 Executive Directors Report

a. HISA Update

Mr. Newton - Safety side moving forward we are in a good position to be in place. HIWU background – division of Drug Free Sport LLC – HISA is a client of Drug Free Sport LLC - 5th Circuit court still ongoing, congress passed change - FTC now power to aggerate, add to or modify rules – waiting for action and keeping an eye on. Medication and Doping Rules re-published today, 60 days to make comment. HISA anticipates to be up and running with them by the end of March. Met with HIWU regarding the voluntary agreement, they do seem to be open to negotiating that agreement. Commission Johnson asked about process, timeline on negotiating or when cost structure maybe coming down. Mr. Newton - Negotiations have just started and are ongoing, we have gotten our assessment, any credits we have those numbers and staff talking about moving forward. We do currently have the extension from December deadline but obviously with racing still a way out we are getting closer. Ms. Briner added submitted a request for bridge funding of over one million dollars to be added to the Governor budget to offset that cost. We learned Tuesday that it was included. Needs to be understood that is not ongoing funding it will need to be negotiated. More to come on this. Commissioner Johnson and Chair McArdle added recent articles about HISA and working together.

b. Legislative Update

Mr. Gustafson commented on HISA work and a lot of work still to do before the end of the session. Also, he had the opportunity last Wednesday to testify in the House Commerce Committee to present an overview of the Commission work. It's role, duties, functions, Breeders Fund and Grants. Will keep an eye on bills being introduced.

c. Rulemaking Update

Published notice of intent to adopt January 23, 2023, the rules that came before the commission at the October meeting. Placeholder for hearing at March meeting if enough request for hearing. If not would continue with adoption.

Late December approval for Vendor Contract for a Poker Tournament promoter/organizer at Running Aces one late March/early April and the other November/December.

Two jockeys have been cleared, 1 will be cleared February 18th and one is almost ready to begin physical therapy. Looking forward to continuing and expanding in some ways. HBPA – Mr. Cronin thanked Kyle for making time early on. Commented on Jockeys dropping litigation against HISA, encouraging, and hopefully moving forward. In St. Paul a bill introduced to support Abijah’s on the Backside. Adding a financial literacy program to their tutoring program. Thank Charlene, great teacher on legislation and government.

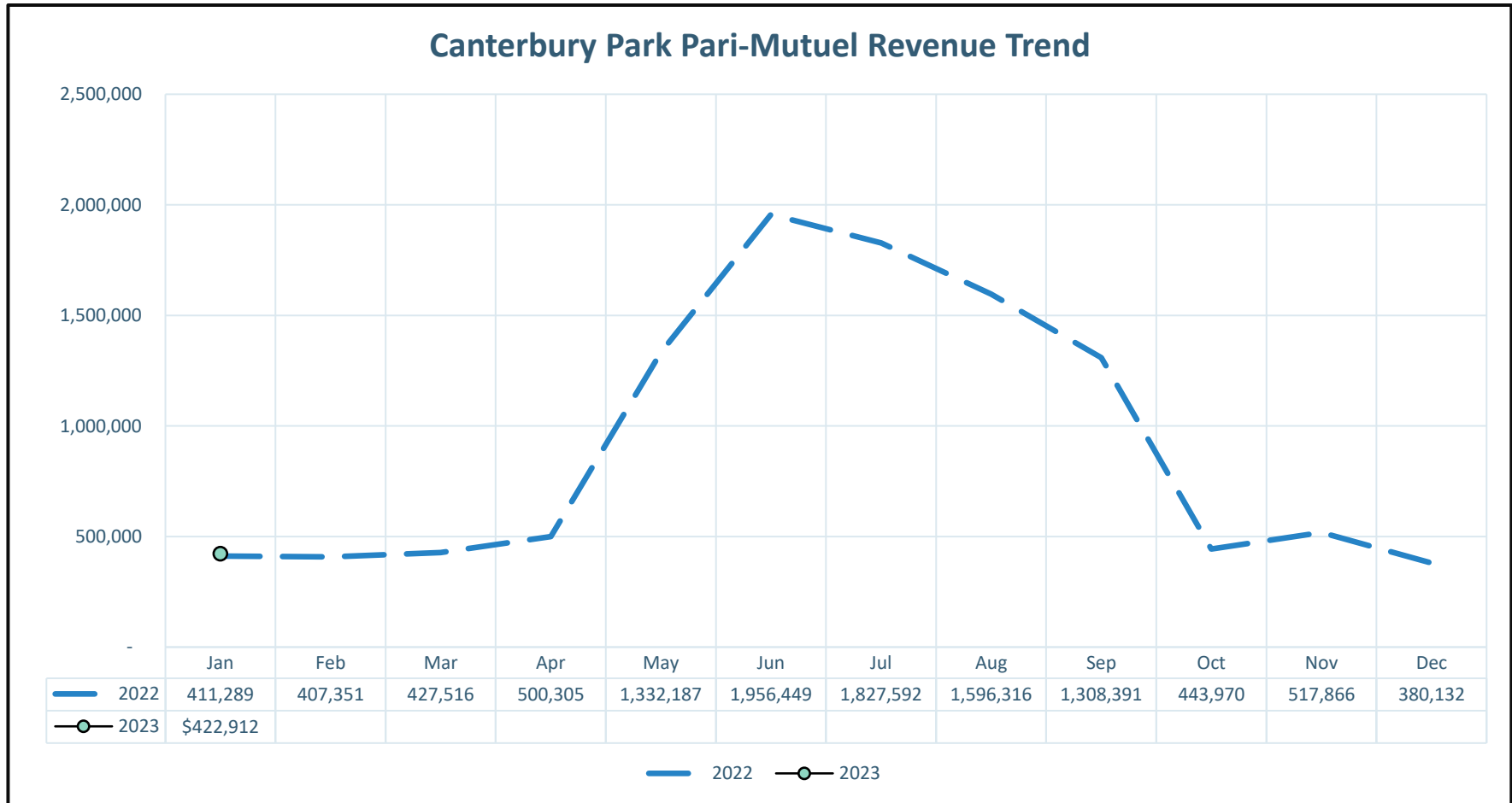

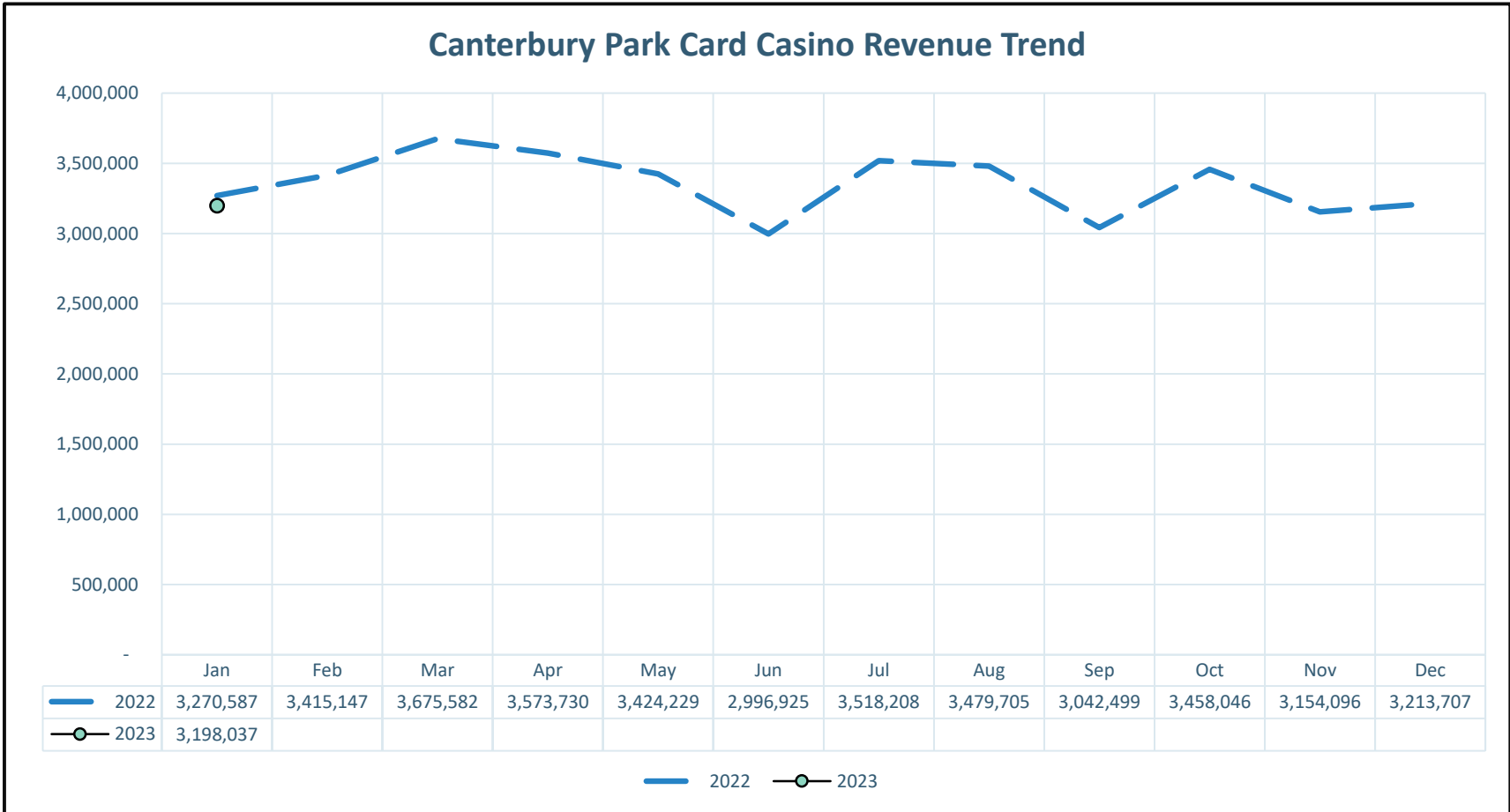

Card Casino Revenue - Trend

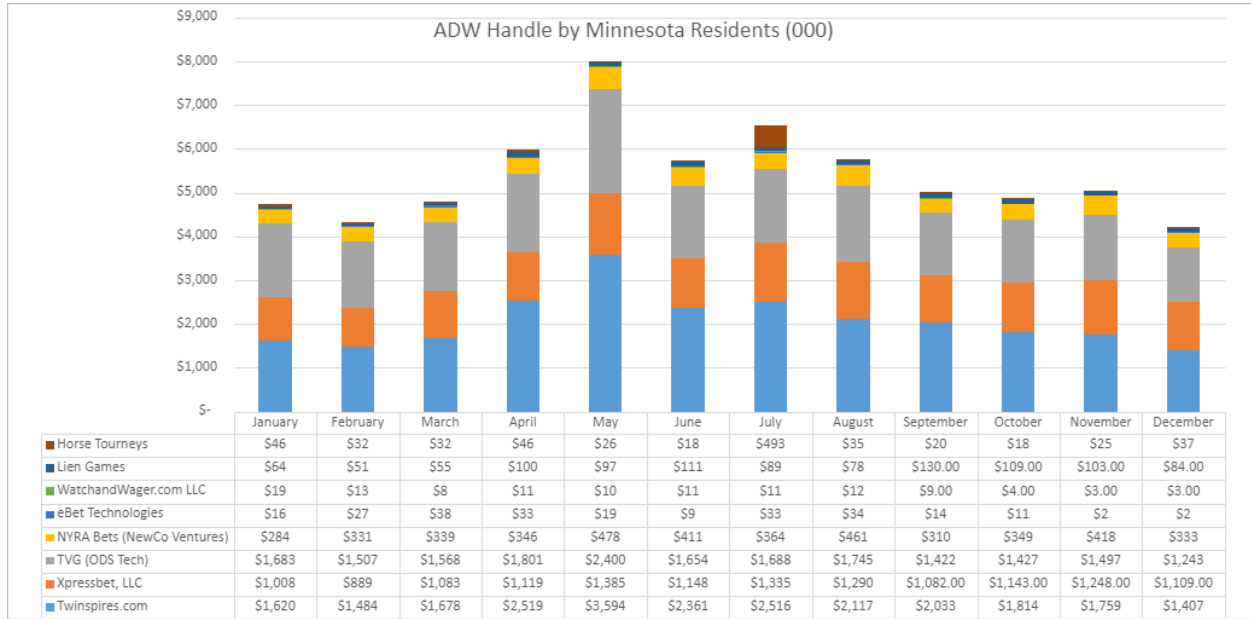

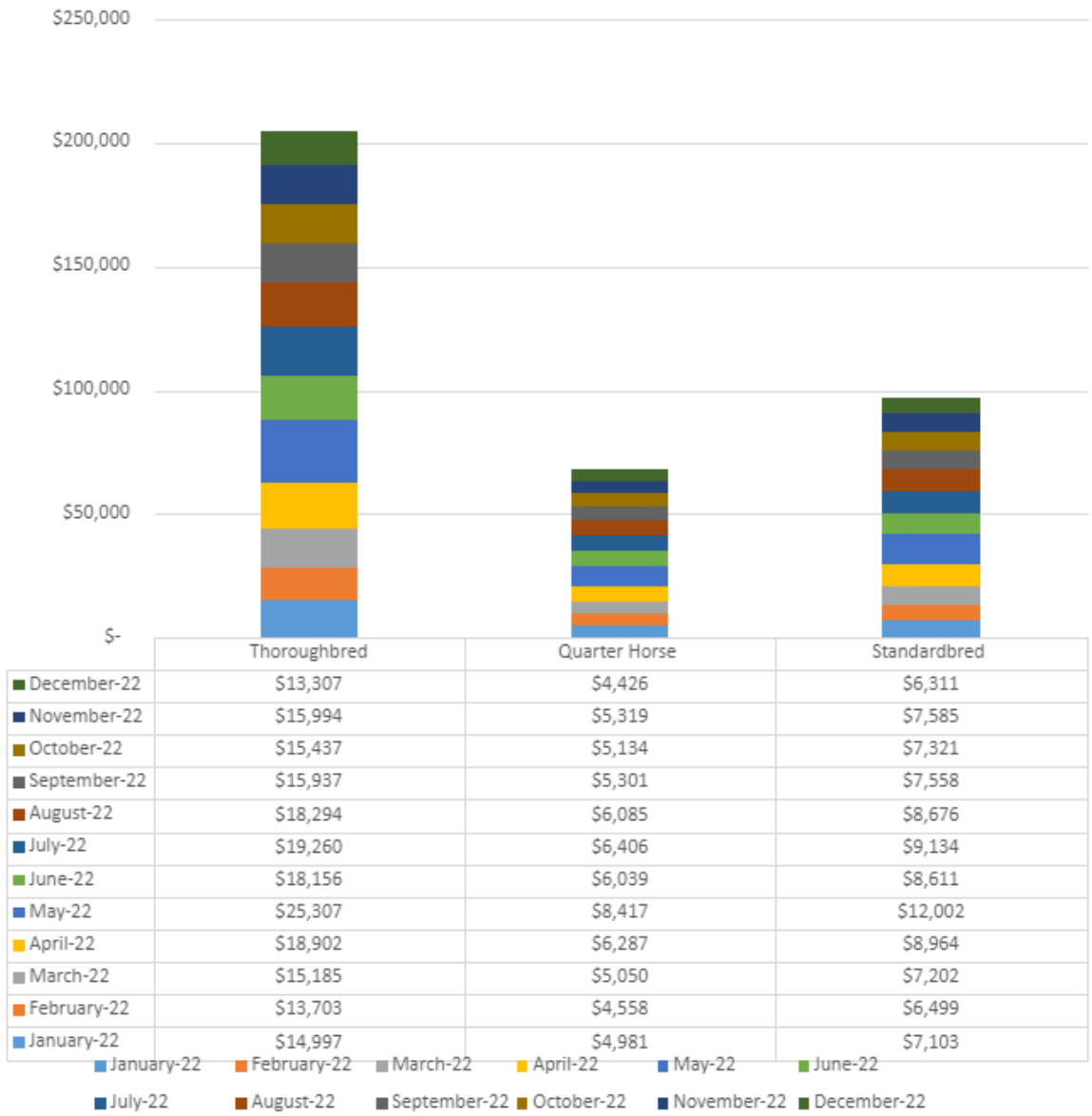
