Except where otherwise indicated, your answers should reflect the situation as of the date you fill out the questionnaire. You will note that some items call for additional written information. If you wish to comment on any other items please write in the spaces provided, or on the back of the sheet.

You will note that each blank is numbered in some way (under the blank, or after the "Yes" or "No"). These numbers are for tabulating purposes and should be ignored by the rater.

For those questions which ask for specific numbers, there is a blank for each digit. Be sure the last digit in any two or three digit number is in the right-hand blank. For example; if there are three available blanks $(__)$ for your answer, and your answer is four write $"__4"$; if your answer is 12, write $"__12"$, and if your answer is 163, write $"__63"$.
