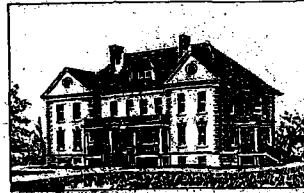

"Lind Cottage" is the first "Colony" building to be erected in Minnesota for Epileptics. It is to be a home for about thirty boys where they can be associated in agreeable companionship, under the direct and personal care of trained attendant-nurses; the supervision of the Institution Medical Staff, and with special opportunities for outdoor employment—all administered in the most economical manner consistent with the best interests of the patient. It is to typify the characteristic feature of the best modern systems for the treatment and care of Epileptics. It is to be hoped that the state will, in the near future, provide more extended accommodations for this unfortunate class.

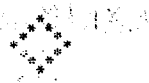
