Whitefish Area Lodging

<u>About:</u> Celebrated as one of Minnesota's most stunning locales, the Whitefish Chain of Lakes provides a complete retreat. Spanning a 115-mile shoreline across 14 interconnected lakes, it features pristine waters, upscale accommodations, top-notch golf courses, outstanding dining, and a diverse array of activities for adventure enthusiasts and those seeking tranquility. Water enthusiasts can plunge into boating, water skiing, wake surfing, fishing, paddleboarding, kayaking, or jet skiing. For land lovers, the choices are plentiful—wander through quaint shops, trek or cycle scenic trails, camp beneath a star-filled sky, enjoy horseback riding, or spot wildlife such as deer, loons, and the occasional black bear.

- Minnesota Resort Story: The Whitefish Area Lodging Association (WALA) exists to promote tourism and lodging on the Whitefish Chain of Lakes. WALA is made up of more than 50 lodging facilities including resorts, hotels, townhomes, B&Bs, and home rentals in the City of Crosslake and Ideal Township.

US Army Corps of Engineers Cross Lake Recreation Area

<u>About:</u> The Pine River, a tributary of the Mississippi River, was once a creek connecting Cross Lake with Upper and Lower Whitefish lakes which are surrounded by 13 other natural lakes. The construction of the dam at Cross Lake raised the water level, making channels between these lakes and forming the Pine River Reservoir, which is better known as the Whitefish Chain of Lakes. This 13,660-acre body of water, with 119 miles of shoreline, provides dozens of interesting bays for pleasure boating and fishing.

The Cross Lake campground, nestled among tall pines, is best known for its picturesque sunsets, beautiful beaches, well-maintained campsites, clean restrooms, showers, group picnic shelters, handicap-accessible facilities, day use areas and much more. It is located just minutes from shopping and paved bike paths.
