EFFORTS TO IMPROVE COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL SERVICES FOR PERSONS WITH DD IN MINNESOTA

- 1. Welsch Litigation
 - a. Filed in 1972 during state budget crisis seeking:
 - i. institutional conditions improved;
 - ii. less restrictive community-based care.
 - b. Class action including all persons with DD in state institutions in Minnesota.
 - c. Numerous court hearings and decisions.

- d. 1980 Consent Decree after two weeks of plaintiffs' case:
 - i. community services for 800 in 7 years;
 - ii. children's provisions;
 - iii. legislative activity required of state agency defendants;
 - iv. Court Monitor;
 - v. needs assessment for services in community for all.
- e. 1987 Negotiated Settlement.
- f. 1989 jurisdiction terminated; legislation to establish:
 - i. State-Operated Community Services;
 - ii. downsize institutions.
- g. State Institutions for Persons with DD closed June 1, 2000.
- h. 2002: 48-bed state-operated ICF/MR on grounds of one former state institution (Cambridge) serving:

"persons who pose a public safety risk," instead of jail or prison.

- 2. Home and Community Waiver Funding.
 - a. Legislation adopted in 1983, worked with DD Council, Welsch Court Monitor's Office, Arc Minnesota.
 - b. Proposed to be eliminated in 1985.
 - c. Used to accomplish deinstitutionalization of public and private facilities.
 - d. Minnesota's chief community service funding source.
 - e. Limited growth of 200 persons (not living in ICF/MR) per year was insufficient to meet Minnesota's need for services.
 - f. Waiting list for those living at home grew during 1990's.

WAITING LIST LEGISLATIVE EFFORT

- 1. Research on Unspent Funds
 - worked with Institute on Community Integration on data,
 - institutional costs versus community costs.
- 2. Worked with Clients and Local TV Station in 1998 and Newspaper Reporter 1999 to get in-depth reports on waiting list crisis and unspent funds.
- 3. Arc Minnesota, grassroots effort:
 - Many parents on waiting lists for ten years plus
 - Weekly family story published and provided to each legislator.
- 4. Partners in Policy Making graduates testified, met with legislators, provided family stories, came to State Capitol.
- 5. Minnesota Disability Law Center provided technical information, data analysis, drafting legislation, testimony and amendments.
