Dear Miss Cuppers

We received your letter regarding information concerning Mongoloids and Microcephalic patients. We regret that we did not give you this information sooner, but we have been short of help and our file had to be brought up to date. The answers to your questions are as follows:

Total population - 2540.

(Reginning next week fifty helpless male patients are being accepted for one of our new buildings)

Approximate number of institutionalized Mongoloids - 90 males and 54 females.

Approximate number of Microcephalics - 3 males and 7 females.

Approximate number of Mongoloids admitted last year * 10 males and I female.

Approximate number of Microcephalics admitted last year - 1 male.

The tendency is to admit persons of severe mental and physical defects at an earlier age than formerly, since most physicians now detect mongolism at birth, or shortly after, many of these children are committed and placed on our waiting list. Due to the lack of space it is not always possible for us to accept them immediately. The same situation would apply to licrocephalic cases, ex cept that they are much fewer in number.

Mose of these children are visited often by their parents as the parents tend to be more interested in these patients than the parents of many of our other patients. There are perhaps two or three exceptions where the family physician has advised the mother not to become attached to the baby, but to have the child admitted here and then cease giving the child attention.
