Chair McArdle called the meeting to order at 4:04 p.m.

Present – Chair McArdle Vice Chair Colombo, Second Vice Chair Johnson, Commissioners Goodman, Gingold, Koob, Dehn, and Erhart. A quorum was acknowledged.

Commissioner Gingold presented. The Finance Committee met April 11, 2023, to consider a request from Canterbury Park for a new game, DJ Wild. The committee approved unanimously.

### **Agenda Item 6 Approval of 2023 Split Sample Laboratories**

Chair McArdle asked if all the labs meet HISA criteria. Dr. Hovda HISA will be sending out their own. This is for Quarter and Standard Bred samples, and all are accredited and meet standards. Motion to approve by Commissioner Dehn; Second by Commissioner Erhart. Motion passed.

### **Agenda Item 7 – Approval of Official Medication Testing Laboratory For Thoroughbreds for 2023**

Dr. Hovda HIWU has changed to May 1, 2023. May be delayed again, in any case we need to have something in place if needed. Motion to approve by Commissioner Koob; Second by Commissioner Johnson. Motion passed.

### **Agenda Item 8 – Running Aces 2023 Live Racing Requests**

#### a. Approval of Seasonal Racing Officials

Mr. Carpenito presented. This is for an Outrider. Motion to approve by Commissioner Erhart; Second by Commissioner Koob. Motion passed.

### **Agenda Item 9 – Canterbury Park 2023 Live Racing Requests**

a. Mr. Merz from Canterbury gave this presented. Packet put together by Ms. Carlisle. Meet will be 54 days of racing. The shipping loan program Canterbury offers seven trainers have taken advantage of for \$119,500. Stall applications 1300 horses. Allotted 1261 stalls, 131 thoroughbreds, 148 Quarter Horses. Overnight projected payouts are \$220,000. 24 Steak races with a payout over \$1.6 million. Projecting payout for 2023 over \$12 million. Commissioner Johnson asked if item J net pool pricing tools methods different. Mr. Merz replied the only changes are the minimum for pick 3's from \$0.50 to \$1.00 and we have added an alter \$1.00 pick 3 with turf racing every Wednesday. Motion to approve by Commissioner Dehn; Second by Commissioner Johnson. Motion passed.

b. Mr. Merz presented. Chair McArdle excited to have Track Superintendent Mr. Barajas returning. New outrider Alicia Foster, highly recommended by Turf Paradise. Motion to approve by Commissioner Johnson; Second by Commissioner Koob. Motion passed.

c. Mr. Merz, no change from 2022. Motion to approve by Commissioner Colombo; Second by Commissioner Dehn. Motion passed.

### **Agenda Item 10 – Approval Canterbury Park Request for a New Card Game – DJ Wild**

Chair McArdle commented that Commissioner Gingold covered earlier the committee unanimously approved. Motion to approve by Commissioner Gingold; Second by Commissioner Johnson. Motion passed.

## **Agenda Item 11 – Approval of HISA-HIWU Voluntary Agreement**

Mr. Newton presented. Based on what other states have done we have made very similar changes and a few minor details still need to be made. Mr. Newton asks the commission to entertain a motion to authorize the Executive Director to negotiate and to execute a voluntary agreement with HISA that is substantially similar to the document in the packet. Commissioner Dehn asked about the financial commitment. Mr. Newton answered yes there is an assessment. Commissioner Colombo asked who pays for the assessment. Mr. Newton explained that last year the assessment was paid for from the ADW Fund. This year we have asked for a one-time Legislative appropriation/budget item change that would pay for it if it passes. For the future there are discussions between staff and Canterbury Park. Chair McArdle commented that down the road we will need to work together as an industry as a whole to do the best we can. The Minnesota Racing Commission can't go and lobby for legislative change, but we certainly can suggest to others things that make the situation better and other people and other organizations can talk to their legislators about the value of the racing industry in the state of Minnesota. The economic impact that it has and the need for Legislative support of that industry because of all the good things it brings. Not only the entertainment side of things, but also the agricultural side of things here in Minnesota. We encourage those who care about the future of horse racing to get very involved and as many people that are in the legislature to understand our industry and all the benefits. Commissioner Goodman wanted to point out that if everyone in the industry really cared we would be figuring out the sports betting situation where the tracks would be involved. Second of all we cannot have a Minnesota Racing Commission and then let the feds run the whole thing, that is an option. If the state really wants to have the feds tell them what to do about an industry that involves gambling in each state, they can do that. Goodman continued that she thinks it needs to be said out loud that it is frustrating that the commission is not allowed to be vocal about a potential threat to the industry. Chair McArdle responded that she thinks all the commissioners feel exactly the same way. Mr. Newton was asked how other tracks are handling this funding. Mr. Newton responded and that there are ongoing discussions on this. Motion to approve by Commissioner Johnson; Second by Commissioner Dehn. All in Favor, Aye. Commissioner Goodman asked for it to be recorded that she did not vote. Motion passed.

### **New Business – Informational Items:**

#### **Agenda Item 12 – Status Reports**

##### **a. Canterbury Park Entertainment**

Mr. Merz from Canterbury gave this report. The permit they had been waiting on the city for over 60 days had been obtained. Canterbury has started grading the training track and will be up and running by the end of May. Dorms are coming along very well, will be ready and livable by May 13<sup>th</sup>. State of Minnesota is having a plumbing code issue which has affected the new barns, they probably will not be ready in time for the 2023 season. Chair McArdle asked about the new area's - isolation barn/receiving barn? The isolation barn is being blocked off now and will be moved in about two weeks. The Receiving Barn has started the 67 stalls that are going in and should be done by the middle of May. Amphitheater deal is to close the 28<sup>th</sup>.

##### **b. Running Aces Casino, Hotel and Racetrack**

Mr. Carpenito and Mr. Bedessem from Running Aces gave this update. Mr. Carpenito continue prep for 2023. This past Tuesday published stall allocations for the meet. 247 stalls to 31 individual stables. 64 racing applications received compared to 55 in 2022. New participants from locations such as California, Indiana, Illinois, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey. Finalized the Minnesota sired racing schedule which will culminate with Minnesota night of Champions on closing night, September 16<sup>th</sup> with a record \$780,000 distributed. Stable area

open Sunday, April 30<sup>th</sup> at 8:00am. Preseason qualifying races are scheduled for Thursday, May 4<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday, May 9<sup>th</sup>. New tote equipment being installed by Global Tote. Working on condition sheets for opening week.

Mr. Bedessem continued the status report. The new tote machines are touch screen and super user friendly. Feels they are a huge update. Ready for Kentucky Derby, having a food truck festival. Race calendars ready and handed out at meeting with all our race dates and partnerships on it. The improvements to finish line plaza, new stairwell, and resurfacing, more accessible than last year. Commissioners commented on the fun promotions listed in the race calendar that was handed out. Vice-Chair Colombo asked if any races that benefit retired racehorses. Mr. Bedessem pointed out the biggest one would be This Old Horse night, June 25<sup>th</sup> along with many others.

- h. Other – Commissioner Goodman reported on a visit she and Executive Director made to New Richmond, Wi to tour the This Old Horse facility. Encourage all commission members to also go and tour. Tours can be coordinated though Kyle.

**MQHRA** – Paul Luedemann - general membership meeting is this Saturday. Elections for directors will be there. Kicked off our first off-track racehorse barrel races last month. Commissioner Colombo asked if these are racehorses that have transitioned off the track. Mr. Luedemann responded yes, they had to have at least one start on a racetrack. This is a typical path for retirement for quarter horses that are 4-5 years old. Others include Trail rides, Rodeo, and family horses. Quarter Horses are very well trained and great horses.



**MTA** – Kay King – Time of year when Foals are appearing. Started out seemed like it was going to be a filly's year, but the colts are now catching up. Mares are on the move coming and going to be bred. Working on summer activities, Award banquet, Owner events, Yearling sale (August 26<sup>th</sup>) & 27<sup>th</sup>), and the Leg Up Fund night, July 22<sup>nd</sup>. New exciting pull tabs and e pull tabs at Canterbury benefiting the Leg Up Fund.

**MHRI** – Cathy Dessert – Busy time of the year, foals & breeding mares. May 6<sup>th</sup> Banquet, speaker is Mike Tanner from the USTA, awards. Please direct all correspondence to Cathy.

**MNHBPA** – Mike Cronin – HISA's Chief of Science will be coming out May 25<sup>th</sup> to meet with Trainers and Owners, Horsemen. Working with their lobbyist on many of the issues facing the industry.
